### 1. HIGHLIGHTS

# 1.1 28<sup>TH</sup> AWHF BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING – KINSHASA, DRC

The 28<sup>th</sup> AWHF Board of Trustees meeting was held in Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) on 3<sup>rd</sup> **December 2020**. The meeting was hosted by the Government of the Democratic Republic of Congo through the Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development and the Congolese Institute for Nature Conservation (ICCN). In attendance were Board Members representing the five Africa Union regions, representatives of the host country (South Africa), UNESCO, Observers and invited guests.

The meeting was designed as a face to face gathering which observed all the protocols and regulations of the COVID-19 pandemic. Three events were planned from 30<sup>th</sup> November – 4<sup>th</sup> December, namely 1). A Technical Workshop on the Implementation of World Heritage Convention in DRC, 2). A Stakeholders' Event, and, 3). The two-day Board meeting. The African Union Commission (AUC) was represented by Her Excellency Mrs. Amira Mohammed Elfadil, Commissioner for Social Affairs. The Commissioner expressed her gratitude to the Government and People of the DRC for the hospitality accorded to the AWHF Board as a good gesture by the DRC government in preparation for the African Union (AU) Year (2021) for Arts, Culture and Heritage: Levers to building the Africa We Want".


A Technical Workshop on the Implementation of World Heritage Convention in DRC was held on 30th November & 1st December. Official authorities who attended the Opening Ceremony included, Mr. Cosma Wilungula, General Director of ICCN, Mr. Souayibou Varissou, Executive Director of AWHF, representative from UNESCO Office in DRC, General Secretary of the Ministry of Culture, DRC, General Secretary of Ministry of Tourism, DRC, General Secretary of Environment and Sustainable Development, DRC as well as Experts and representatives of public Institutions and Services (National Site Managers, National Museum, Tourism, University representatives). The objective of the workshop was to discuss the implementation of the World Heritage Convention in DRC most specifically to, 1. Introduce the Convention and its Operational Guidelines; 2. Assess World Heritage implementation in DRC in conjunction with Agenda 2063: "The Africa We Want" and 3. Identify key actions forward to improve the current status.

### 2. CONSERVATION ACTIVITIES

# 2.1 DATA ANALYSIS WORKSHOP OF THIRD PERIODIC REPORTING FOR THE AFRICA REGION

Following the successful completion and submission of Sections I and II of the Questionnaires of the Third Cycle of the Periodic Reporting Exercise for the Africa region by African States Parties in July 2020, the World Heritage Centre, in close collaboration with the African World Heritage Fund, organized a regional online Data Analysis Workshop. The meeting took place from the 28<sup>th</sup> – 30<sup>th</sup> October 2020 and was officially opened by the Director of the World Heritage Centre, Dr Mechtild Rössler and the Executive Director of the African World Heritage Fund, Mr Souayibou Varissou. The workshop brought together 38 heritage professionals from the World Heritage Centre, the Advisory Bodies (ICOMOS, ICCROM and IUCN), AWHF technical coordination team and experts from key institutions in the implementation of the World Heritage Convention in Africa. The workshop discussed the methodology for data analysis and the framework for developing the Action Plan for World Heritage in Africa between 2022-2027.

# 2.2 SUB-REGIONAL ONLINE WORKSHOP FOR SITE MANAGERS IN THE AFRICA REGION



The World Heritage Centre, in collaboration with UNESCO Field Offices in the African region (Abuja, Dakar, Harare, Nairobi, and Yaoundé) and the African World Heritage Fund, has organized a series of four sub-regional online workshops for site managers in the Africa region, between 27 November and 4 December 2020. The workshops gathered site managers of World Heritage properties from each of the African sub-regions (Western, Central, Southern and Eastern) to reflect on the preliminary outcomes of the Third Cycle of the Periodic Reporting in Africa. The workshops constituted an important platform for 96 site managers to directly contribute in the drafting of the Action Plan for the Third Cycle of the Periodic Reporting (2022-2027). This is a strategic tool for strengthening the implementation of the World Heritage Convention and promote sustainable development in Africa in line with the African Union Agenda 2063.



### 3. CONSERVATION ACTIVITIES

# 3.1 CONNECTING PRACTISE PHASE III: VIRTUAL WORKSHOP ON EMERGING KEYWORDS

The African World Heritage Fund attended the virtual workshop Connecting Practice Phase III: Commentary on Emerging Keywords Session. Connecting Practice is a joint exploration by IUCN (International Union for the Conservation of Nature) and ICOMOS (International Council on Monuments and Sites), which aims to learn about and develop new approaches to the recognition of the interconnected character of the natural and cultural values within heritage designation and management frameworks. Having included African World Heritage sites (Konso Cultural Landscape in Ethiopia, Maloti Drakensberg in Lesotho and South Africa, and Saloum Delta in Senegal) as case studies, this third phase (2017-2020) of the project focuses specifically on evolved cultural landscapes and explores how to best support and sustain traditional management practices and change management within the processes of the World Heritage framework. The project, which has been supported by the AWHF in the Africa region, is part of Advisory Bodies (IUCN and ICOMOS) efforts to improve outcomes for conservation and recognition of cultural diversity through the implementation of new working methods, including through the specific advisory processes that support listing and monitoring through the World Heritage Convention.

### 3.2 AWHF GRANTS EVALUATION PANEL MEETING


Each year the African World Heritage Fund provides Conservation Grants to African State Parties to implement projects and activities which focus on improving the sustainability and state of conservation of World Heritage properties. The Fund also awards the Moses Mapesa Education and Research Grant to support young African Doctoral and Masters students in the field of natural and cultural heritage. Between 5 May and 31 July 2020, the AWHF received 27 applications for Conservation Grants from 18 African countries (Angola, Comoros, Congo, Côte d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Kenya, Gambia, Mali, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, Senegal, South Africa, South Sudan, Tanzania, Uganda, Zimbabwe) and 37 applications for Moses Mapesa Educational Research Grants from 16 African countries (Benin, Burkina Faso, Congo, Cote d'Ivoire, Egypt, Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya, Madagascar, Nigeria, Senegal, Seychelles, South Africa, Tanzania, Zimbabwe).

Following a rigorous evaluation of all the applications by three independent consultants, the AWHF Grant Evaluation Panel, comprised of nine heritage experts, gathered on 6 October 2020 to study the applications, analyse the evaluation reports and advise the AWHF Secretariat. The AWHF Grant Evaluation Panel's recommendations were submitted to the AWHF Board of Trustees for deliberation during its 28th Meeting held on the 3 December 2020 in Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo.

# 3.3 ONLINE TECHNICAL MEETING FOR LIBYAN PROPERTIES ON THE WORLD HERITAGE IN DANGER



Within the framework of coordination between the African World Heritage Fund and Africa and the Arab States Units of the World Heritage Centre, the Fund participated in the Technical Meeting for Libyan Properties on the List of World Heritage in Danger on 25 November 2020. The Director of the World Heritage Centre and Member of the Board of Trustees of the African World Heritage Fund, Dr Mechtild Rössler, opened the meeting. The online meeting brought together representatives of Libyan authorities, site managers of the five World Heritage properties in Libya, ICOMOS, ICCROM, the UNESCO Office for the Maghreb, the Arab Regional Centre for World Heritage, and experts of the project Managing Libya's Cultural Heritage. The meeting aimed at moving forward with the elaboration of the Desired State of Conservation for the Removal for several Libyan properties from the List of World Heritage in Danger, in line with the Operational Guidelines for the Implementation of the World Heritage Convention. This was the first online workshop and aimed at clarifying the process to representatives of the State Party of Libya and addressing the DSOCR proposal for the Old Town of Ghadames. As a follow-up, remote support will be provided, and a second online meeting will be organized to review and finalize the Desired State of Conservation for the Removal of the Old Town of Ghadames to be submitted to the World Heritage Committee.



### 4. SUSTAINABILITY

# 4.1 RETHINKING HERITAGE FOR DEVELOPMENT IN AFRICA: INTERNATIONAL FRAMEWORK, LOCAL IMPACTS

The African World Heritage Fund has partnered with the University of Kent to address World Heritage and Sustainable Development issues in Africa. One of the initiatives supported by the AWHF is the project "Rethinking Heritage for Development: International Framework, Local Impacts," led by Professor Sophia Labadi, which included case studies in the World Heritage sites of the Island of Mozambique in Mozambique and Saloum Delta in Senegal. This project aims to understand why heritage was marginalised from the Sustainable Development Goals (2015-2030), drawing lessons from past mistakes and presenting recommendations for the greater inclusion of heritage into development frameworks. On 4 of November 2020 Professor Labadi presented the preliminary results focusing on some of the key issues and contradictions preventing intangible and tangible heritage from contributing fully to sustainable development. The presentation also discussed the danger of Sustainable Development Goal 11.4 and its focus on the protection and safeguarding of heritage, which contributes to the continued opposition between heritage and development. A series of meetings targeting international organisations, national governments, civil society and NGOs in Africa will widely disseminate and discuss these conclusions and recommendations in April 2021.

# 4.3 OUR WORLD HERITAGE INITIATIVES: PROMOTING SUSTAINABILITY OF WORLD HERITAGE

The African World Heritage Fund has proudly joined forces with concerned citizens and organizations from across the globe through *OurWorldHeritage*. This is an open, strategic initiative that raises general awareness about the opportunities and threats that natural and cultural World Heritage sites encounter in the 21st century, precipitated by, among others, increasing development pressures, industrial and mining operations, climate change, unsustainable tourism and conflicts. The systematic involvement of civil society is elementary in finding sustainable solutions. OurWorldHeritage was launched on the 48th birthday of the World Heritage Convention, 16th of November 2020, during an hour-long live global broadcast to highlight the key issues World Heritage is facing today and kick-off a yearlong debate which will address the critical issues of World Heritage conservation and management through a series of 12 monthly Thematic Debates in 2021. True to its mission to provide support and assistance for the conservation and management of heritage sites in Africa, AWHF coordinates the mobilization of African stakeholders in the initiative through their engagement and contribution in any of the 12 thematic areas. OurWorldHeritage firmly advocates that to be sustainable, development processes can and should fully reflect the contribution of heritage conservation. An important tool for this end is to fully incorporate sustainability into the criteria and processes to inscribe and manage World Heritage. The AWHF is a partner in the theme "Sustainability". The Sustainability Thematic Debate Team invites heritage management bodies, NGOs, local community representatives (incl. traditional authorities and Indigenous community groups), universities and experts to submit case studies illustrating the relationship of heritage and sustainable development.

# 4.5 A CULTURE OF RESILIENCE: MOBILISING ARTS, CULTURE AND HERITAGE TO WIN THE RACE TO ZERO IN AFRICA

The African World Heritage Fund participated in the Culture x Climate 2020, a virtual global forum for arts, culture and heritage-based climate action presented from mid-October to the end of November 2020. The AWHF was represented by Dr Albino Jopela, who co-chaired with Dr Ewan Hyslop (co-chair of Climate Heritage Network) a session on "A Culture of Resilience: Mobilising Arts, Culture and Heritage to Win the Race to Zero in Europe, Africa and the Middle East" on 18 November 2020. The meeting began with a praise and ululation performance delivered by Dr Fikile Vilakazi, a South African healer and scholar, followed by keynotes by HRH Princess Dana Firas, Petra National Trust President and UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador for Cultural Heritage and Mr Nigel Topping, High-Level Champion for Climate Action at COP26.

This dialogue showcased the role that arts, culture and heritage can play in achieving a climate-resilient world and highlighted culture-based strategies between cultural actors and stakeholders across sectors. The event formed part of the High-Level Climate Champions Race to Zero November Dialogues in advance of the 2021 UN Climate Summit in Glasgow Scotland (COP26). This event was also part of the Climate Heritage Week 2020 (16-22 November), designed to unite all those interested in enhancing the capacity of the arts, culture and heritage sectors to help build a climate-neutral and resilient world in the time of COVID-19.

### 5. PARTNERSHIPS


### 5.1 AWHF QUARTERLY FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE MEETING

Mr. Maitre Claude Nyamugabo Bazibuhe, Minister of Environment and Sustainable Development in DRC on 12<sup>th</sup> November in preparation of the 28<sup>th</sup> AWHF Board of Trustees Meting which took place from 30<sup>th</sup> November to 4<sup>th</sup> December 2020 in Kinshasa. AWHF extended gratitude to the Minister for the support and explored areas of collaboration in World Heritage in DRC.



# 5.3 AWHF MEETS WITH EQUATORIAL GUINEA 2 SOUTH AFRICA

AWHF held a fruitful meeting with **Ms. Balbina Nchama Nvo**, Counsellor in Charge d'Affaires of
Equatorial Guinea to South Africa. Discussions
touched on possible heritage development
programmes and actions of President H. E. **Teodoro Obiang Nguema Mbasogo** as AU CoChampion for Arts, Culture and Heritage.



### 5.4 ICOMOS AFRICA REGIONAL GROUP MEETING

Following the discussions at the Annual Meetings of ICOMOS in Marrakesh, Morocco, from 12 to 18 October 2019, the AWHF joined the ICOMOS Africa Regional Group Meeting in October 2020. The meeting gathered 35 African professional members of ICOMOS, representatives of the International Secretariat and other ICOMOS members partners of the Africa Initiative. The meeting was chaired by ICOMOS Vice-President, Mr Alpha Diop, and discussed the (i) finalisation of the Africa Initiative Three-Year Action Plan, (ii) the revitalization and creation of National Committees of ICOMOS in Africa, (iii) participation and contribution from Africa Group members to ICOMOS Scientific Committees and Working Groups, (iv) strategies for mobilizing African skills and resources for protection and promotion of Africa's heritage. Participants agree on the key areas to improve and finalize the Action Plan to be implemented within the framework of the existing Memorandum of Understanding between AWHF and ICOMOS.





# 5.5 STRENGTHENING COORDINATION IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE WORLD HERITAGE CONVENTION IN AFRICA

True to its mission to offer support to African countries in implementing the World Heritage Convention, the AWHF – category 2 centre under the auspicious of UNESCO - held coordination meetings with UNESCO World Heritage Centre (Africa and Arab Region Units) and the UNESCO Field Offices in Africa. These Quarterly meetings aimed at strengthening partnership and coordinate efforts to leverage resources, expertise and competencies in the promotion and support of the World Heritage Convention in Africa.

The meeting also discusses main joint projects aiming to (i) identify and list African Heritage sites on the World Heritage List, (ii) implement effective conservation and management strategies at World Heritage sites in Africa, (iii) rehabilitate sites inscribed on the World Heritage List in Danger, (iv) build capacity (training of heritage experts and site managers) and (v) involve local communities in decisions concerning their heritage and ensuring that tangible benefits accrue to them. Participants also discussed how specific projects contribute towards achieving the strategic goals of Priority Africa at UNESCO, the Agenda 2030 on Sustainable Development Goals and the Agenda 2063 "The Africa we want". The meeting also discussed the preparation of AWHF and UNESCO joint activities as part of the celebration of 2021 as the Year of Arts, Culture and Heritage in Africa as declared by African Union.

# 5.6 ANNUAL COORDINATION MEETING WITH THE ROYAL NORWEGIAN EMBASSY IN SOUTH AFRICA

The Annual Coordination Meeting between the African World Heritage Fund and the Royal Norwegian Embassy in Pretoria, South Africa, was held online on **11th December 2020**. Chaired by the Executive Director of the AWHF, Mr Souayibou Varissou, the meeting was attended by AWHF Officers (Dr Albino Jopela, Head of Programmes; Ms Roxanne Skosana, Programmes Specialist; and Ms Tsholofelo Legae, Finance Officer) and the Norwegian Embassy representatives: Ms Sofia Micael Tesfaghiorghis, Second Secretary and Mr Emile Ormond, Political and Programme Officer. The meeting focussed on reporting the Grant Agreement RAF-18/0026: Improved Implementation of the World Heritage Convention. This 3-year programme is funded by the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and it is developed following the needs identified in the Action Plan 2012-2017 for World Heritage in Africa which resulted from the Second Periodic Reporting exercise in Africa. This project uses on-site capacity building and networking activities to reinforce and sustain the framework for World Heritage conservation and management in Africa.

The meeting focused on the report of activities implemented by AWHF between January and December 2020. Despite the disruptions caused by the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, resulting in the cancellation and rescheduling of individual projects, the implementation of the activities during the reporting period was guided by the Strategic Plan of the AWHF (April 2019-March 2022) and contributed to strengthen the operational framework of World Heritage on the African continent.


