





He received a master of music in opera performance from the Boston Conservatory and a bachelor of music in vocal performance from Drake University. Ferring was a resident artist at Pittsburgh Opera for the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 seasons, appearing as Spoletta in Tosca, Basilio and Curzio in The Marriage of Figaro, and Flask in Moby Dick. He also was a 2017 apprentice singer at the Santa Fe Opera where he will return in 2020 for a major role debut. Ferring has been seen at Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Wolf Trap Opera, and Seagle Music Colony. In 2015, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis presented Ferring with a career award, given in recognition of his great vocal potential. This past season at Lyric Opera, Ferring performed the Young Servant in Elektra and Giuseppe in La traviata.

Ferring is a former voice student of Kristen Eby, assistant professor of music at UD.

"It's thrilling when a student goes on to such success, and it's especially exciting for him to come back and share his developed gift with his home community," Eby said. 2016 national semifinalist in the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. Toomey debuted at Lyric Opera as the First Lady in The Magic Flute. In 2018-2019, Toomey sang the Fifth Maid in Elektra.

Rivera, a native of Puerto Rico, is a first-year Ryan Opera Center member. He has participated with the American Masters' of Opera Academy in Moscow and appeared with the International Vocal Arts Institute in Tel-Aviv. In 2018-2019, Rivera sang Schaunard in La bohème and Baron Douphol in La traviata at Lyric Opera.

Pianist Madeline Slettedahl, of Seattle, Washington, is a second-year Ryan Opera Center member. She debuted at Carnegie Hall in January 2017. Slettedahl has served on the Lyric Opera music staff for The Pearl Fishers. In 2018-2019, she helped prepare the company's new production of Siegfried.

Vintage Torque Fest is not the typical car show. This is a festival that brings together people from around the country that have a passion for keeping the traditions of the past alive. The event supports one family each year, but they also do other stuff throughout the year, from flying a family to treatment or sadly, supporting a funeral if needed. But mainly, it's about saving little lives while celebrating vintage car culture.

Vintage Torque Fest returns to the Dubuque County Fairgrounds on Friday, May 3 from noon through midnight and Saturday, May 4 from 8 a.m. through... who knows when?

"Last year was absolutely a dream year," says
Torque Fest's creator and head gear-head, John Wells.
"The last two years had the best weather we could
ever ask for, so for the past two years it's grown. If it
keeps going, I don't know where we're going to put
everybody. We have the whole place packed, and
there's something going on anywhere you go."

This show isn't about just looking at cool rides, it's about DRIVING them! Hot rods are allowed to

make exhibition laps on the dirt track. While hundreds of amazing cars and motorcycles will be on display across the Dubuque County Fairgrounds site, feature cars and motorcycles will be inside the buildings. Vendors will be in the different buildings selling hot rod merchandise to the masses. You simply must witness demolition drags on the race track. Yeah, it's exactly what you think it is: drag racing and a demolition derby all smoked together... literally!

This year they're also going to pay homage in a recreation of the historic Race of Gentlemen, where they race pre-WWII cars on the beach in New Jersey. "So guys are coming from the East Coast to recreate that idea here on the track," explains John Wells, "And Mitch O'Connell, a well-known artist in the underground scene, has always dreamed of having an art car demolition derby. So we are going to be incorporating his art cars into our demo drag racing. He just asked that one person wear a jester outfit. We're working on that! You can expect more motorcycle racing this year on the track including pre-war flatheads, and there will be a mini bike parade around the grounds which people will love. We're always coming up with something new and different."

If you are expecting to come to Torque Fest and see people lined up behind their cars in fold up chairs... well...this is not the show for you. There are stages of music, an art show, swap meet, vendors, indoor theater, and a dirt track with different exhibitions to get everyone on their feet and moving around. You will





find that you had a much richer experience than a stale, old car show.

With all of the amazing rides, art and kustom kulture at the event, you might lost sight of the fact that there is no other event in Dubuque all year with more live music that Vintage Torque Fest. It may even be twice as big as the next music festival, with 19 live bands playing on multiple stages throughout the weekend. Just the great kind of rockabilly, punk, surf, and outlaw country that you would dream of finding at a show like this, just way more of it. With bands like Big Sandy & His Fly-Rite Boys, Superchief, Hot Rod Walt and the Psycho Devilles, Cherokee Astro, 3 On The Tree, and the Surf Zombies, you know it's going to rock!

"A lot of people don't realize the music aspect of the show and how big it is," shares Wells. "Vintage Torque Fest is Dubuque's largest music festival with the number of bands. It's niche with roots Americana, rockabilly and so forth, but it appeals to a lot of people through great pre-Bristish-invasion musical styles. We have 19 bands from California, Maryland, Arkansas, Texas, Atlanta, GA and more playing on three stages around the festival. I'm particularly excited to see a band called Native Howl on Friday night. They call their style thrash grass. So they're like metal guys who play bluegrass, with stellar technical ability and tons of energy. It's a rain or shine event. The bands from California are already paid, man, so come on out and support this great slate live music we invested in for you."

"The pin-up girls contest gets the most attention of any stage show all weekend. There are 800 people gathered around to see it. We give away over \$1,000 cash to the girls, and so many other sponsors give away photo

shoots, clothes, accessories, etc. It's also one of the bigger pin-up contests in the region. It's also a very classy contest.

Not trashy at all. Think Rita Haworth and Myrna Loy. It's those throwbacks to the '40s and '50s when seeing a knee was a big deal. We're very family-friendly."

The art auction is not just great way to take home some killer custom original artwork but also a chance to see in person what this even is all about... the family served by the proceeds.

"We always want to have the family that we are helping at the show if possible. That way it's a connection right there. You can see who we're helping. And even if you don't want to give us any money to give to them, you can just walk right up and give them a donation. You know it's going to the family. We've raised over \$50,000 so far, and we hope to raise \$100,000 by 2020."

Before the show gets rolling on the weekend, there will be a cruise on Friday at 3 p.m. from the fairgrounds to Potosi Brewery and Museum in Potosi, WI.

The Julien Dubuque International Film Festival, set for April 24–28, has extended the festivities to cover five days. More than 20 features, 20 documentaries and 70 shorts were named Official Selections this year and will be screened at 10 venues in downtown Dubuque. There were more than 700 submissions from over 50 countries, including Germany, the United Kingdom, Japan, Cuba, and New Zealand.

While people flock to Dubuque from around the country and beyond, it's often native Dubuquers that are hardest to convince that, YES, this is for you, you are invited, and you will have a good time!

"There's no certain crowd that can enjoy a festival," says Festival Director, Susan Gorrell. "If you enjoy films and like going to the movies, then you'll love the festival. It's five days of just that: films! And all kinds of films: horror, thriller, comedy, drama, family, documentaries, and shorts! It's amazing how much can be packed into a short, even one under five minutes. But what makes a film festival different than the movie theater, is you get the opportunity to meet the filmmaker after watching their film. You get to ask questions, as majority of the films showing at the festival have Q&As following with either the director, producer, an actor, or all. Then there's evening events for everyone. Time to mingle, let loose, and just enjoy meeting people from all over the world that have come to the festival."

So now that we've convinced you that this is something you simply do not want to miss, Susan has some tips on how to get your feet wet in the film festival atmosphere.

"The first thing I would highly suggest to anyone that is new to the festival is to attend the Welcome Mingle at Five Flags on Wednesday night. This is a great time to review the program guide and films, ask questions, and meet some of the filmmakers ahead of time.

"During the day on Wednesday we are showing some films, so also a great time to check a few out before things get really crazy as the week progresses and before the weekend.

"Also, download our app. Everything you need to know is on the app, and it makes it easy to pick out your films. You can even mark them as your favorites. Create your watch list.

"Stop by the Hotel Julien Dubuque lobby and ask anyone wearing a blue shirt that says Volunteer how the festival works. Runde Auto Group free day on Thursday is a great opportunity to check out a few films, without an expense, to see what you really like. I guarantee you'll come back the other days as well to check out more films.

"And lastly, short films are always a great way to get a taste of independent film. You can see a favorite of films in one short block."

As Susan mentioned, the eighth annual festival begins Wednesday with a full day of film screenings and a Welcome Mingle event from 6 to 8 p.m. at Five



Flags Center. Thursday is again Runde Auto

Group Free Day, so all film screenings are free that day. While the film are new each year, in its eighth year, keeping the festival itself fresh is always a challenge.

"The films are always new, as every year film-makers have to actually submit to the festival and then we screen and score to pick the top films that are shown here. So that's the easy part. The hard part is creating new events, panels, and workshops that not only our guests can enjoy, but the community can as well. It's always fun thinking of new ideas that would be of interest to everyone."

"This year is something totally new: a bowling party! But it fit the theme of the special Friday night film, which is about saving a bowling alley. And then to make it even more fun, why not invite the band from the movie to actually play at our very own Diamond Jo Casino Cherry Lanes—so I did! That creates excitement and fun! The festival is not only films, but it's fun."

On Thursday the festival will welcome the Canadian Consulate for its Celebrate Canada night from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. at Five Flags Theater. There will be a Canada-sponsored film and a Q&A with the filmmakers. The after party will be at 9:30 p.m. at Hotel Julien Dubuque's Riverboat Lounge and will feature live music by The Lonely Goats.

Friday will include two special screenings from Shoreline Entertainment including *Innocent Kiss*, which stars Burt Reynolds, and *Elijah & the Rock Creatures*, a science fiction film from Canada.

Friday evening's activities have been dubbed Flick, Block & Bowl, and will begin with a red carpet screening of *When Jeff Tried to Save the World*, which stars Jon Heder. Heder played Napoleon in the 2004 indie comedy *Napoleon Dynamite*.

There will be a Q&A session with the director and producer, as well as to-be-announced cast and crew members, following the film. Tickets to the screening, held at the Five Flags Theater, are \$10 in advance and \$15 at the door. Doors open at 4:30 p.m.

After the screening, filmgoers can walk down to the JDIFF Block Party. This free street party, held from 6 to 10 p.m., will feature beer gardens and two bands on Main St. between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>. Almost Classy will take the stage at 6 p.m. and Arzalez will begin at 8 p.m. The event is sponsored by American Trust.

The party will then move to Diamond Jo Casino's Cherry Lanes with cosmic bowling from 10 p.m. to 1 a.m. Tickets are \$20 in advance or \$30 at the door. There are a limited number of tickets available for this package, which includes free bowling, shoes, food, and music by JC Brooks Band, which is featured in *When Jeff Tried to Save the World*. Saturday will again feature the Awards Night ceremony at Five Flags Theater, recognizing the best films of the festival. The show will be from 8 to 9:30 p.m. and include musical performances by Arzales, Caroline Curtis, and more. The Awards After Party, set for 9:30 p.m. to midnight at the Five Flags, will feature complimentary food by East Mill Bakery and music by Ceili Rain.

The fest's final day, Sunday, is Kid's Day. From 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., The Belltower, The Scene Studio, and Creative Adventure Lab will entertain kids with free workshops at Creative Adventure Lab. That night, the festival will come to a close with a screening of the film *F.I.S.T.*, which starred Sylvester Stallone and was filmed in Dubuque. Since Susan began managing the film festival, this is the first time she has tapped into the Dubuque's history of film.

"This is the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of that film, so what better way to celebrate that than to screen it right where it was filmed. I can't take all the credit with *F.I.S.T.* though. One of our amazing fans of the festival, Greg Hamilton, who is also a JDIFF juror and writer for *MovieMaker Magazine* suggested doing this special event for the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. He comes to the festival every year and loves Dubuque. So applause to Greg for helping organize this fun screening. We are collecting a lot of great memorabilia and stories. It should be a great evening."

## THE OTHER SIDE

It's always a special treat to discover magical food spots that most people don't know about, and the Other Side in East Dubuque, IL certainly fits the bill. It's a dive bar and doesn't pretend to be anything else. But it's also a special place because its owner, Mike Meyer, loves what he does, and lately, what he does is cook good food.

Mike and his sister, Michelle Mulgrew, cut their teeth cooking at Julien Inn (now known as Hotel Julien Dubuque) as teenagers back in the day, and somehow the stress of wedding banquets and packed Sunday mornings in the Alte Glocke didn't burn them out.

From day one after opening his bar in East Dubuque in 2000 (across the street from where it is now) Mike has been cooking food for Cubs games and specials events at the bar and just giving it away to loyal patrons. Meyer says that Tom Bertjens from Valet Foods taught him everything he needed to know about smoking meats in large quantities. Mike wasn't doing it for a business then, just as a favor for friends. Mike was they guy people called when they had a special food needed for a party or an event.

"The health department called and said I needed a food license to sell food. But I wasn't selling anything. I was cooking it for other people for free. So it was legal, but we opened a place across the street in 2006 and got the license to starting doing catering for real."

Three years after Mike opened, his dad, who was a longtime owner of the Hi-Hat Bar in Dubuque (and East Dubuque before that), closed his bar (now The Hub) and said he wanted to come work for Mike. Mike was already turning the back room into a motorcycle bar. Halfway through the remodel, they changed direction and his dad opened a country bar with live country music every Friday and Saturday, and it was packed all the time. It was a great father-son partnership,

"Until 2010 when my dad had a stroke, the food thing was something we did for fun on the side, not for a real business. The nighttime bar business was where the money was."

With the growth of the East Dubuque Cruisin' Thursdays car shows, so too did Mike's famous buffets start to grow.

"The classic car shows started about 10 years ago, and we started doing slices of pizza when the bar was across the street. When we came over to this location, I thought 'what about a meal?' We started serving 150 people each car show off a cobbled together buffet of roasters and crockpots. And the health department came again and said 'you can't really do it that way.' So we made the investment in a real buffet table and up to last year, we've been serving 200 people every Thursday night at the car shows."

With that overwhelming success, Mike was led to wonder if he could repeat that more often with consistent lunch buffets and specials. "I bought the property nextdoor to expand the bar eventually and thought that would be a good place for a kitchen. One day we were siting here watching a Cubs game, and I said 'let's go,' and we started cutting holes in the wall and wham, we had a kitchen!"

"I knew I wanted to do comfort foods like you'd get for dinner at home and serve them for lunch."

Very affordable, fast, good food for working people. And since July 2018, that's exactly what Mike and Michelle have been doing. With each passing week, they keep getting more and more adventurous. That's how 365ink took note. We started lunching there after we saw Mike posting photos of the specials they were running. It wasn't just goulash and beef tips and noodles (which

are great too), but we were seeing photos of Korean beef short ribs with cauliflower t, ahi tuna steaks, quiche lorraine, and even beef wellington. Not even kidding. And the prices are simply stupid. We've never seen a lunch special over \$8. That includes the short ribs and the Friday seafood buffet. It feels like robbery actually. Someone needs to tell this guy how to turn a profit already!

"It's fun to learn to do those things and have people double take a say 'at the Other Side?... THAT'S what they're doing?'" That was our exact response as well. We've been back a good dozen times since our first trip this winter. Like many, we follow Mike Meyer and the Other Side on Facebook (facebook.com/OSINEAST) and can see photos of what the lunch specials will be either the day before or earlier the day of, decided it that's something were want to go try, or go have again. You could also call for the specials. It's like a fun surprise each day to see what's in store. Often it's simple, familiar, hearty, comfort foods in large quantities, like a pasta buffet with numerous sauces and meats to accompany a couple varieties of pasta plus veggies and bread—all you can eat, of course. But other times it's plated chicken marsala, chicken cordon bleu, or fish tacos. Or a choice between things like stuffed peppers or carbonara with pancetta or how about either beer battered cod and mac and cheese or, get this, "Atlantic salmon, stuffed with seafood, carrot, squash and zucchini with a vegetable salad of broccoli, cabbage, Brussels sprouts, kale, chicory, dried cranberries, roasted pumpkin seeds and a poppy seed dressing." I know, It's nuts. At least it's nuts being served this bellied up to the bar in a dive bar. And we love it.

"Anytime we do big steak things and seafood stuff is extra fun for me. When I go out to eat, I

order stuff I can't make. I want to learn how to make those things now and serve them in a dive bar."

Eventually Mike would like to able to offer big Sunday buffets that are a destination for people, but he's still working up to that.

During Lent, the Friday seafood buffet has been doing killer business. During our visit, it was an all-you-can-eat spread that had beer battered cod, fried catfish and shrimp as well as baked salmon plus both seafood chowder and lobster bisque. Plus seafood pasta, lasagna, potatoes, vegetable medley, french fries, and rolls. And it was eight freaking dollars.

"When you learn in a traditional place, its all about consistency with a set menu, and we have menus, but I think the fun part for me and what keeps me wanting to do it all the time is learning to cook new things. Just from working in the kitchen nonstop for a year and being confident, everything is just better and better each time we serve it. "

"You are going to be judged by every person now. When you're putting out a roaster and it's free, nobody cares. They just eat their food and watch the game. When you serve lunch and serve each person individually, you notice everything. I see what comes back. Do they not eat vegetables or do they not like these vegetable? I worry and second guess myself. But it's a learning thing, and mostly I need to stop stressing about that."

Mike should worry less. If he's getting food back it's probably because people just can't eat it all. But they do seem to love it. Occasionally people will see the special, call ahead and order so many to go that he sells out before the lunch rush hits. But it's ok. He has a menu too, sort of. Well, we never saw one, but he said one exists.

In truth, you can just tell him what you're hungry for and he can probably make it for you. Seriously! They actually sell more pizzas than anything, and people love them. They have coney dogs that are made from the famous recipe given to them by Louie Mihalakis at the old Airport Inn where they were legendary. They also have Chicago-style hot dogs everyday, Italian beef, wings, and appetizers, "and people always say they can't believe how good our burgers are." But if you really want an omelette at 4 p.m., just ask. If Mike has time, you'll get one.

For years the Other Side opened from 11 p.m. to 3 a.m., just four hours for the bar crowd. So this is

very different. Now they are open 11 a.m. to 3:30 a.m. everyday. The bar really has two lives: lunch and night-time. There are some very stern, even rude service signs behind the bar that are so no-B.S. that they are funny. They're not crude or vulgar, but they are for real. But they are also for the 2 a.m. crowd and were well-earned by years of drunk and disorderly patrons. The service you get at lunch is decidedly different. But still, never order a long island iced tea at the Other Side or it will cost you \$20. Why? Because it's a complicated drink and only rude drunks order them when the bar is very busy. Ha!

Before 9 p.m., kids are actually welcome, and during events like the car shows, they get tons of kids. In fact, for the car show buffet, they don't even charge kids to eat. That's how loose and easy going things are at the Other Side. And the car show buffets are huge. They're impressively long.

Mike seems to have a problem charging people for his food. They aways have customer appreciation on Tuesdays with free t-shirts and a free buffet. Yeah, you heard right. Free food on Tuesdays at the Other Side except on holidays. Most places have customer appreciation events once a year, the Other Side does it once a week. Mike was recently told that they've given away over 44,000 t-shirts since they started the tradition. For Fat Tuesday, they ship in crawdads to boil, and they served alligator on New Year's.

"It's kind of like the casinos; we look at food as loss leaders. If we can break even on some of these food events and lunches where the price we charge is a wash, it's an investment in growing our business and getting new people to come in to a dive bar in East Dubuque. Our goal is creating new customers. And then when we do the big things, like our New Year's event, it's \$50 but the people know what kind of quality they're going to get for their money."

Mike is also insanely active in the promotion of the East Dubuque community, working with the East Dubuque Greater Events Foundation (EDGE), the East Dubuque Lions Club, Warriors Booster Club, and more to create events, raise funds, and promote the general betterment of the city. If there's a major event happening in East Dubuque, Mike and the Other Side are probably supporters or organizers.

The bar is open from 11 a.m. to 3:30 a.m. everyday. You will find a new lunch special 11 a.m.-2 p.m., Monday

through Friday. There's the free buffet on Tuesdays, the classic car show buffet every Thursday night from May 9 through Sept. 26, and then whenever else Mike is there, you can order off "the menu" such as it is.

"If I'm not here, there's no food," says Mike. But realistically, Mike is there a lot. Sunday, Monday, and Wednesday from 11 a.m. to 3 a.m., Mike is always there. Basically the only time there's really no food is on Saturday, which may seem odd, but most everyone and their brother are happy to serve you food on Saturday and Mike would rather be watching his kids play sports. You gotta have priorities. Mike's seem to be in the right place.

# 3 RULES

Not a day goes by where we do not have to make a decision. Some decisions are completely innate and require very little thought. Deciding what to wear, what to eat for lunch, or which route to take to work are not the type of life-altering decisions that people dwell on. Good decision making is necessary for living life productively and efficiently. All of us are confronted with various decisions to make daily. Some are small and of minor consequence, while others are huge and potentially life changing. Some are simple and obvious choices; others are more difficult and painstaking.

If you're a young adult, making decisions can be tough. I want you to be successful, and a simple measure of success is not being in the poorhouse. Your personal decision making determines whether or not you will live in poverty. The Brookings Institution has spent a great deal of effort studying this issue. Brookings whittled down a lot of analysis into three simple rules to avoid poverty. These answers to decisions seem relatively simple:

- Graduate from high school
- Have a full-time job
- Wait to get married until after 21 and do not have children until you are married People who do all three rules have only a 2 percent rate of falling into poverty. Meanwhile, you'll have a nearly 75 percent chance of being in the middle class (defined as earning around \$55,000 or more per year). These rules apply to all races and ethnic groups.

Making decisions does not have to be an overwhelming process. The most important thing to remember when faced with an important decision is to determine what type of impact the decision will have on the people involved. Many bad decisions can be remedied, however, the more people the decision impacts, the more difficult it will be to remedy the situation. When deciding, determine how your choice will impact your life and as well as the lives of others, and respond accordingly. Teenagers are capable of understanding principles and of using them to help make decisions. Anyone who delivers messages to teens about the consequences of decisions that could affect them and others for many years should be praised.

I know every situation is different and nothing can be that easy, but decisions made by individuals are paramount in the fight to reduce poverty and increase opportunity in America. I understand that these three simple rules might not be easy or even attainable for everyone, but I believe most people can strive to make better decisions about their future, and these three rules seem like a good place to start.

#### **CHECK YOUR ATTITUDE**

"I don't know". Why is it so difficult to say those three words? Those words are hard to say because we feel the need to be right and more importantly, not wrong. There is no way you can know the answer to every question and admitting "I don't know" takes the pressure off. Check Your Attitude by admitting when you don't know the answer. If you Check Your Attitude daily, you won't have to worry about Covering Your Butt!

# WHAT'S YOUR HEALTH STYLE?

Do you want to be healthy? Dentally healthy? Is it important to you? Relevant questions, I believe, in a world where many of us want to be fixed or repaired by taking medications or having problems surgically repaired rather than make the daily decisions that will help us get or stay healthy. I'm reminded of the all too familiar line that I suspect many of us have heard: If I'd known I was gonna live this long, I would have taken better care of myself!

In the early 1980s my wife Sharon and I were introduced to a book titled *Human Life Styling—Keeping Whole in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century.* It was written by John C. McCamy, M.D. and James Presley. I provide all of that information because I just discovered that it is still available, so if you want it, you can get it. We were so impressed with that book that we bought a bunch of copies and shared it with our patients who had an interest in it. Many of them did, and many of them tell us they still apply some or all of the principles that were discussed in the book.

Sharon and I were reminded again of this book this past weekend when we attended a course entitled "Six Patient Focused Nutrition Strategies for Health" presented by Margaret Connor, M.S., R.D. Marge is one of the best presenters I've heard in a long time, and her message reminded both of us how relevant our choice of lifestyle habits still are today. Her sincerity, humanity, together with her researched-based information, was extremely compelling.

One of the things that she focused on was that "HEALTH" is far more than the absence of disease—it is "a state of complete physical, mental, and social wellbeing" (as defined by the World Health Organization). People achieve health by combining multiple approaches including good nutrition, regular exercise, stress reduction, and some type of spiritual practice. Nothing really new there, except for the way she packaged the information, and how well she supported each point with well documented facts.

I appreciated that she didn't talk about "diets" but rather "eating patterns" and/or "lifestyle patterns." That resonated with me. For me another significant point she shared was that practicing seated yoga for 10 minutes daily resulted in a 45 percent drop of fasting blood sugar over a three month period in a research study group. WOW!! That translates to significantly lowering a person's risk of developing diabetes. In the US 1.4 million cases of Type 2 diabetes are diagnosed each year, and more than 1 in 10 adults has the disease. Perhaps even more frightening is that over 1 in 4 people over the age of 65 has it!

If we acknowledge that diabetes, heart disease, and cancer cause the majority of deaths in our country, and that all of them are related to inflammation (as is gum disease, to bring this around to dentistry), then anything we can do to reduce the inflammatory process in our bodies has a potentially huge impact. Guess what eating more vegetables and whole fruits does for us...? Yep, my mother was right!

She suggested five steps for improving eating patterns:

- Build a strong base with plenty of vegetables and include *whole* fruits.
- Power up with protein from beans, legumes, nuts, lentils, and fish.
- Make your grains "whole" and nix the added sugars. [As a dentist I'm all about the idea of nixing sugars!]
- Lose your fear of fat (with cold processed extra virgin olive oil and nuts being her top choices).
- Celebrate wellness with friends who support your positive choices (enjoy meals with those friends, be physically active with them, practice yoga, etc.)

Perhaps the most important thing I heard was a simple concept—create your environment to be successful. If you want to quit drinking pop, don't have it at home. If you want to change your dietary intake, start shopping when you are *not* hungry, and only buy the items that you have decided you want to eat to improve your health. If you want to begin exercising, start. I'm reminded of another

saying I've heard before: "That a journey of a thousand miles starts with a single step."

# CIRCE, YOU DO THAT VOODOO THAT YOU DO SO WELL

Madeline Miller is a writer of uncommon ability. Her prose is at once dazzling and shimmers like a mirage. There is no doubt in my mind that Ms. Miller is one of the finest novelists working in the English language. She is in the same ballpark, as an equal, to the great Colombian Nobel Lauriat and writer Gabo, a nickname for Gabriel Garcia Marquez.

In the last issue of 365ink I wrote about her first novel, *The Song of Achilles*, which hit the book world like an atom bomb. As a consequence, her second novel, *Circe*, was one of the most highly anticipated novels of the last 50 years and the subject of this piece.

Her first novel was a brilliantly conceived, very personal, version of Homer's *Iliad*. *Circe* in turn is cut from the same baklava. It is Homer's *Odyssey* retold, almost entirely, from the point of view of the sorceress, Circe.

Ms. Miller paints a masterpiece that is somewhat sympathetic to Circe where in the complete story of the goddess she is dangerous, capricious, and very powerful in her own right. She turned her own sister into Scylla, one of the horrific monsters of Scylla and Charybdis, and she turned many, many sailors who washed up on her island into pigs, yes pigs. One unwanted suitor of hers, a king of some kingdom or other, tested Circe's patience to the breaking point and she turned him into a woodpecker. In my view they all deserved their fate at the hands of the supreme goddess/sorcerer.

Circe was born of royalty. Her father was the God of the Sun, Helios. Her mother's identity is a little in doubt but most agree she was Perse, a frighteningly formidable woman, nymph actually. Circe, as a child, showed no godlike powers like she was supposed to have as a goddess. Her parents hated her and took every opportunity to insult, belittle, and mock her in front of everybody. As Circe grew, she discovered she had the power of witchcraft. A goddess with the power of sorcery, she had the muscle to turn even a god or goddess into a woodpecker.

Zeus, privately, was terrorized. So, he and Helios conspired to banished Circe to a deserted island for eternity. Ms. Miller describes the island with lush, splendid prose that approaches the poetry of Homer. When reading that section, I couldn't help but think the island sounded more like a little version of paradise. It had everything she needed, especially a veritable cornucopia of herbs, spices, roots, plants and, yes, weeds to mix up any potion she desired.

There was something else. On her deserted island she meets a who's who of Greek mythology. First there was Hermes who brought news and gossip from the outside world, her personal MSNBC. Then there was the mortal witch and dangerous woman Medea, Circe's niece, who was with Jason of Jason and the Argonauts fame and helped Jason procure the Golden Fleece. She met the great artificer Daedalus and his son Icarus. Remember all these people either happened by, were shipwrecked or sought her out on purpose.

After the Trojan War ended, Odysseus and his small army set sail for Ithaca, their home. The story of that 10-year homeward journey we have come to know as the *Odyssey*, Homer's epic poem and counterpoint to the *Iliad*. It may be the grandest adventure in all of western literature. I so enjoyed reading Ms. Miller's retelling of the story.

By the time Odysseus arrived at Circe's island he had been away from home for a long time and had no

way to know if his wife, Penelope, was dead or had taken another husband and his son would be nearly a grown man. Now, here he was

on this island. He sent his men ahead to explore.

They found Circe who welcomed them with food and drink. Being cautious, she laced it with a potion, in case they wanted more than just food and drink. When they did, she turned them into pigs and put them in the sty. Later that evening Odysseus showed up and had a pleasant dinner with her. Turns out they both recognized each other. Odysseus got Circe to turn the pigs back into his crew.

Circe and Odysseus fall in love almost immediately. She takes him to her bed the first night and every night thereafter. Odysseus and crew stay for over a year but finally it comes time to leave. Circe says a bittersweet goodbye because she has decided to keep to herself and not tell Odysseus that she is pregnant with his child.

I'm going to stop here. It you have read Homer's Odyssey then you know what happens. If not, all I can tell you is that it is utterly breathtaking—and that is just the plot. Ms. Miller's prose is astonishing.

Madeline Miller's *Circe* is not to be missed. It is a tour de force in every sense of that phrase. I wonder what she has in mind for her next sparkling jewel. I'm getting in line to buy it right now. It takes the place on my book shelf right next to *The Song of Achilles*.

Go out, right now, and get both of them. I guarantee you will not be disappointed.


climates, low maintenance, relatively pest and disease resistant and multiple seasons of interest. The group reviews hundreds of nominations and chooses one to feature.

This colorful and compact winner makes an excellent addition to the full sun perennial border. Fantastic in combination with ornamental grasses, coneflowers, and butterfly weeds. Unlike many other lambs' ear varieties, you may be familiar with—the ones with the fuzzy leaves—this plant is well behaved and won't take over your garden. It does prefer well drained soil, so be sure to amend tough clay soils prior to planting. As a zone 4 plant, you don't have to worry about these tough guys surviving the winter.




