

## Trump leads 50%-48% in Both 2-Way and 4-Way Test (Gallego 50% -Lake 47)

**LANSING, Mich.** — Former President Donald Trump holds a two percent lead over Vice President Kamala Harris (50%-48%) in a trial ballot question for President in 2024 according to a statewide poll of Arizona conducted by **Mitchell Research & Communications, Inc.** In a four-way trial ballot test Trump (50%) leads Harris (48%), Libertarian Chase Oliver (1%), and Green Party candidate Jill Stein (0%).

"Trump's lead comes from a strong showing with 18 to 44-year-old voters where he has a fifteen percent lead (56%-41%). Trump is also doing better with men (53% – 46%) than Harris is doing with women (51% – 47%). Trump leads in critical Maricopa county by five percent (51% – 46%) and in areas other than Maricopa and Pima where Trump has an eight per cent lead (54% – 46%). The only area where Trump is losing is in Pima county where he is down 14 points (43% – 57%)." Steve Mitchell, president of Mitchell Research & Communications, Inc. said..

#### Indicators That This Race May Not be as Close as it Seems

- There are indicators that this race may not be as close as it seems.
- "Friends and neighbors ballot question"
  Because in many circles it is socially unacceptable to be a Trump voter, pollsters have been attempting to identify those "shy" Trump voters that will not even tell a SurveyMonkey poll that they plan on voting for the former president. Therefore, pollsters have attempted to ask different types of trial ballot questions or other types of questions to get at the truth as to who may be voting for Trump but is afraid to reveal it even to a non-human form of questionnaire.
- One method has been to ask voters how a "majority of their friends and neighbors are voting" to see whether or not that question will show more support for Trump than asking the voter directly if he/she is voting for Trump. When we asked that question on this survey, Trump was leading 50%-31%, a marked difference from the 4-Way ballot question where he was only leading by two percent. Part of the reason for the change is that 8% of the Democrats say that their friends and neighbors are voting for Trump while only one percent of the Democrats said Trump when asked for whom they were personally voting.
- Support for Harris drops about 20% for both men and women when asked "who their friends and neighbors are voting for."
- Another indicator that Trump support may be stronger than what the response is to the 2-Way and 4-Way ballot questions is the response to the question "who do you think can best solve the problem that will impact your choice for president?"
   In that question, by a margin of three percent (50%-47%) respondents said Donald Trump over Kamala Harris.
- Finally, when asked who they thought was going to win regardless of who they were supporting, by a margin of eleven percent (43% 32%) respondents say Trump.
- When you examine all of these clues as to where some undecided voters may go, it seems possible that Trump may have more support from the so called "shy" voters.

#### **Two-Way Race by Gender**

Although we are seeing a big gender gap in other states, that does not seem to be the case in Arizona. There is a gender gap, and although it is not a large one, it is enough to determine who is ahead in the race. Among men, Trump leads by six percent (53% – 46%) while among women Harris leads by three percent (51% -48%).

#### Two-Way Race by Age

- Trump leads by fifteen percent with 18–44 year-old voters (56% 41%).
- Trump also leads with 45-64 year olds (50% -49%).
- However, Harris leads with 65 + year olds by one percent (50% 49%).

#### **Two-Way Race by Education**

- Among those with some college education or trade school, Trump leads 51% to 48%.
- Among college graduates, Trump leads 52% to 47%.
- Among those with no college education, Trump leads 67% to 31%
- Finally, among those with a master's degree or greater, Harris leads 55% to 33%.
- The huge margins by which Trump leads with those that have never been to college is in stark contrast to the lead Harris has with the most educated group, those with a master's degree plus.

#### On the 4-Way Race

In the 4-Way race cross tabs are very consistent with the 2-way race. Although the percentages might be slightly different, the difference between Harris' and Trump's percentages are very consistent.

#### Four-Way Race by Gender

• For decades we have observed a huge gender gap with the percentage of women who support female candidates being much more successful at getting their fellow women to vote for their candidacies. In 2024, we are not only seeing this huge difference in support of candidates with women, we are seeing it with men also. And, in fact, the margin by which Trump is leading with men (53% - 46%) is even greater than the margin by which Harris is leading with women (51% -48%).

#### Four-Way Race by Age

- Trump leads by twenty percent with 18–44 year-old voters (57% 41%).
- Harris and Trump are tied with 45-64 year olds (49% 49%).
- Harris leads in the 65+ age group (55%-44%)

#### Four-Way Race by Race

- Among white voters, Trump and Harris are tied 49% to 49%.
- Among African American voters, Harris is leading 81% to 19%.
- Among voters of other ethnicities, Trump leads 49% to 46%.

#### **Generic Congressional Ballot Question**

In the Generic Congressional House ballot question, we assessed whether or not voters supported a Republican or a Democrat without using a specific candidates name. Voters support the Republicans by one percent more (49% - 48%).

#### On the 2-Way US Senate Race

Reuben Gallego leads Kari Lake by four percent. (50%-46%). Unlike other states where Senate candidate's support tracks with Trump, Lake doesn't seem to be able to "close the deal' with all the former president's voters.

#### 2-Way US Senate Race by Gender

Gallego leads with men (49%-6%) and women (51%-46%).

#### 2-Way US Senate Race by Age

- Gallego leads among 45-64 year olds (50%-48%).and those 65 and older (56%-40%).
- Lake leads with 18-44 year olds (51%-45%).

#### 2-Way US Senate Race by Education

- Gallego leads among those with a master's or higher (59% 39%) and among those with some college (49%-48%), while among those who have graduated college it's a tie (48% - 48%).
- Lake leads among those who have no college experience (68% 28%).

#### **US Senate Race**

"Gallego continues to lead Lake in part because of his strong lead within independents (56%-37%) and because Lake still has not solidified the Republican base. She is only getting 89% of GOP voters compared to Gallego's 98% of Democratic voters. In order for Lake to win this race, she has to do much better with those independents and she has to find a way to get Republicans behind her. At this point it looks as though Gallego is going to win a very close race," Mitchell concluded.

#### Methodology

The poll was conducted on Monday October 28, 2024. It was conducted entirely by text messaging a randomly selected list of registered voter's cell phones and directing them to a SurveyMonkey poll (MMS-Web).

The poll of (N=610 Likely Voters) has a Margin of Error of + or -3.968% at the 95% level of confidence. We sent 41,328 text messages with a response rate of 0.0147.

It is important to remember that subsets based on demographics, such as gender, age, education, race/ethnicity and 2020 president outcome in Arizona, carry with them higher credibility intervals, as the sample size is reduced. Survey results should be understood within the poll's range of scores and know with a confidence interval of 95% a poll will fall outside the range of scores 1 in 20 times.

The survey was conducted at Mitchell Research & Communications, Inc.
