GREECE

[Original: French]
14 July 1970

1. There has never been any problem of racial discrimination in Greece. The various Greek constitutions (e.g. the Constitution of 3 June 1922 in article 7, the Constitution of 1 January 1952 in article 13, and the Constitution of 15 November 1968 in article 8) have guaranteed protection of the life, honour and freedom of every person in Greece irrespective of nationality, religion or language. Moreover, under article 9, paragraph 1, of the present Constitution, every person is expressly granted the right to the free development of his personality provided that the rights of others are not infringed and the Constitution is not violated. Finally, paragraph 2 of the same article proclaims the inviolability of individual freedom.
2. The phenomenon of nazism has never manifested itself in Greece, and there is consequently no danger of any resurgence of nazism, particularly in a country which has suffered so greatly from the horrors of nazi aggression and occupation.

YEMEN

[Original: English]
28 October 1970

1. The Provisional Constitution and other related legislations prohibit racial discrimination in all its forms and manifestations.
2. Article 22 of the Constitution states that "all citizens are equal before the law".
3. Racism, nazism and all other totalitarian ideologies and practices are outlawed. Yemen has faithfully implemented all United Nations resolutions on the elimination of racism and apartheid. Further, the Ministry of Information publicizes through its mass media, the observance of the following occasions:
 - (1) United Nations Day on 24 October
 - (2) The Universal Declaration of Human Rights on 10 December

4. The Government of the Yemen Arab Republic deems it relevant to point out that, while the international community is taking action to combat nazism and racial intolerance, it should express its grave concern and condemnation over the systematic application of such practices by certain Member States which occupy territories of other Member States.
