OFSAA-sanctioned Invitational Events

ATTENTION: ATHLETIC DIRECTORS AND HEADS OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION **MAKE ALL YOUR COACHES AWARE OF THEIR RESPONSIBILITY**

It is your responsibility as a school to submit the request for OFSAA sanction form at least 30 days prior to any invitational event your school is hosting or entering. When OFSAA sanction is granted, all competitors must be OFSAA-eligible. Failure to obtain OFSAA sanction could result in a team or individuals being denied entry or arriving at the event and not being allowed entry. When attending events, a designated staff member must be responsible for the team throughout the event. Please make all teacher-coaches and outside coaches aware of this requirement.

**Application forms for both hosting and attending invitational events are on the OFSAA website and must now be completed and submitted ONLINE.

For Interprovincial Competitions

Schools must receive OFSAA sanction in order to participate

For attendance at US events

- Schools must get OFSAA sanction for all statesanctioned or NFHS-sanctioned events.
- Tournament or meet information often does not indicate whether the event is sanctioned so schools are advised to obtain OFSAA sanction for all US

For Hosting Meets/Tournaments

Many US schools must attend only events sanctioned by the host state or province, so it is recommended that you obtain OFSAA sanction for any events involving US schools or schools from other provinces. Failure to do so may result in a team being sanctioned by their state when they return.

Check out the OFSAA website under Events - Sanctioned, to make sure the invitational event your school has applied to host or attend has been entered. To search for invitational events in the US, check their website. (nfhs.org).

International Students and OFSAA's Transfer Policy


International students are not exchange students and therefore must apply for eligibility through the OFSAA Transfer Policy.

International students may apply for eligibility through Transfer Policy section a (ii): "The student has transferred to an Ontario school from outside Canada or the United States and is attending the designated school in their choice of system (public, catholic or independent) according to school board boundaries (or is attending the closest school in the student's choice of system to the student's home if no school boundaries exist)."

They may apply also for eligibility through section b (ii): "The student accepts his/her ineligibility under the Transfer Policy, but requests eligibility for the sports he/she did not participate in at the interschool level for the twelve months prior to the date of transfer."

Coaching Your Child in High School

Coaches face many challenges and enjoy many rewards throughout their careers. If they are lucky, they can coach championship teams and develop lifelong relationships with their athletes. There are also trying times when coaches may question why they ever thought of getting into coaching. Nevertheless, there are also situations that may occur in coaching careers when you are faced with a unique challenge: coaching your own sons and daughters.

One of the reasons we find value in coaching is due to the relationships we build; we teach athletes lessons to be successful not just solely in athletics but throughout their lives. One day, they arrive as unknown freshmen, and the next, you're sitting in a chair on a warm Saturday morning watching them receive their diploma, heading off to the next chapter in their lives. Knowing that time as a parent is short, parent-coaches need to develop ways so they can enjoy time together.

Allow coaching from others - Although we may find ourselves on the same team as our sons and daughters, it is important to let your children be coached by other people. Even if you are a highly recognized head coach, they can learn new things in a different way from other coaches, even your assistants. Throughout an athlete's career they are bound to face good and bad coaching, but just like other parents, parent-coaches quickly need to learn to not coach them from the sidelines. One of our goals as coaches is to develop leadership in not just athletes but our fellow coaches as well. To instill this leadership, we must allow other coaches to do their jobs. This allows a more productive atmosphere that fosters respect. In that same mindset, it is best not to talk to your children after a game, match or race. We have all heard stories about parents burning out their sons and daughters by overanalyzing game results. As coaches who are parents, we need to be there for our children, but allow them to bring up the conversation of play and outcome only if they wish to do so. A further step is that we can ask our sons and daughters to speak to another coach on staff first before they talk to us.

Treat your child like any other - A child's personality may set some of the tone of the coach/parent relationship. I do feel it is extremely important to set some parameters as to how things are to be handled. Even though coaches may treat their sons and daughters differently at home, they need to treat them like any other player during practices and games. Some coaches set environmental ground rules. At games and practices with the public present, the coach is coach; however, when at home it's only mom or dad. This may seem trivial, but teammates notice nuances and if we are going to treat athletes the same, something as simple as a title can go a long way in showing the distinction between the two.

Be able to make the tough decisions and see the future

- As we raise our own children, most of us instill the values we pass on to others through coaching. In school and sports, we want our kids to work hard, be respectful, communicate well and look people in the eye. However, even following the Six

Pillars of Character will not ensure competitiveness. When it comes to putting the program first, coaches want the best players on the team. Some players provide skill and work ethic while others have heart that will only make your team better. Finding the right combination and making the right choices, as any coach will tell you, is the most difficult part of coaching. When we find our own children being a possible piece to maximizing team potential, it is a challenge to separate what is best for the team and for our children as we have vested interests in both. It is during these times that parent coaches need to rely on vision and core principles.

A high school athletic career is only four years long, but crucial in the development of many of our youth. Many come with aspirations to be a scholarship player and even play professionally. Coaches can help in achieving these goals, but there is much more benefit in instilling habits in all athletes that will allow them to find success in any number of post high school goals. Parent coaches are tasked with remembering their core principles and having vision. Most coaches will agree they want their athletes to be able to overcome hardship, have the ability to make plans to work toward success, and build a network with friends with others that can last a lifetime. Parent coaches may have children with a wide range of ability levels, but they have to allow their core principles to coincide with their parenting.

An example of this is when a coach has two girls that both play JV volleyball together during their sophomore and freshman year. The younger daughter turns out to be the best player on the JV team and is moved up for playoffs. During next season's tryouts, the younger daughter—now a sophomore—brings more skill and experience and easily earns a spot on the varsity team. However, the older daughter does not have the skills of her sister. She is one of the players that needs to be addressed individually by the parent coach and coaching staff. These are real parental coaching moments and as coaches we are charged to look after the entire team by displaying the honesty and professionalism that all our communities expect. In addition, when we have these conversations with a focus on core principles and vision, we are better able to communicate with all athletes in these delicate situations.

Be honest with all team members - As a coach, honesty helps team members understand their team roles. Honesty fosters a positive team environment and we need to be honest with all players regardless of whether they are our sons and daughters. One area that we can focus on when we have sons and daughters on our teams is to be aware of our comments and find ways to recognize all player contributions. Coaches' sons and daughters are part of teams they play on and need to be treated like the rest of their teammates.

Coaching a team is full of challenges and rewards, and essentially, we create the foundations of a "second family." Each player is like a son or daughter. It has been wonderful to build relationships like this over the years and can be just as rewarding when your son or daughter become part of the school program.

Hayden Goalie Fired Up About Competing at OFSAA

Huskies seeded fourth for provincial high school field hockey tournament

Lyndsay Swanston spent a week in August rappelling down buildings, cutting cars apart, hauling hoses and battling blazes in bulky, heavy gear in scorching heat. Camp Ignite was a five-day introductory firefighting course in Mississauga geared toward teenage girls with an interest in pursuing it as a career.

"It's always been something I was interested in," she said, "so I thought I would do it because I'd never tried it before."

That sense of adventure has played a major role in the Grade 12 student's athletic career as well. When she arrived at the newly-opened Frank Hayden Secondary School in Grade 9, she went out for the school's first-ever field hockey team. Few players had any experience in the sport and the team was lacking one key element — a goalie.

When the coaches asked for volunteers, Swanston raised her hand.

For four years, she's guarded the Huskies net, donning the oversized gear to block shots and frustrate opponents. The last line of defence, she's been called upon to put out fires while Hayden built its program. And Friday, Swanston came to the rescue once more.

With the Huskies and the Nelson Lords tied 1-1 after regulation in the Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference final, the game came down to penalty strokes.

"She made a phenomenal save that totally saved us," said Hayden coach Kelly Grzesik. "She did full splits to make a save on a strong shooter."

That save helped the Huskies pull out a 2-1 victory and secure the fourth seed for this week's Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations (OFSAA) tournament in Kitchener.

"We were so bummed after the loss (to Nelson) in the Halton final," Swanston said of the 4-1 defeat three days earlier. "We knew we could play better and that win just sets everything in order to get us ready to play at OFSAA."

Hayden earned a second shot at Nelson by beating Bishop Ryan 1-0 in last Thursday's GHAC semifinal, backed by Swanston's shutout and a goal by Sara Grabauskas. Meanwhile, Nelson topped St. Jean de Brebeuf 3-0 in the other semi to set up the rematch. Emma Davis gave Hayden a lead but Nelson's Anna Costanzo tied it up to send the game to penalty strokes, where Hayden exacted a measure of revenge, though both teams are OFSAA-bound (Nelson is seeded sixth).

"Beating Nelson gave them some confidence and being ranked fourth gave them a boost, recognizing them as being a contender," Grzesik said.

The thought of competing at OFSAA seemed like a far-off dream when Swanston and her teammates came together to form Hayden's first junior team. They won just two of nine games, though they began play in tier 1, unlike most new schools who work their way up the ranks.

"I had no idea why we were in tier 1. Nobody really knew what they were doing," Swanston said. "But our coaches said it would be better for us and it was definitely the right move." Hayden won only two games the following year with a senior team that had no Grade 12s. But over the past two seasons, the Huskies have only one loss in 14 regular-season games.

Grzesik said players have dedicated themselves to the game, with many of them joining the Halton Field Hockey Club. Grade 10 midfielder Megan Rennie, like Swanston, has played for the provincial team. Defenders Allie Hoegl and Paige Waddell and midfielder Mackenzie Williams play rep with Halton while others play in the club's development league.

"A lot of teams, you're beating one or two players," the Hayden coach said. "We're pretty solid everywhere. We can look at our bench and there are players who can give us good minutes and potentially score some goals."

One player Hayden opponents will have to beat is Swanston. She plays an aggressive style, coming out

> to challenge shooters and makes the saves her team needs from her. Hayden allowed a league-low four goals in nine games before the Halton final.

> Swanston, who played for the national junior indoor team in a series against the U.S. in March, was recruited by U.S. colleges but is now leaning toward Canadian schools. She'll go to university and if she's still interested in firefighting when she graduates, she may return to college. That still seems like a long way off, but then so did OFSAA to that Grade 9 who offered to be the team's goalie.

"Everything's happened so fast," the 17-year-old said. "The girls who are in Grade 12 who were in the first year of the program, we've been working so hard for it. That's been our goal since Grade 9. Then all of sudden, it was like 'Oh my gosh, we're going to OFSAA.'"

The Huskies couldn't ask for anyone better equipped to lead them into the fire.

Nutrition for Cold Weather Sports

Special Considerations

Special attention to adequate fuel and fluids is imperative in cold weather sports. Some of the issues that are unique to these sports include:

- Cold temperatures increase the risk of hypothermia and can reduce the desire to eat and drink;
- Shivering increases energy expenditure through the use of carbohydrate (glycogen) in the muscle, making the athlete more prone to fatigue;
- Location of training and competition can limit access to food and fluid, making the athlete more likely to neglect to fuel and hydrate adequately.

Hydration

Athletes participating in sports involving multiple training or competition runs (alpine and freestyle skiing, snowboarding, sledding, etc.) need to make a special effort to hydrate. Since fluids are not usually taken in actual competition, pre-hydration is important, and care should be taken to hydrate between events or training runs. To ensure optimal hydration, athletes should be encouraged to:

- Wear or carry a water bottle on a belt or in a backpack during warm-up;
- Carry a water bottle in a bag during training, which can be left at the top or bottom of the hill;
- Wrap bottles in clothing to keep them off the ground and prevent freezing in sub-zero temperatures;
- Pack warm beverages or soups in insulated containers to reduce the risk of hypothermia;
- Use non-breakable bottles that can be opened without having to remove gloves.

Fueling

Since cold weather suppresses appetite, it can be easy for athletes to not eat enough until meal breaks or the end of training. To help ensure optimal performance and prevent physical and mental fatigue, athletes should be encouraged to:

- Bring carbohydrate-based snacks that are coldtolerant, easy to digest, and can be handled with gloves if necessary, such as crackers and cheese, arrowroot cookies, pretzels, dried fruit, fruit leathers, dry cereal, trail mix, granola bars, and peanut butter and jam sandwiches;
- Use unbreakable, easy-to-open containers, such as zippered or unsealed sandwich bags or rubber containers;
- Take a few bites of a carbohydrate-based snack after each run to maintain blood sugar and glycogen levels, and to encourage ongoing muscle recovery.

NOTE:

Athletes involved in indoor winter sports (such as ice hockey and figure skating) and cold weather endurance sports (such as cross-country skiing and biathlon) can plan for fueling and hydration before and during training and competition in much the same way as similar warm-weather sports. OFSAA Experience – Terry Cooper

Every day when Terry Cooper walks over to Marathon High School to coach in his Falcons gear, he's a happy man. It's been that way for over 50 years now.

Though Mr. Cooper retired from teaching 15 years ago, he's stayed involved with the school community of Marathon, a small town of a little more than 3000 people between Thunder Bay and Wawa. He taught grade nine math and boys' physical education to all grades starting in 1966 and a trip to Ontario Leadership Camp early on sparked his interest in coaching.

Now in his 51st year at the head of the bench, Cooper coaches the grandchildren of some of those first teams he headed. First this year it was the Senior Girls' basketball team and now it's the Junior Boys' basketball squad but he's also coached many athletic activities over his years.

"Over the years I had a hand in just about every sport from hockey to volleyball, to track and field, to gymnastics to basketball," Cooper said in a feature article in the Marathon Mercury.

"I couldn't even begin to guess how many kids I coached over the years... it's very difficult to put a number on that but we won our fair share of titles. We had some great successes on the court."

And even after retirement Cooper couldn't stay away from

the gym. He loved and still loves the teaching aspect of coaching, and how it provides an avenue to relate to the kids on a level outside the classroom.

"It's a joke in our family," says Terry's daughter, Robin Cooper. "For the past ten or so summers we ask him what his coaching plans are for the fall. He says he thinks he's going to pack it in. Then it comes to the fall and someone, usually one of the players from the previous year, asks him if he would consider returning and he says yes!"

His planning and coaching style haven't changed much over the years – though he does use an iPad now after seeing a coach from Thunder Bay using one.

"Each year you get a different group of kids with different skill sets. With a junior team or grade nines, how you start them off depends on where they need the help," says Mr. Cooper. "The whole objective of the program is for the students to gain enough knowledge and confidence to be able to play at the senior level. I've always thought that sports is the only thing that keeps some kids in school."

"Always have something positive to say after a practice or a game. That grows on the kids and, sometimes on later years, where you learn that those kids have found their particular niche in life and are doing well it's a great feeling."

Jo-Anne started coaching at a young age and has spent the past 29 years at La Citadelle leading loudly – they say you can hear when she's in the gym.

Described as a natural motivator, passionate, caring and supportive Jo-Anne is also the teacher-coach that will chase her athletes up and down the court rather than stand and direct.

"I love working with students and I love pushing them to their limits," says Dexter. "If they stay after practice, they want to shoot another couple shots, kick another couple balls, one more 50m to get our time – if they ask me on their own that's my level of success."

Ken McDonald – Senator O'Connor (TDCAA)



Ken has coached inside and outside of schools for 40 years including soccer, inline and ice hockey, baseball, gymnastics, basketball, volleyball, curling, "and on and on."

A caring coach that teaches the positive impact of play whether win or lose, he's

always instructing but with a twist – like a little something funny to lighten the perspective.

"They feed off of you," says McDonald. "They can see whether you're jaded and I'm always trying to talk and trying to improve certain things they're trying to do correctly. It's not a criticism, you want them to improve and do better because I'll cheer just as loud as they do if they make a good play or catch so it's like I'm making the catch at the same time they are."

Crestwood was returning to the OFSAA Football Bowl Series after a few years absence. This was the Mustangs 9th appearance and 4th win.



This was W.F. Herman's 5th consecutive OFSAA Bowl victory in their 9th appearance. They maintained their ranking as the top high school football team in Canada.






