For 75 years, the Fulbright Program has given hundreds of thousands of passionate and accomplished students, scholars, teachers, artists, and professionals of all backgrounds and fields the opportunity to study, teach and conduct research, exchange ideas, and contribute to finding solutions to complex global challenges.

Since its inception in 1946, more than **400,000 Fulbrighters** have participated from over **160 Countries**.

The Program awards approximately **8,000 fellowships annually**.

The Fulbright U.S. Student Program sends U.S. graduating college seniors, graduate students, young professionals, and artists to pursue graduate or professional studies and/or conduct research abroad for one academic year.

The Fulbright English Teaching Assistant Program places U.S. recent college graduates and young professionals abroad as assistant English teachers in classrooms from primary through university level.

The Fulbright-National Geographic Award sends U.S. citizens abroad to expand, add a science communication element to, or enhance a storytelling project on globally significant themes.

The Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant Program brings early career English teachers from overseas to teach their native language at U.S. colleges and universities while they enhance their English language teaching skills and learn U.S. values prior to returning home to teach English.

The Fulbright Foreign Student Program brings graduate students, early career professionals, and artists from abroad to conduct research and study in the United States.

The Fulbright U.S. Scholar Program sends American scholars abroad to teach and/or conduct research for up to a year.

The Fulbright Specialist Program sends U.S. academics and professionals to host institutions abroad for two to six weeks to share expertise and establish partnerships benefiting institutions and communities both in the United States and overseas.

The Fulbright Visiting Scholar Program and Fulbright Scholar In-Residence Program bring foreign scholars to lecture and/or conduct postdoctoral research for up to a year at U.S. colleges and universities.

The Fulbright Arctic Initiative supports a multi-national cohort of scholars and researchers to study the Arctic from a multidisciplinary perspective and engage in collaborative thinking, analysis, and problem solving.

The Fulbright Teacher Exchanges provide professional learning opportunities for elementary and secondary educators from the United States and over 75 other countries to develop their educational practice and bring international knowledge, skills, and perspectives to their classrooms and schools to improve educational outcomes and prepare today's youth for success in a globalized, interconnected world.

The Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program brings outstanding mid-career professionals from developing and emerging countries to the United States for one year. Fellows participate in academic study and gain professional experience.



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
