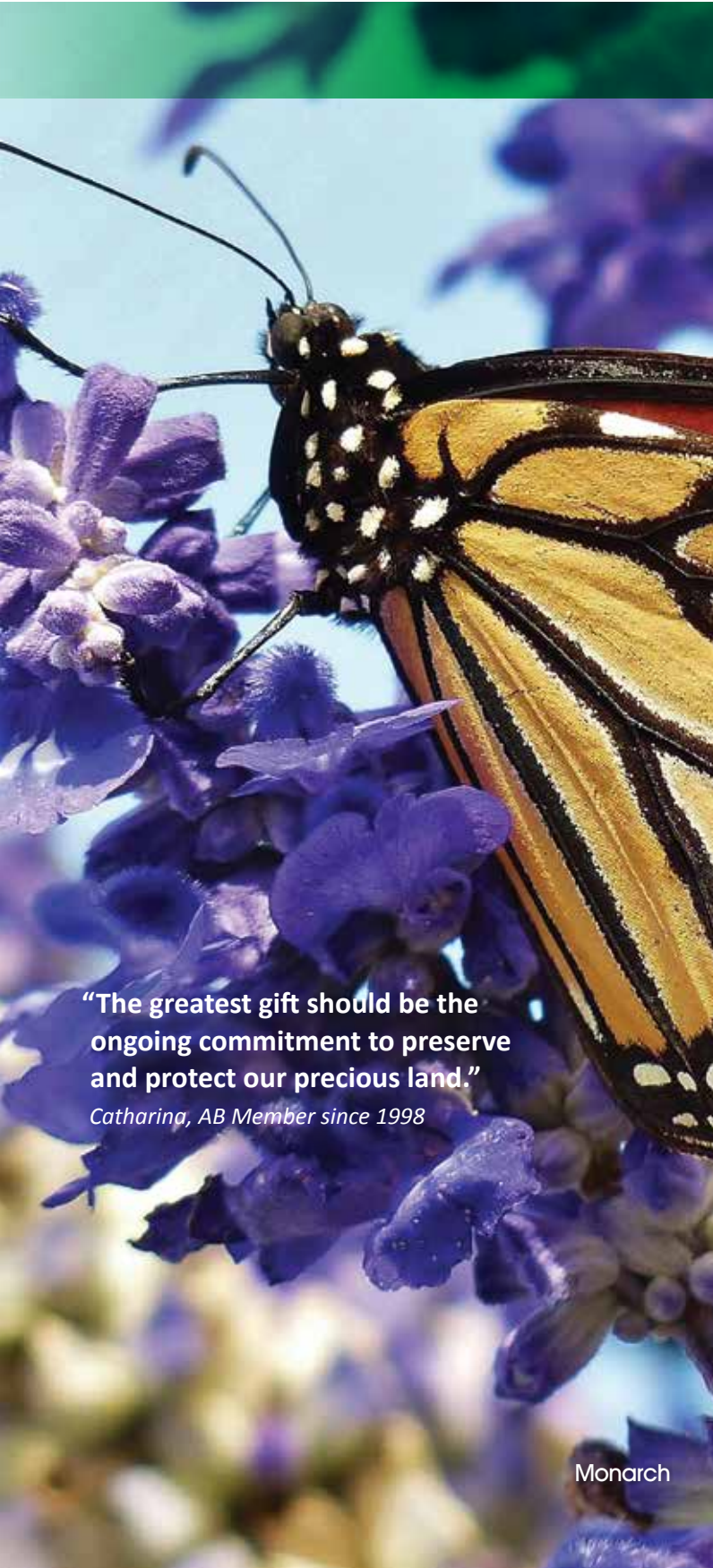

CELEBRATING OUR VICTORIES FOR NATURE

Nature is worth it! Canadians are calling for more Protected Areas coast to coast to coast. Canadians overwhelmingly want greater protection for natural areas and the stunning abundance of life they support. And this is more urgent than ever.

Species loss globally is accelerating at an alarming rate. In Canada, more than 600 species are now at risk, including the iconic Southern Resident Orca, Woodland Caribou and Swift Fox. Thank you for raising your voice to protect this critical habitat and the endangered species that call it home.

This year, tens of thousands of Canadians raised their voice for nature protection. We won't stop building this movement to demand federal investments in protected areas and Indigenous-led conservation and stewardship initiatives.

You are ensuring that our government keeps its commitment to the biggest nature protection initiative in Canadian history: protecting 25% of land and oceans by 2025, and 30% by 2030. Here are recent key victories for nature we can celebrate together:

Species loss globally is accelerating at an alarming rate. In Canada, more than 600 species are now at risk,

Great News for Grasslands! The Prairie Grasslands in Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta contains some of the most endangered landscapes on Earth. Over the past decade, thousands signed Nature Canada's petitions to protect this Canadian jewel which has critical habitat for at least 13 federally listed species at risk. Now, three pastures (Govenlock, Nashlyn, and Battle Creek) will finally be transferred for formal protection! This land exchange will allow the federal and provincial governments to work with the ranching community to conserve and protect prairie grasslands in those pastures. These heritage ranch lands provide habitat for species at risk like Greater Sage Grouse, Mountain Plover, and the Pronghorn Antelope. Thank you for raising your voice!

Super news for the South Shore! The Ontario government announced their intention to designate two key areas in Prince Edward County as Ontario Conservation Reserves. This move creates hope for the future of over 30 at-risk species in the area, including the Blanding's Turtle, Monarch Butterfly, Eastern

Whip-poor-will, Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, and Short-eared Owl. It is home to a globally-recognized Important Bird Area (IBA), filled with migratory birds who stop over on the shoreline and 298 bird species alone have been recorded at Prince Edward Point over the years. While we celebrate this critical step forward, we will make sure that the provincial government follows through with a strong management plan for the South Shore that will protect this incredible nature for generations to come.

While we celebrate the good work on these critical areas, there are other pressing campaigns including the Pacific DeepSea Oasis, Roberts Bank and Fraser Delta in British Columbia and achieving long overdue protected areas in Newfoundland. Defending wildlife and protecting wilderness is a top priority for Nature Canada's members like you.

Thanks to you, this has been an incredible year for protecting marine and terrestrial places in Canada!

DEFENDING BIRDS AT RISK

Canadian bird populations are in trouble. Nature Canada has been leading efforts to recover aerial insectivores, grassland birds and shorebirds.

Our campaign to support Swallows involves replacing housing, engaging naturalists to steward key roosts, and promoting bird-friendly practices in rural south Ontario. We are launching our Urban Bird Program that will support citizens and cities to become more bird-friendly and deal with threats such as window collisions, cats and habitat destruction.

Nature Canada worked alongside the Cree Nation of Wemindji, Moose Cree First Nation and the Lac Seul First Nation in Northern Ontario and Quebec to track shorebirds and identify key bird habitat in their homelands. The important work helps to protect key landscapes vital for sustaining culture, livelihoods and rich biodiversity critical to the whole planet.

ENVIRONMENTAL LAWS UPDATE

We took on upholding the need for environmental assessments and protection for offshore oil & gas development in Newfoundland and proposed coal mining expansions in Alberta and British Columbia. Despite COVID 19, our members strongly believe we must stand up for strong environmental laws to protect our air, lands and species.

COLLABORATING TOGETHER

The Nature Based Climate Solutions Summit held in March 2020 was a momentous occasion. Over 450 participants from across all levels of government, Indigenous leaders & nations, conservation and climate nonprofits, foundations, funders, farmers, labour unions, and industry associations participated in this Summit — clearly demonstrating widespread support for bold government investment and action on nature-based solutions to climate change.

In the words of our Board Chair, Bob Peart: *“Champions for nature spoke hopefully about how we can reduce our use of carbon and control pollution. They provided many examples of nature’s remarkable resiliency against seemingly insurmountable odds when given a chance.”*

Now is the time for more action on both climate and biodiversity solutions as we look to a green and just recovery in Canada.

ENGAGING WITH NEARBY NATURE

Connecting kids with the wonders of nature is vital — for the kids and for nature! This past year, our partners engaged 16,036 individuals and hosted 281 school and community groups and 97 public events. Thank you to members and funders for their continued investment in this innovative programming. We are proud of the work our local partners achieved to reach communities that are marginalized and racialized, and to deliver innovative programming that met the language, culture, and socio-economic needs of their communities.

Given the COVID-19 pandemic, this past spring Nature Canada worked hard to quickly pivot our World Migratory Bird Day to virtual celebrations and activities. Almost two dozen nature organizations joined us in celebrating the day through virtual events — utilizing

Nature Canada’s outreach toolkit to engage Canadians to take action locally for birds.

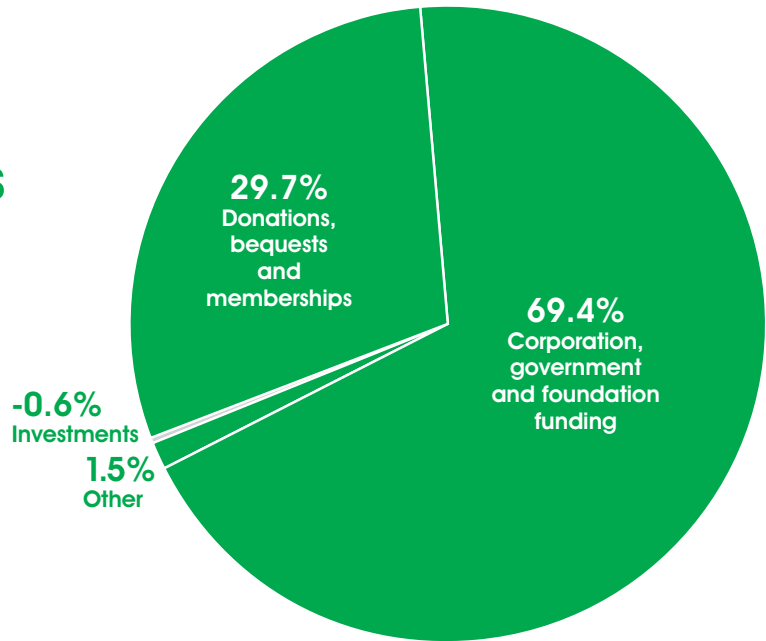

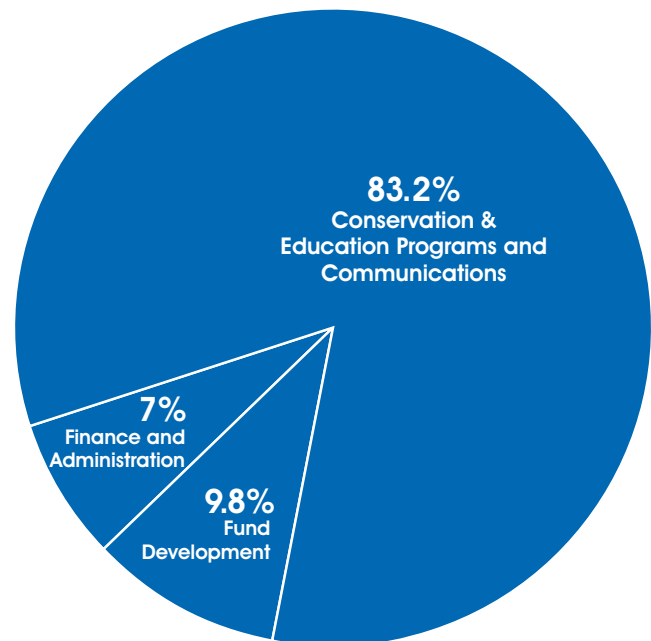
Nature Canada revenue for year ending in March 31, 2020
