April 16. On Thursday last came to Town some of the People who were at the Engagement with the Cherokees on Catawba River, and confirm most of the Particulars of that Affair; they further inform us, that the Number of Indians was forty, and the white People thirty. None of the latter were killed. Several of the dead Bodies of the Indians have been found in the Woods by different fcouting Parties. Nineteen of the Indian Scalps were ready to be fent down when those Pcople came away. At the Time when this Engagement happened, Col. Waddel was at Fort Dobbs, about 27 Miles N. E. from the Place; the Indians that escaped, and some others, attacked the said Fort, but were repulled; and it is believed, that of all the forty Indians, not more than one is left alive, or will get back to the Nation. One of the Indians that was shot had no less than six green white Scalps, which the white People have now in their Possession.

BOSTON, April 21.

In our last we mentioned one of the New-York Packet-Boats being taken, but uncertain whether she was going to or from that Place; since which Captain Gilbert came to Town from Cape-Anne, and informs, that the was taken to the Westward of the Western-Islands by a French Privateer, and not by a Frigate, as was reported; that there was on board her two English Officers Passengers, and a confiderable Quantity of Indigo; fo that there is now no Doubt but she was bound from New-York: By him we also learn, that Capt. NEW-YORK, April 28.

By Captain Doake we are informed, that a Fleet of 36 Line of Battle Ships, besides Frigates, lay ready to sail from Spithead, with a Body of Troops on board 195 Sail of Transports, which were to be under their Convoy, supposed to be destined for the Coast of France: What Admirals and Generals were to have the Charge of this Armament, was not publicly known when the Lizard sailed: That 26 Ships of War were to sail up the Baltic, in order to deter the Russians from acting with much Vigour this Year against his Prussian Majesty: That 15,000 Troops sailed from Spithead for Germany, under Convoy, 9 Days before the Lizard did: And further, that 5 Ambassadors had lately arrived at the Court of London, in order to try to negociate for a Peace; but it was affured their Efforts on that Head would not take Place, this Year especially. We are also informed by Capt. Doake, that his Majesty's Ship Arundel, of 20 Guns, had taken a French Frigate of 36 Guns, which came from the Mississippi, and was bound to Old-France, very richly laden with Fur, Skins, and other Effects. She was taken 15 Leagues West of the Lizard, a few Days before the Lizard Frigate failed. The greatest Preparations ever known were making in all the Ports of Great-Britain for a vigorous Profesution of the War, and there was a hard Press for Seamen, and new Levies were raising with Speed for the Land

Wednesday last was sent in here by the Privateer Ship Duke of Cumberland, James Lilly, Commander, the Polacca St. Francis, Francis Dennis, Commander, from Cape-François, bound from Nantz; a Letter of Marque, having 10 Guns, and 25 Men.
