TRANSCRIPT EXPLANATION

I. RELEASE OF INFORMATION

A transcript is a confidential document and cannot be released to a third party without the written consent of the student. This is in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 as amended.

II. AUTHENTICATION OF THE TRANSCRIPT

This transcript is arranged differently due to a new automated records system which went into effect Fall Semester 1982. Records of students enrolled during or since that time will be on the new system, while transcripts of former students' records will continue to be produced as in the past. A certified transcript will have the University of Illinois seal embossed and the Registrar's signature in blue at the lower right corner of each page. It must be received directly from the Office of Admissions and Records.

III. ACADEMIC CALENDAR

The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC) operates on an academic calendar of two sixteen-week semesters and one eight-week summer session. A program of intensive instruction in certain courses is available through intersession, which is conducted between regular terms.

IV. STUDENT STATUS

A student's status is determined from his or her academic performance and conduct. A student is in good standing and eligible to return unless there is a notation of a drop status or disciplinary action in the lower right corner, above the Registrar's signature.

V. CREDIT

A. University Credit

Courses shown on the transcript reflect all work attempted while a student at the Urbana-Champaign campus.

1. Undergraduate and professional credit is recorded in semester hours. Each semester hour represents one fifty-minute period of classroom work each week for the duration of one semester (two periods of classroom work per week during an eight-week summer session) or the equivalent in laboratory, field work or approved independent study.

2. Graduate credit is recorded in semester units and is identified by a lozenge (◻) immediately following the credit entry. Each semester unit of graduate work is considered equivalent in quantity of classroom work to four semester hours.

B. Transfer Credit

1. Undergraduate transfer credit shown on the transcript is that credit accepted for admission purposes by the University of Illinois. It is recorded in semester hours.

2. Graduate transfer credit shown on the transcript is that credit accepted for degree purposes by the Graduate College of the University of Illinois. It is recorded in semester units.

C. Intercampus Graduate Program Credit

When only one of its campuses has degree-granting authority in a particular area, the University conducts an intercampus degree program based on cooperative agreement between any two or more departments on different campuses of the University whereby a candidate may earn a degree at the master's or doctoral level.

Credit earned in an intercampus graduate program at the Chicago campus is recorded on the transcript as quarter hour credit. The presence of the lozenge (◻) designates graduate course work, not semester units, in this case. Credit is converted to units for the purposes of including it in the UIUC cumulative graduate grade point average (GPA) and graduate Units Earned.

D. Religious Foundation Courses Credit

Courses offered by the religious foundations located in Urbana-Champaign are accepted for credit by the University. No grades are recorded on the transcript for religious foundation courses and the credit is not included in the cumulative GPA. The symbol "***" will appear in the grade column on the transcript.

E. Extramural Courses Credit

Extramural courses are offered for University credit at off-campus locations and are listed separately from traditional course work on the transcript. Credit in Extramural courses may be in units or hours and is included in the UIUC cumulative GPA and cumulative Hours/Units Earned. Beginning Fall Semester 1983, 300 and 400 level courses taught off campus have been reviewed by the Graduate College and found appropriate for inclusion in a student's degree program as credit taken in residence.

Prior to Fall Semester 1983 there were two types of Extramural courses. Extension (E) courses were conducted by University faculty members and were directed primarily to a continuing education audience. Graduate Resident (R) courses were conducted by University faculty members and were approved for graduate resident credit by the Graduate College. The (E) or (R) designation immediately preceded the course number. For Spring Semester and Summer Session 1983, Graduate Residence (R) courses were identified only by location of instruction.

F. Correspondence Courses Credit

Correspondence courses conducted by University faculty members and administered by the Division of University Extension are accepted for credit. Correspondence courses are listed separately from traditional course work on the transcript with the "CORRESPONDENCE" heading and the dates that the student was enrolled in the course. An "X" immediately precedes the course number. Credit in correspondence courses is included in the UIUC cumulative GPA and cumulative Hours Earned.

VI. COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

- 100-199.....Courses primarily for freshmen and sophomores
- 200-299.....Courses primarily for undergraduate students who satisfy the published prerequisite(s), if any
- 300-399.....Courses primarily for juniors, seniors, professional and graduate students who satisfy published prerequisite(s), if any
- 400-499.....Courses for professional and graduate students, and certain seniors with Graduate College approval to register

VII. GRADE EXPLANATION

A. Grades Included in Calculation of Grade Point Averages

- **E - E by rule. Grade of "E" on the letter scale has replaced "EX" because of student's failure to comply with specified time limitation. = 1.0
- AB - Absent from final examination without an excuse acceptable to the dean of the student's college (counts as a failure). = 1.0
- 2. College of Law only:
In addition to "1" above, grades of B+ (4.5) and C+ (3.5) are authorized.
- B. Grade Symbols Not Included in Calculation of Grade Point Averages
 - CR -Credit (Prior to Spring Semester 1975, "CR" was assigned for satisfactory completion of course work taken through the Study Abroad Program with a grade of "D" or better.)¹
 - DF -Grade temporarily deferred. Used only in graduate and undergraduate thesis and honors courses, and in a limited number of other courses which extend over more than one semester.
 - EX -Approved extension of time to complete the final examination or other requirements of the course.
 - F -Fail¹
 - IP -Course in progress
 - MISS-Missing grade
 - NC -No credit¹
 - O -Outstanding (School of Basic Medical Sciences only)
 - P -Pass¹
 - PASS-A minimum grade of "C" on the letter scale which is used for all test-based credit.
 - S -Satisfactory¹
 - U -Unsatisfactory¹
 - W -Approved withdrawal without credit
 - ** -Used for courses in which no grades are recorded such as transfer credit, religious foundation courses, etc.
- ¹CR/NC: -Spring Semester 1975 to present. Used only in courses taken under the credit-no credit grading option. A minimum grade of "C" is required for credit.
- P/F: -Spring Semester 1968 through Fall Semester 1974. Used only in courses taken under the pass-fail grading option. A minimum grade of "D" is required for passing.
- S/U: -Used only as final grades in graduate thesis research courses, in graduate and undergraduate courses given for zero credit and in certain other specified courses.

VIII. OTHER NOTATIONS USED ON THE TRANSCRIPT

- E -(Immediately preceding the course number.) Credit earned in Extramural Extension courses (see Section V,E).
- FAILED TO COMPLETE REGISTRATION-Failure to pay tuition.
- H -(Immediately preceding a course number.) Honors course as certified by the department offering the course.
- NTE -Entries with footnotes are indicated by a number in the "NTE" column. The footnote explanation appears as the last entry in the body of the transcript.
- R -(Immediately preceding the course number.) Graduate resident credit earned in Extramural Graduate Residence courses (see Section V,B).
- VISIT -(In place of credit amount.) Indicates attendance as a visitor only and not as a participant in any part of the course activities.
- X -(Immediately preceding the course number.) Credit earned in Correspondence courses (see Section V,F).
- () -(Surrounding the credit amount.) Credit which does not apply to Hours/Units Earned, unless otherwise noted in the body of the transcript.
- # -(Immediately following a credit amount.) Graduate credit in semester units (for exceptions, see Section V,C).

IX. HONORS RECOGNITION

- A. Undergraduate Honors
Recognition for superior academic achievement by undergraduate students is given by the University and by students' individual colleges and departments.
 1. Edmund J. James Scholar
Undergraduate Honors Programs, named for one of the University's distinguished presidents, Edmund J. James, provide a number of special curricular opportunities to academically talented undergraduate students. Designation as a James Scholar honors student is recognition by the University of extraordinary ability and achievement.
 2. Dean's List
Undergraduates who have achieved a grade point average for a given semester in the top 20 percent of their class in their college or curriculum are included on the Dean's List. Exact criteria may vary among colleges.
 3. Harno Fellow
Students in the College of Law who have achieved a grade point average for a given semester in the top 10 percent of their college class are designated as a Harno Fellow.
- B. Graduation Honors
 1. University Honors: Bronze Tablet
Continuous academic achievement is recognized by the University by inscribing the student's name on the Bronze Tablet. To qualify, undergraduate students must: (1) have at least a 4.5 cumulative grade point average for all work taken through the academic term prior to their graduation; and (2) rank, on the basis of the cumulative grade point average through the academic term prior to their graduation, in the top 3 percent of the students in their college graduating class.
 2. College Honors and Departmental Honors
Colleges and departments, with the approval of the Urbana-Champaign Faculty Senate and the Board of Trustees, prescribe the conditions under which candidates for their degrees may be recommended for graduation with honors, in recognition of sustained intellectual achievement.

X. CUMULATIVE AVERAGE DATA

Cumulative averages and total Hours/Units Earned are posted following all itemized credit entries on the transcript. Grade point averages (GPA) and Hours/Units Earned are calculated even if DF, EX or missing grades are present. The cumulative UIUC GPA and graded hours/units are based on all traditional term credit and nontraditional credit (Intercession, Extramural, Correspondence, etc.).

Total Hours/Units Earned includes all applicable traditional and nontraditional term credit, transfer, religious foundation and test-based credit. However, Hours/Units Earned does not include incompleting work, failed courses and duplicated credit. These courses have their credit amount enclosed in parentheses to indicate that they are not included in Hours/Units Earned.

The cumulative transfer GPA and graded hours are based on all finalized credit that has been accepted. Zeros in the GPA field indicate attendance at an institution with a grading system not comparable with that used at UIUC. Graduate level UIUC GPA's include transfer credit from the University of Illinois at Chicago.

If the student is or has been enrolled in the College of Law or the College of Veterinary Medicine, cumulative average data are posted separately.
