Some women became pearlers in their own right and the accompanying table has been prepared from original handwritten registration records courtesy of Maurice Gower. All available detail is reproduced verbatim from the copy of the records in hand at the time, without alteration to the contemporary spelling or syntax. It is apparent that there were occasional errors in the original and contemporaneous handwritten record and in a few cases the surname, given name of the applicant or name of the boat had been misspelt. *In more recent years a new group of successful women pearlers have been involved with the production of the famous cultured South Sea Pearls, including the Paspaley, Kailis and Banfield families, Mary Dakas, Penny Arrow, and Beverley Kinney to name a few.³¹*

And it was not the case that these women who owned boats and ships, were clustered in Broome. They were in Geraldton, Onslow, Cossack, but not it appears Thursday Island. It is not beyond the bounds of possibility that they were in other pearling centres, and a few were in state capitals. Who started this involvement of women in the wet fish and pearling industries at a time when women did not have the vote, and seldom made a will is not known for certain, but the aim of protection against widowhood appears reasonably clear. Or a brother enlists in 1914 and his sister takes over the licences. John's father, Ted Norman, appeared on the pearling register each year as the owner of *Robinor*, although he was on active service overseas (Egypt, Gallipoli, France and Belgium). His letters home to his father in Broome, and his mother in Sydney, mentioned his boat from time to time.

On 12 January 1918 Emily has all the boats (page 53) but the Register of 30 December 1918 (page 63) shows Archer EG with *Peggy* and *Rosebud*, and Archer I with *Eva*. Clark HM holds *Emlyn Castle*. The given, or Christian name, was usually included in the column for the applicant's name.

David Leslie Dyson, her husband's, boat from 1920-1923, then sold to Ancell Gregory. *Joe Chamberlain* owned by Dysons in 1919-1920, 1922-1923 (was previously George Norman's boat).

The Dyson family were prominent Broome merchants and storekeepers, and Bessie Dyson took over *Norma* (51/1903) from George Norman (brother of Hugh and Tom). She also owned *Joe Chamberlain* (7/1903).
