Chapter 1. Equality and non-discrimination

1.1 Legal and policy developments or measures relevant to fostering equality and combating discrimination against EU citizens based on their nationality and against LGBTI people

There were two key developments in 2021 in relation to this chapter. The first was the appointment of the members and the start of work of the national equality body – the Commission for Prevention and Protection against Discrimination (CPPD) and of the Ombudsperson, who also has an equality mandate. The second was the proposal for amendments to the national Law on Matricular Registration Records providing for a process for legal gender recognition.

Regarding the first, the new Law on Prevention and Protection against Discrimination (ADL), adopted in October 2020, foresaw the establishment of the CPPD (Chapter III of the ADL). A successor of the Commission for Protection against Discrimination, which was operating until mid-2019, the CPPD has a clear legal status and mandate to prevent and protect against discrimination based on nationality, sexual orientation and gender identity. It also has a mandate to deal with "other grounds", thus sex characteristics can be considered to fall within its scope of work.

The appointment process was tainted by several developments. First, to much dissatisfaction of the opposition, the Parliamentary majority refused to conduct an administrative check of the applicants and to state which applicants satisfy the minimum criteria stated in the ADL. Second, as a result of the former, some of the appointed members did not satisfy the minimum criteria stated in the ADL. Third, while the opening of the appointment process via a public hearing is laudable, it happened within a very small time window, including a session for selecting the seven applicants to be proposed for appointment by the competent parliamentary body during the New Year's holiday and which lasted less than ten minutes in total and included almost no debate at all.

The establishment of the body faced obstacles. First, less than a month after the appointment of the members, one of them resigned due to private reasons, leaving one slot in the CPPD vacant. The Parliament published the call for filling in the emptied spot a few months after this resignation. It conducted a public hearing in July 2021. Contrary to the deadlines stated in the ADL, it had not selected the seventh member by the end of 2021. Second, the initially allocated space for office for the equality body was reallocated for other purposes due to the delay of its establishment. The CPPD members worked "from home" for the first few months, until June 2021. Third, the establishing of the body as a legal person by the commissioners was done with little to no support from anyone, including financial support. Fourth, further material and human resources for the body to operate

are needed. The former are currently being secured only through donations for office equipment, whereas for the latter the process is moving slowly due to procedural obstacles on recruitment of new employees with a civil servant status and limitations as to the number of people the body can recruit in the first year. Recruitment through alternative venues, such as takeover of staff from other institutions are currently underway. In spite of this, the CPPD submitted its first two quarterly reports to the Parliament, as prescribed by the ADL.² In terms of number of cases, the CPPD is dealing with a backlog of 78 cases and had received 52 new cases up to September 2021). Ethnicity is the most reported ground, whereas sexual orientation and gender identity are included in 7 cases. As a single ground, gender identity discrimination was claimed in two cases, and sexual orientation discrimination in one case. In one case, these two grounds were raised together. In three cases these two grounds were raised together and alongside social origin, belonging to a marginalised group and sex. Discrimination is most reported in the field of access to public goods and services, followed by "labour and labour relations" and "education, science and sports". The CPPD has also used its new competence - amicus curiae - in a case pertaining to discrimination on grounds of disability in access to polling places (see Chapter 8) and an actio popularis on Roma segregation in schools (see Chapter 3). Furthermore, it published an expert opinion on the publicly divisive debate over a proposal for entering the ethnic affiliation/origin in personal ID cards.³ The CPPD also started to exercise its competence to adopt general recommendations (See chapter 8).

Apart from the CPPD, in 2021, a new Ombudsperson was appointed. The previous Ombudsperson occupied the position for several months after their mandate expired (September 2020) before the Parliament published the vacancy announcement for this position (26 November 2020). To open dismay by CSOs, this announcement was done in secret and was not published on the website of the Parliament. Only four persons applied, including the candidate announced by one of the governing political parties as their candidate. On January 11, 2021, the Commission on Elections and Appointments Issues held a session that was not

announced to the public beforehand. There was no public hearing nor publishing of the biographies of the four candidates. On the same session this commission adopted a draft-decision proposing appointment of the aforementioned candidate of one of the political parties. On January 25th, 2021, with criticism by the parliamentary opposition, the candidate was appointed as Ombudsperson.⁴

The second key development in 2021 was the proposal for amendments to the national Law on Matricular Registration Records providing for a process for legal gender recognition.⁵ This was not legally regulated until now, due to which the European Court for Human Rights found North Macedonia to be in violation of Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights in the case X vs North Macedonia (Application no. 29683/16, 17.01.2019). The proposal provides for a process which will require two main things: for the person not to be married, and for the person to give a statement certified in front of a competent notary that they are not requesting the change in order to avoid a judicial process or serving a sentence. The proposal explicitly states that it will not require of the applicants any proof for scheduled, started or completed medical confirmation intervention. Although the amendments were put forward to the parliament in April 2021, they have still not been adopted; a high government official attributed this to the proximity of the local elections and stated the law will be adopted immediately following the local elections.⁶ On 17 November 2021, the Interparty group on LGBTIQ persons in the national Parliament, in cooperation with the Council of Europe, hosted a round table focused on legal gender recognition. On this occasion, besides CSO representatives, three trans* persons shared their lived experiences. This was the first time a trans* person spoke in the Parliament.

In addition to these two developments, two processes are underway and worth noting. First, the long awaited National Action Plan on the Rights of LGBTI Persons has still not been adopted. The working group was meeting in the last two years, but no draft text has been put up for public discussion and/or passed to the Government for adoption yet.⁷ The strategy on equality and non-discrimination expired in 2020. Up to the time of writing of this report, the text was being drafted with May/June 2022 as an expected adoption date.⁸ Second, the harmonisation of national legislation is an obligation under Article 48 of the ADL. A process of assessment of the national legislation against the ADL for harmonization is underway. The analysis containing specific recommendations for amending a

number of laws in the fields of employment, education, social protection and media was completed with support by the Council of Europe/European Union Horizontal Facility project. This analysis should serve as basis for a series of proposals for amendments to these laws during 2022. According to the deadline stated in the abovementioned article from the ADL, this process should finish by 30 October 2022.

1.2 Findings and methodology of research, studies, or surveys on experiences of discrimination against EU citizens on the grounds of nationality and against LGBTI people

North Macedonia progressed on the ILGA Rainbow Map. It is currently ranked 31 out of 49 countries. It has been evaluated to fulfil 27% of the criteria (i.e. rights) monitored by ILGA and its partners. ¹⁰ The progress can largely be attributed to the adoption and entry into force of the ADL.

A research by the Network against Discrimination, a network of CSOs providing free legal aid in discrimination cases covering all grounds from the ADL (including race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender, disability, age, etc), on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on marginalized groups included LGBTI persons as one group (others were persons that use drugs, sex workers, to name a few). The data shows that LGBTI persons are not well informed of and/or have not used the economic measures for assistance introduced by the government (such as, for example, support for self-employed persons, extension of bank loan due dates, etc). 12% of LGBTI persons consider that the way the eligibility criteria for using these measures were set rendered them ineligible, 11 although the study did not collect data on the specific discriminatory aspects raised by the respondents. Apart from the financial consequences, 64% of the LGBTI respondents reported facing problems of a non-economic nature during the pandemic, such as domestic violence, childcare challenges, restrictions to freedom of movement. The survey was conducted via qualitative in-depth interviews with 127 interviewees, 19.7% out of whom were LGBTI. The sample was purposeful, whereas all interviewees belonged to one of the groups covered by the members of the Network.

With regards to the ground of nationality, we note that in the national context "nationality", as understood in EU law, is referred to as "citizenship". Since North Macedonia is an EU candidate country, it does not collect any data specifically on EU citizens.

Chapter 2. Racism, xenophobia and related intolerance

2.1 Findings and methodology of research, studies, or surveys on experiences of ethnic discrimination, racism and hate crime

The Balkan Barometer survey includes some questions of interest to aspects covered in this chapter. When asked if they agree with the statement "the Government should do more in order to ensure better housing conditions" for persons from specific groups, a large percentage answered that they totally disagree or tend to disagree when it comes to displaced persons or refugees (38%), Roma (26%), and other minorities (30%). The results for the entire Western Balkans region, not segregated by country, show large intolerance towards Roma. For example, 39% would be uncomfortable or somewhat uncomfortable to rent housing to Roma, 33% to invite Roma to their house, and an astonishing 68% would be uncomfortable or somewhat uncomfortable to marry a Roma or to have their children marry a Roma. The results for North Macedonia are similar to the region's average ones - 38% would be uncomfortable or somewhat uncomfortable to rent housing to Roma, while 71% would be uncomfortable or somewhat uncomfortable to marry a Roma or to have their children marry a Roma. However, overall, North Macedonia seems to exhibit the most tolerant and accepting attitudes towards Roma compared to the countries in the region, alongside Montenegro.¹³ The Balkan Barometer is a regular annual survey conducted by the Regional Cooperation Council. Its last, 2021 edition, was published in June and it presents data gathered during the period December 2020 - February 2021. It was conducted via personal household interviews using computer-assisted personal interviewing (except for Serbia where due to the COVID-19 measures the survey was conducted via telephone). methodology note in the report, the survey "was conducted among N=1000 respondents in each economy, aged 18+ with the total of 6,000 respondents from the entire Western Balkans region". 14

With regards to hate speech, regular monitoring and informing of the public is done only by CSOs. In particular, the Macedonian Helsinki Committee does a regular and thorough reporting across all grounds of discrimination. Within the national context, hate speech is most frequent on the grounds of ethnicity that includes, but is not limited to Roma. Inter-ethnic tensions often manifest as hate speech, mainly online, but occasionally also offline. For example, a February 2021 case of incitement of hatred on grounds of nationality/ethnicity caused a public stir when the participants at a public protest related to a court case shouted hate messages on grounds of ethnicity. The court case was about a multiple murder case where five ethnic Macedonians were killed on Maundy Thursday in 2012. Five ethnic Albanians stood trial for the murders and, in 2015, for a crime qualified as "terrorism" and were sentenced to life imprisonment, a verdict later rebutted by the Supreme Court (in 2017). The protest on the 29.01.2021 was organized during the re-trial of the case. Protesters claimed that the accused were deliberately framed for the murder in order to make it look like an inter-ethnic killing. However, the protests took a violent turn¹⁵ and included chanting registered by the Macedonian Helsinki Committee as inciting violence and hatred on grounds of nationality/ethnicity. 16

The Macedonian Helsinki Committee noted increase in the hate speech on grounds of ethnicity on social media in relation to the legislative proposal for changes in the law on personal identification documents in the period February-March 2021. This proposal was put forward by two MPs, ethnic Albanians, and foresaw that all IDs will contain a slot which would state the ethnicity of the person. Following disagreement by human rights organisations, ¹⁷ and a negative opinion by the Commission on Prevention and Protection against Discrimination, ¹⁸ the proposal was not acted upon.

In April and May 2021, aside from hate speech on grounds of ethnicity – this time related to the announced census of the population, the Macedonian Helsinki Committee noted increased hate speech directed towards Roma.¹⁹

2.2 Legal and policy developments or measures relating to the application of the Framework Decision on Racism and Xenophobia and the Racial Equality Directive

Developments related to the application of the Framework Decision on Racism and Xenophobia, with a focus on hate speech and hate crime, have largely been focusing on the Roma. These are described in the next chapter. (For more details, see Chapter 3).

3.2 Legal and policy developments or measures directly or indirectly addressing Roma/Travellers inclusion

In addition to the ongoing work on the overall Roma strategy, the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy has been preparing the National Action Plan for Roma Women 2022-2025 in line with the Roma Strategic Framework on Equality, Inclusion, and Participation up to 2030, with the support of the Council of Europe/Roma and Travelers Team. In November 2021, the Roma and Travellers Team, Council of Europe and the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy hosted the 8th International Roma Women's Conference "Protecting the human rights and dignity of Roma and Traveller women in time of crisis".²⁰

In February 2021, the Government, with the support of the EU Delegation, launched projects to support Roma under IPA 2, which include activities for legalization of houses, improvement of infrastructure and safe living conditions, repair and reconstruction of homes, employment of young Roma, support for Roma students with after-school tutoring, as well as raising awareness about equal rights and access to health care. There are four grants with a total value of about 3.2 million euros for a period of 3 years in the Roma settlements of the municipalities Prilep, Bitola, Stip, Berovo and Kicevo.²¹

In April, the Ministry of Health announced²² that the problem with the lack of a gynaecologist in the Municipality of Shuto Orizari had been permanently solved as an agreement was signed with a gynaecologist whose office had previously been equipped by the Ministry, and who would serve about 20.000 women.²³ The medical practice was nonetheless closed at the end of 2021, leaving the women in the municipality once again without appropriate medical care.²⁴

On June 16, the new kindergarten "8th of April", with capacity to accommodate 306 children, was officially opened in the Municipality of Shuto Orizari. An additional segment of the facility, which is yet to be completed, would be a Day Care Centre for children at risk.²⁵

The Ministry of Health announced that as of 12 July, a new vaccination centre was set up in the Municipality of Shuto Orizari, as a measure to make sure Roma are included in the COVID-19 mass vaccination programme.²⁶

In July, Roma MP Ljatife Shikovska submitted amendments to the Law on unregistered persons in the birth registry, which were adopted.²⁷ The amendments enabled: extension of the term of validity of the law for an additional year, i.e. until 2022; exercise of the right if the person needs to register his/her child who was born in a hospital or at home, that the parent/parents could not exercise in accordance with the law due to lack of documentation; and it stipulates that a person who is registered in the special birth register in accordance with the provisions of the law, after receiving an excerpt from the special birth register and identification document, in addition to the rights to education, health care, social protection and employment with compulsory social insurance, he/she can also exercise the right to an entry in the registry of births-deaths.²⁸

On July 26th, the Prime Minister marked the launching of a construction of an atmospheric sewer system in the Municipality of Shuto Orizari, undertaken in part with funds from TAV - concessionaire at the airports in North Macedonia.²⁹

On July 30th, the Government signed two Memoranda of Cooperation. The first one in the amount of 63.800 euros was concluded within the project "COVID – Emergency Interventions in the Municipality of Shuto Orizari", financially supported by the Office for Roma Initiatives within the Open Society Foundations – Berlin, referring to a donation of an ambulance vehicle for the needs of the Polyclinic in Shuto Orizari and the employment of two medics. The second Memorandum referred to the matching Fund of the Government, the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy, the Employment Agency and the Initiative for Economic Development of Roma – REDI, worth 2.5 million euros in the form of favourable credit lines for the unemployed and registered entities in order to create conditions for new employment, to support the formalization of the grey economy, as well as to encourage entrepreneurship in the Roma community.³⁰

On August 5th, the Ministry of Transport and Communications announced a *Public call* for the local self-government units to submit a request for use of funds for the implementation of communal infrastructure projects for Roma settlements, provided through the Programme for support of the implementation of the Strategy for Roma 2021 in the amount of 18.000.000 denars.³¹

At the October 2021 local elections, in addition to a Roma mayor in the municipality of Shuto Orizari, 21 Roma municipal councillors were elected, including 16 men and 5 women.³²

Several court cases related to Roma were resolved in 2021. On 16 June 2021, the European Roma Rights Centre (ERRC) informed that a court in Skopje had ruled that the Ministry of Health discriminated against Romani minors with drug addiction problems by not providing them with treatment or rehabilitation. The Ministry was ordered to adopt a specific treatment programme for child drug

users within three months of the judgment, after a case was brought on behalf of Romani children.³³

In October 2021, the Basic Criminal Court in Skopje passed a first instance verdict by which the police officer employed in Bitola was found guilty and sentenced to one year in prison for harassment in the performance of duty. The verdict relates an incident that occurred one year ago, when the police, as seen in the video released at the time, used force against a group of Roma, in front of the post office.³⁴ In response, on November 13 2021, the police unions and the citizens of Bitola protested against the verdict, demanding acquittal.³⁵

On 12 February 2021 the European Roma Rights Centre informed that the Government of North Macedonia would pay a total of €24,000 to the families of two Romani men who died under suspicious circumstances while in prison in 2017. The European Court of Human Rights (ECtHR) struck out the two cases after a settlement agreement was reached between the family members and the government.³⁶

In December 2021, the Commission for Protection and Prevention of Discrimination submitted a Request for inclusion in a court procedure to the Basic Civil Court Skopje as a friend of the court (amicus curiae) in a lawsuit of public interest for protection against discrimination. The lawsuit was filed by the Helsinki Committee for Human Rights against the Government of the Republic of North Macedonia, the Ministry of Education and Science, the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy, the Ministry of Health, the State Education Inspectorate, the Municipality of Bitola and the Municipality of Shtip, in order to determine that the defendants did not take measures to prevent the segregation of Roma children in the educational process.³⁷

Chapter 5. Information society, privacy and data protection

5.1 Legal and policy developments or measures that have been implemented related to data protection and private life with regards to security issues

The Republic of North Macedonia adopted the Law on the Ratification of the Protocol for Amendment of Convention for the Protection of Individuals with Regard to Automatic Processing of Personal Data. The Ratification Protocol was signed by the Republic of North Macedonia on 5 December 2019, whereas the law was adopted on 30 June 2021.³⁸

Within the remit of Covid-19 safeguarding measures, the Government issued **Executive decision No. 40-678/25 on COVID-19 certificate verification**. The Decision 40-687/25 required all vendors to verify either vaccination record or a negative test by individuals. In light of this decision, the **Personal Data Protection Agency** issued a **Statement** clarifying that the Decision 40-687/25 "is not in violation with the personal data protection legislation since only a visual verification is performed and no personal data is retained during such a verification, meaning it does not constitute 'processing of personal data' and consequently, the activity is out of the scope of the Law on Personal Data Protection".³⁹

By September 2021, there were **12 cases at the Administrative Court and 12 cases at the Highest Administrative Court** with regards to the protection of personal data. The cases concern proceedings against different state institutions or bodies, and in particular the Personal Data Protection Agency, in terms of disputing their decisions on whether there has been a breach of the data protection law. The vast majority of the judgments have been set aside by the courts as unfounded.

The **Personal Data Protection Agency**, within the remit of EU funded project 'Support for the implementation of the modernized legal framework for personal data protection' with the timeframe of 1 June 2021 – 31 August 2022, in consortium

Chapter 6. Rights of the child

6.1 Measures taken during COVID 19 to ensure the well-being of children living in poverty and the protection of children from violence

Measures to address the specific vulnerabilities of children living in poverty Roma children

The Ministry of Labour and Social Policy presented the results of the 15 year implementation of the project "Inclusion of Roma children in preschool education" which has assisted more than 5000 Roma children to attend kindergartens in the country with the support of the Roma Education Fund.⁴² In the school year 2020-2021, the project was implemented in 20 municipalities and covered a total of 120 children, with another 400 children to be included in 2021/2022.

UNICEF published a commissioned study "The social and economic effects of COVID-19 on children in North Macedonia – an update"⁴³, in which it determined that more than a quarter [27%] of families eligible to take advantage of the guaranteed minimum allowance are not utilising the assistance. The research also highlights that 19,000 children are below the relative poverty line. The study also assesses that the measures to deal with the social and economic consequences of the pandemic are rarely focused on children which can be seen from the budget planning for 2021. Challenges regarding access to education during remote learning have also persisted especially for vulnerable groups, such as children at risk of poverty, Roma children.

Having in mind that disinformation on the pandemic has severe impact on children and young people, WHO, UNICEF and the Ministry of Health have launched a Health buddy+ 44 mobile application which aims to provide access to up to date and verified information on COVID-19. 45

UNICEF also published a commissioned study measuring multidimensional child poverty in North Macedonia as a first effort of this kind in the country. 46 The study uses the Alkire-Foster

method in developing two age-specific (0-4 years and 5-17 years) child multidimensional poverty indices. The findings of the study indicate that in urban areas, the percentage of children who are multidimensionally poor and do not have adequate education is 6.9% for the group of 5 to 17 year old. Those who are multidimensionally poor and face problems in terms of their material situation in the group of 0-4 year olds is almost 5%. The study concludes that child poverty in urban areas can be significantly reduced by tackling education and material deprivation, while in rural areas a wider approach is needed by targeting multiple dimensions.

Measures to protect children from violence

The UNICEF study mentioned highlights that in the second quarter of 2020 the number of reported cases of violence increased by 14.7%. However, the reported cases have decreased since which may also be due to relaxation of movement restrictions. 25% of teachers in secondary schools and 18% in primary schools have also noticed that the pandemic and switching to distance learning has impacted the children's wellbeing, with children demonstrating anxiety and stress.⁴⁷

The Ministry of Education, in cooperation with the Ministry of Health, established a toll-free line for help and psychosocial support for parents, children and youth.⁴⁸ There are several CSO led toll-free lines operating for this purpose, primarily operated by the First children's embassy in the world Megjashi, the CSO Open Gate, the Crisis Centre Hope, the Macedonian Young Lawyers Association and the SOS Children's village.

The National Coordination Body, with the support of UNICEF, collected data on children victims of violence, abuse and neglect. Specific indicators have been determined for collecting data on reported children victims of violence in all sectors: education, health, social welfare and police. A protocol for action of the multisectoral teams for protection of children victims of violence was adopted and a revision of the Action Plan and digitization of data entry for children victims of violence was announced.⁴⁹

A new parenting helpline has been launched by the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy, the National Network To End Violence Against Women and Domestic Violence and UNICEF to provide support and counselling to parents and caregivers.⁵⁰

A new support centre for foster families has been opened by the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy to promote family based care for children without parental care and to ensure their best interest.⁵¹

Chapter 7. Access to justice

7.1 Legal and policy developments or measures relevant to the implementation of the Victims' Rights Directive and the EU strategy for Victims' Rights 2020-2025

In line with their Strategic Plan 2019-2021, the Ministry of Justice prepared the Law on Compensation for Victims of Crime. After being available for public comments, the draft law is parliamentary procedure as of 15.09.2021. 58 The Criminal Code has newly proposed amendments by the Government of North Macedonia which have been in parliamentary procedure since 15.09.2021. 59 The amendments broaden the definition of a "victim of a crime", including "a victim of gender-based violence, which includes every woman and girl up to 18 years of age against whom the crime was committed under those circumstances". Significant portion of the other amendments pertain to the alignment of the Criminal Code with the Istanbul Convention (see section 7.2. for more information on proposed amendments). Other amendments pertain to the crime of torture related violations determined by the ECtHR, expanding the personal scope of the provisions (such as understanding of potential perpetrators) and the scale of the punishments (increase in penalties and moving the bar for most severe penalties to minimum eight or ten years or a life imprisonment). 60

Like in the last two years, the Compensation Fund for Children Victims (established in 2014) for 2021 was set to MKD 1.000.000,00.⁶¹ The amendments to the Law on Justice for Children are still in preparation.⁶²

The new Code of Criminal Procedure is still in preparation within the working group at the Ministry of Justice. The foreseen changes are related to addressing the

victims' position and rights during the procedure of implementing the Victims' Directive.

Based on the GAP Analysis of the legislation and practice of victims' rights in the Republic of North Macedonia⁶³ with the EU Directive on victims' rights, support and protection of victims of crimes prepared by the Macedonian Young Lawyers Association, a policy paper⁶⁴ was also prepared including the detailed financial implications of the necessary legislation changes.

Through the Action "Preventing and Combating Human Trafficking in North Macedonia"⁶⁵ an expert discussion was organised within the framework of the second Human Rights Education for Legal Professionals (HELP) - anti-trafficking course in cooperation with the Academy for Training of Judges and Prosecutors. During the event, key findings and recommendations on the legal standing and rights of human trafficking victims in judicial proceedings, based on the analysis of judgments and Council of Europe standards, were presented and discussed with the participants.⁶⁶

7.2 Measures addressing violence against women

On January 27th 2021, the Assembly of the Republic of North Macedonia adopted the Law on Prevention and Protection against Violence against Women and Domestic Violence.⁶⁷ The Law entered into force on 6th of May 2021, and pursuant to Article 112, the law shall be applied after three months from its entry into force. Article 108 provides for all the bylaws to be adopted within three months of its

entry into force. By the end of November 2021, 4 bylaws were adopted by the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy⁶⁸ and the Ministry of Interior.⁶⁹

The Law on Prevention and Protection against Violence against Women and Domestic Violence is the first legislation in the country to address all forms of violence against women as previous legislation addressed only domestic violence. Article 3 specifically defines "Violence against women" (Paragraph 1) "Genderbased violence" (Paragraph 2) "Domestic violence" (paragraph 3) and "Intimate partner violence" (Paragraph 5). The Law is based on due diligence which guarantees help and protection to the survivors and prosecution of the perpetrators. For the first time in the system of protection from violence against women, reintegration of the victims of violence is introduced in Article 99, where through a special Programme for reintegration, the women survivors of any type of violence will be provided with temporary housing, psychological counselling with mentoring, various types of financial assistance specifically intended for women victims of violence, education and training opportunities in different areas, as well as employment measures determined by law. The competent institutions will be obliged to recognize the victims of violence as a special, vulnerable category and to develop programs and measures according to their specific needs. With this type of a reintegration program, women victims who left the violent surroundings will be able to ensure stable income, provide long term and safe homes for themselves and their children, which will prevent them from returning to the

abusive partners due to economic dependence, or enter a new abusive relationship. Moreover, this protects women and children against several social risks, most importantly, poverty and homelessness.

The implementation of the National Action Plan for Implementation of the Istanbul Convention (2018-2023) is on hold. The ministries have delayed the proposed activities for two consecutive years (2020 and 2021) and most of them have not adopted the corresponding Annual Operating Plans. This includes the Ministry of Labour, the Ministry of Interior, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Information Society and Administration, and the Ministry of Local Self-Government.⁷⁰ In October and November 2021 the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy adopted the five bylaws related to the NAP for Implementation of the Istanbul Convention. ⁷¹

In May 2021, the National Coordination Body for Prevention and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence was established, after 6 years without such a mechanism in the system of protection of women victims. ⁷² In 2021, the Coordination Body held two meetings. The main responsibilities of the Coordination Body are coordination of the work of all the institutions included in the field of prevention and protection against gender-based violence and domestic violence, as well as preparing and monitoring the implementation of national policies in this area. The Coordination Body also proposes measures to promote the prevention and protection against violence against women and domestic violence and monitors the implementation of the Istanbul Convention. The Body consists of representatives of the ministries of labour and social policy, justice, interior, health, and education and science, but also representatives of the civil sector, the Organization of Employers, and the Federation of Trade Unions.

On July 27th, 2021, the Government adopted the Proposal to amend the Criminal Code to bring it in line with the Istanbul Convention, pending parliamentary approval, one of the tasks for the Ministry of Justice as per the NAP 2018-2023.⁷³ The amendments include the definition of gender-based violence, harmonization of the elements of the crime of rape with the provisions in the Convention - namely introducing the concept of "consent" as incrimination criteria, as well as criminalization of stalking, sexual harassment, forced marriage, genital mutilation and more severe punishment for honour crimes.⁷⁴ In December 2021 the Parliamentary Committee on Equal Opportunities between Women and Men organised a public debate on the proposed amendments of the Criminal Code. The debate conclusions point that while the amendments are highly aligned with the Istanbul Convention, this is not fully the case with the criminal acts femicide and psychological violence.

The Government did not adopt any urgent measures related to COVID-19 for women victims of violence until May 2021.⁷⁵

Chapter 8. Developments in the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

8.1 CRPD policy & legal developments

Although the country ratified the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) in 2011, not much work has been done on its promotion. Decision-makers, as well as the general public, including the community of persons with disabilities, are not familiar with the existence of the CRPD as an international agreement.⁷⁶ A report of the Polio Plus Movement for Disability pending publication, determined that the Centres for social work as well as the CSOs which are providing services have not undergone any training considering

CRPD and have no information about this Convention.⁷⁷ National CSO research has shown that organizations offering free legal aid do not have sufficient capacity to communicate with persons with disabilities.⁷⁸

From the point of view of the CRPD, the Constitution and the existing legal framework are quite rigid, restrictive and discriminatory, burdened with derogatory terminology, which only reaffirms the medical approach to disability. The right to equality and non-discrimination is guaranteed with Article 9 of the Constitution of the Republic of North Macedonia, 79 where disability is not included as a separate basis for discrimination. According to the Constitution and the Electoral Code, citizens can be deprived of their voting rights by a court decision on the basis of intellectual or psychosocial disability, which is inconsistent with the international obligations and standards.⁸⁰ The constitution and other legislation use various terms for people with disabilities (invalid persons, invalids, persons with handicap, persons with special development needs, children with special needs, persons with mental impairments) and are not in accordance with the CRPD human rights approach.

The country has still not prepared any Disability Strategy and there is an ongoing debate as to who would initiate such a document. It has also not adopted an action plan on the implementation of the National Strategy⁸¹ for Deinstitutionalization (2018-2027).82

The new Law on Prevention and Protection against Discrimination is in accordance with the CRPD. The CPPD has been engaged in court proceedings as a friend of the court at the request of the Helsinki Committee for Human Rights concerning physical disability in the area of access to polling stations by providing explanations on the European case law and the relevant international treaties and Conventions.⁸³ The CPPD has issued four general recommendations in relation to the rights of persons with disabilities, elaborated below.

Strategy for Deinstitutionalization 2018-2027 "Timjanik" and the accompanying Action Plan. The process of deinstitutionalization is ongoing.

The Coalition *All for fair trials* in 2021 published a study devoted to the Legal, financial and physical access to justice in the national primary courts. The study is based on regular trial monitoring of more than 1200 court hearings in 10 primary courts and in 4 appellate areas in the country. The findings indicate that half of the courts subject to research do not have adequate access to their premises and services for persons with disabilities, nor do they have adequate conditions for their independent and unimpeded movement through the facilities, the possibility to properly adjust the notifications and ways of obtaining information, as well as systematized and organized approach to working with clients with disabilities.⁸⁴

In 2021 UNDP, in cooperation with the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy, promoted the first digital tool, the audio reader "Kiko" – a free application available in Macedonian, while its Albanian version is currently being developed.⁸⁵

Sign language is not recognized as an official language. Media programs are inaccessible to people with disabilities. Universal design as a standard is not recognized and framed in legal obligations. There is a lack of knowledge of the concept of accessibility and reasonable accommodation by all stakeholders.⁸⁶

The access to services and the access to community-based disability support services is based on the medical model of disability and its scope is not in accordance with CRPD. At the local level, the range of services is quite limited. Municipalities have no obligation to take measures to include disability through local statutes, strategies, policies and budgets. At the local level there are certain programmes, services for supporting people with disabilities, such as providing personal assistants, one-off financial support, scholarships, individual educational plans and etc. However, it is concerning that women and girls with disabilities are not a separate target group in any of the programmes or services.⁸⁷

According to the recommendations of the European Committee on the **Prevention of Torture** and Inhuman or Degrading Treatment and Punishment (CPT) published in 2021, in addition to the need for regular open air activities and increase of rehabilitation activities, all users of the Special Institution Demir Kapija, regardless of whether their legal capacity has been taken away from them, should be given an effective right to initiate a procedure on the legality of their accommodation and stay, and to provide regular and immediate review and revision of the accommodation decisions by the courts.⁸⁸ With the aim of improving the process of deinstitutionalization in the psychiatric hospitals in Demir

Hisar and Negorci, the CPT indicates the lack of adequate services for support of the mental health of the community. Limitations have been determined on the possibility for movement and open air activities of persons in the hospital in Demir Hisar and there are still cases of using restraints in both hospitals.⁸⁹

On the basis of a case filed by a prisoner with disability, the CPPD issued a general recommendation for the promotion and protection of the human rights and dignity of convicted persons with disabilities and respect for their physical and mental integrity whilst serving prison sentences.⁹⁰

The system of assessment according to the International Classification of Functioning (ICF) for children and young people up to 26 years of age has recently began with implementation. The state should establish an institutional framework for a common assessment system for all persons with disabilities, regardless of age, as there are currently 6 different Commissions for determining benefits by the State to people with disabilities.

The situation with **women and girls** with disabilities is highly concerning, as there are not enough services available for women and girls with disabilities who are victims of gender-based violence, women and girls with disabilities cannot decide for themselves, as well as women and girls with disabilities are not accepted in the environment in which they live.⁹¹ During the crisis with COVID-19, the situation of women and girls with disabilities in relation to gender-based and domestic violence worsened.⁹²

With the reforms undertaken in **education**, the state strives for all children with disabilities to be included in regular primary education. The state also provided financial resources for hiring educational assistants for children and youth with disabilities, through primary schools with a resource centre. The Law on Primary Education regulates the inclusion of educational assistants (EA) and personal assistants (PA). The Rulebook on EA and PA⁹³ as well as the lowering of the age limit for PA from 18 to 6 in the LPP confirms that the legislator does not have adequate knowledge of the concepts of EA and PA. A recently published UNDP study indicates that the personal assistants do not have a clear picture about their

obligations and responsibilities towards the students and other professionals.⁹⁴ Having in mind the insufficient capacities of the Centres for Functional Assessment and Support for Children and Youth, a larger number of children with disabilities were not covered with the functional assessment yet, in order for them to receive adequate support in the education process, in line with their individual needs.⁹⁵

Despite some positive reforms, the legal framework in the field of education still needs to be enhanced in line with the CRPD. The education infrastructure remains inaccessible, while stakeholder capacity is very low. The biggest number of children and young people who are deinstitutionalized, living with biological/foster families, or in a small group homes, are not part of any education schemes because the perception is that they cannot learn because they have "severe and profound disabilities" combined with "health problems". 96 In terms of participation and consultation, neither the OPD, nor persons with disabilities, children and young people with disabilities have been consulted at all.

The employment system does not offer opportunities for inclusion of persons with disabilities in the open labour market. The level of registration of the unemployed persons with disabilities is very low compared to the persons without disabilities. In order to be registered as unemployed, every person is obliged to appear in person at the premises of the Employment Agency, which are inaccessible for persons with disabilities. The people living in institutions, group homes and other organized forms of supported living, as well as adults with disabilities who attend day centres, are not registered in the Employment Agency.97 In its ongoing programme, the Government is trying to move to implement professional rehabilitation and active employment policies 98 The Government's plan is to start drafting a new Law on Employment of Persons with Disabilities in 2021 which will have a quota system and a new system for vocational rehabilitation.⁹⁹ The existing legal framework is discriminatory with regards to political participation and does not allow for effective participation in politics and public life. The differences within the disability community are not recognized and are not considered in the legislation, strategies, plans and budgets. The involvement of people with disabilities is exclusively noticeable in OPDs. The economic reforms and initiatives

by the Government in relation to COVID-19 did not include any measures for people with disabilities.

The initiatives undertaken by the State Election Commission (SEC)¹⁰⁰ have been supported exclusively by the international community even for the ongoing local elections, which is a serious shortcoming in terms of their continuous implementation and sustainability. The general public has negative perceptions about the persons with disabilities, and women with disabilities are especially vulnerable. Perceptions conducive to multiple discrimination are plentiful and they intersect between gender and disability, especially for women with multiple disabilities for whom only 2% would vote.¹⁰¹ The terminological apparatus is an additional obstacle. In the political programmes at the last parliamentary elections, persons with disabilities were mentioned 223 times¹⁰² with different terminology. There is a tendency to create new terms, such as "Mental developmental disabilities" or "special disabilities", "disability and special needs", etc. At the October 2021 local elections, five candidates with a disability ran for the position of municipal councillors, whereas there were none among the candidates for mayors.¹⁰³

In its October 2021 report on the local elections, ODIHR determines that "the last amendment of the Electoral Code does not address previous ODIHR recommendations that all restrictions on electoral rights on the basis of disability be removed and [it] remains inconsistent with international obligations and standards and no measures were introduced to facilitate access to the voter register for persons with disabilities, either online or in-person". The ODIHR observers also reported that "some 53 per cent of polling stations were not independently accessible for persons with physical disabilities, and in 26 per cent, the layout was not suitable for such voters. Nine per cent of polling stations observed did not have a Braille ballot frame for use by voters with visual impairments." In 2021, the CPPD determined discrimination in 2 cases related to electoral rights, on the grounds of disability and health condition. As a result, the CPPD has issued a general recommendation pointing out that SEC needs to take all necessary measures as soon as possible to ensure accessibility and

reasonable accommodation of polling stations to provide equal access to persons with disabilities to and from polling stations throughout the country. 106

The 2021 census of the population and households in North Macedonia did not foresee the inclusion of any of the WG sets¹⁰⁷, but a very limited version of the Washington Group on Disability Statistics' short set of questions (WG-SS), even though the country announced this would not be the case in its reply to the initial report of the Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities in 2018.¹⁰⁸ Furthermore, none of the ministries and other institutions included or consulted the ODPs on the census questionnaire. The OPDs and the Ombudsperson had several attempts to amend the set of questions through the Monitoring Body, but without any success.¹⁰⁹

During the COVID-19 crisis, the Government and the Ministry of Health overlooked the disability question. The practice of using sign language interpretation at the press-conferences related to the pandemic has been discontinued. Despite the reaction of OPDs and the Ombudsperson, accessibility has not improved, as information and public debates in the media are still in an inaccessible format, including the government web page and the emergency numbers opened for this purpose. The healthcare institutions are also inaccessible, including testing and vaccination centres. The measures for mandatory wearing of masks continue to impose additional limitations on deaf and hard of hearing persons. A 2021 study of the impact of COVID-19 on persons with disabilities concluded that the greatest difficulties that people with disabilities faced during the pandemic were limitations on socialising, i.e. meeting other people, (21.5 %) and limited movement (20.9 %), while 18.3 % faced difficulties

respecting the protection measures, i.e. maintaining physical distancing, avoiding groups and difficulties wearing a mask.¹¹¹

The tragic fire at the modular COVID hospital in Tetovo raised concerns about discriminatory treatment of patients with disabilities as a victim's relative disclosed to the media that he was asked to pay separately to the hospital staff to provide care to patients with disabilities. Following a reaction by the OPDs, the Ombudsperson and the CPCD stated they would look further into the matter.

The vaccination certificate requirement allowing access to closed places, in place as of 24.08.2021, affects persons with disabilities disproportionately since family doctors do not recommend vaccination for many of them, making it impossible to obtain a certificate, preventing them from living and moving independently. ¹¹³ In early December 2021, the CPPD issued a General recommendation highlighting the need for ensuring physical accessibility of the health facilities and vaccination places, and accessible information considering process of immunisation. ¹¹⁴

8.2 CRPD monitoring at national level

In July 2021, the National Coordination Body for the implementation of the CRPD adopted the Action Plan for Implementation of the UN CRPD, outlining legislative, policy, infrastructure and field measures that need to be implemented by 7 ministries. ¹¹⁵ In its general recommendation for the CRPD implementation in the domestic legislative framework ¹¹⁶, the CPPD advised the National Coordination Body to outline the obligations of all line ministries and to begin the process of

amendments to the existing legislation that will transpose the CRPD provisions in its upcoming 2022 Action Plan. The unit established in the Ombudsperson office for monitoring of the CRPD in July 2019 consists of three people, none of whom is a person with disability. Its establishment is a positive step in the UN CRPD implementation. The unit reached out to OPDs and CSOs to establish a National Monitoring Framework for strategic partnership between the Ombudsperson, as a national human rights institution, and the people with disabilities, OPDs, and civil society. The National Monitoring Framework was formally launched on 24 April 2021, with 17 organizations covering all forms of disabilities, to be joined by signing a Memorandum for Cooperation. There are no clear rules on the representativeness of OPDs and CSOs, nor procedures on how its members are appointed/dismissed. Two official meetings took place in 2021, with the support of the UN Resident Coordinator Office.

In terms of the independence of the monitoring mechanism, while the Ombudsman's National Preventive Mechanism and its Mechanism for Civic Control are established by law¹¹⁷, the unit for monitoring of the CRPD is not. The annual budget the monitoring mechanism receives is on par with those of the other two, but remains insufficient for fulfilment of its core role. ¹¹⁸

As a result of the Unit's efforts, children with disabilities successfully returned to in-person school attendance within the special education system, addressing the disproportionate impact COVID-19 had on children with disabilities. In cooperation with OPDs, the Unit has initiated requests for amending discriminatory legal provisions such as the exclusion of persons older than 65 years to obtain the disability allowance, or the requirement for certain membership in order to obtain state sponsored bus tickets, and regarding the full inclusion of the Washington Group sets of questions in the 2021 census.¹¹⁹

In terms of status and functioning, the established monitoring mechanism cannot be seen as independent under Article 33 of the CRPD. Additionally, its capacities need strengthening with additional human resources and with human rights-based knowledge, both highly prioritized by the staff of the mechanism.

Key facts of the case	The case concerns allegations of racially motivated police brutality in respect of the applicant of Roma origin represented before the Court by the European Roma Rights Centre (ERRC).
(max. 500 chars)	The incident occurred in 2013, when special police units conducted a raid using force which the ERRC described at the time as "excessive and arbitrary." Around 50 police officers used force against Roma on 5 May, indiscriminately targeting individuals, including women, in the course of the operation in order to find a single suspect. Roma from the Topana neighbourhood told the ERRC that officers forcibly entered several Romani houses and local shops without providing any explanation; harassing and pushing people, often in the presence of children. Roma reported that police officers kicked and punched them with fists and police batons. Around ten Romani individuals were beaten up, including three women. The Romani man in question was in a shop at the time when police burst in and attacked him. He was kicked and punched by a large group of police officers, who also shouted racial insults at him. The ERRC helped him to go directly to the public prosecutor and file a complaint. Years later, this complaint was still pending with no indication that it would ever be investigated. The ERRC brought three cases at once: two before the domestic civil court against the national police and against the public prosecutor, and one before the European Court of Human Rights.

Main reasoning/argumentati on

(max. 500 chars)

The applicant maintained that his case should be examined in view of the "general climate of institutional anti-Gypsyism within Macedonian law enforcement". Given the absence of any evidence that he "had been involved in the riot or had represented a threat to the security of police officers", the use of force by the police had been arbitrary. The following factors demonstrated that he had made out a prima facie case of having been a victim of discriminatory police brutality: his injury during "the unusually large-scale police raid in a well-known Roma neighbourhood"; the entire context and the "extreme nature" of the police intervention of 5 May 2013; the fact that he had been arrested in a nearby shop after the police had arrested the fugitive; the racial slurs used by the arresting officers; and the information about the alleged police abuse of Roma in the respondent State contained in the reports by intergovernmental bodies (see paragraph 28 above). In addition, the Government had failed, for their part, to submit that similar raids had occurred in non-Roma neighbourhoods or that the investigation of alleged ill-treatment of non-Roma was "similarly slow and inconclusive". The applicant also referred to Roma-related cases before the Court against the respondent State and invited it to draw conclusions on that basis.

Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)

The evidence in this case showed yet again that the Macedonian police, rather than protecting the rights of Romani people, are engaged in a pattern of institutional discrimination and violence against Roma. This case contains two of the most common failures of law enforcement in policing Roma across Europe: racist violence and lack of an effective investigation. These are the most visible and most common manifestations of antigypsyism throughout Europe.

Results (sanctions) and key consequences or implications of the case (max. 500 chars)

The European Court of Human Rights has ruled in favour of a Romani man who was physically assaulted by police officers in a racist attack during a violent raid in Topana, a Romani neighbourhood of Skopje, North Macedonia. The Court's judgment found that the state authorities were in violation of Article 14 read in conjunction with Article 3 of the Convention on account of their failure to investigate the applicant's allegations of racially motivated police brutality. The Court ordered the State to pay the applicant EUR 3,000 within three months.
