

The African Cape Verde islands have their own distinct genre of music and dance known as "morna". It's mostly in evidence during the carnival season across the archipelago that's located in the Atlantic off the coast of Senegal. Each of the Cape Verde islands has its own charm and its own diverse landscape: from dramatic volcanic landscapes to the lush gardens of Sao Antão and the endless sandy beaches of Sao Vicente.

The documentary observes the everyday lives of Cape Verde people and hears about their dreams and aspirations. People like the young singer Claudia, the drummer Nuno and Catarina - the carnival queen.

They all love the typical music of Cape Verde, the "morna", made famous throughout the world by Cesária Évora. It's best described as a kind of plaintive blues that touches the soul and speaks of lovesickness, longing and the challenges of life. The young singer Claudia idolises Évora. She studies law, but dreams of a career on the stage. Music is her passion and she devotes all her free time to singing and playing the guitar.

Music is also a big deal for drummer Nuno. He leads the drum band at carnival time, the most important date in the Cape Verde calendar. People look forward to this festival for months and anyone who can take part in the preparations, does. Dentist Catarina has a prominent role this year: She's attending as the carnival queen and is having an elaborate costume made for the big day. Will her appearance be a success?

Protecting the Climate - Why Science and Protests are Failing

Can the climate still be saved? Scientists like oceanologist Mojib Latif are disillusioned. Neither the warnings from climate researchers nor public protests have prompted sufficient action from politicians and big business interests.

Why? This question is the subject of this film. One factor is the sluggish political action of governments in almost every country in the world -- despite numerous climate protection conferences. The lack of political action can often be traced to large fossil fuel companies, which have prevented the implementation of effective environmental and climate protection measures, fearing for their profit margins.

For some time now, young people have also been fighting for radical change. Against ruthless companies and politicians who are incapable of acting, in their view. "Fridays for Future" and "The Last Generation" want to see an immediate change of course. Mojib Latif sympathizes with their concerns. But he wonders what their forms of protest, which he finds too radical, really achieve. In large parts of society, they tend to provoke anger, which can serve to increase society's lack of understanding. Have there ever been successful forms of protest? Perhaps other approaches are needed to convince people. Ultimately, however, each individual person -- and their human brain - may be at the root of the problem. Why? Solving complex problems in the long term is not the human brain's strongpoint, says neuroscientist Henning Beck. "The structure of our brain negatively influences our behavior when tackling big problems."

In this documentary, numerous voices from the world of science weigh in, analyzing the 'climate protection problem' from different perspectives. During the documentary, it becomes clear why scientific educational work has not led to sufficient climate protection despite the clarity of the situation. The film shows which hurdles still need to be overcome -- economic and political, as well as very human ones - and how science can help.

In Beirut's Shadow - Hoping for a Miracle

In the Palestinian refugee camps of Sabra and Shatila, people live at subsistence level. They have no civil rights and no prospects. The Palestinian camps set up in Beirut after the founding of Israel still seem like makeshift arrangements, even today.

The documentary portrays three families living in Sabra and Shatila. Both camps were established in the Lebanese capital of Beirut shortly after the founding of the state of Israel in 1948. They were created as a refuge for Palestinian families after their expulsion and flight from what is now the territory of Israel.

Eight-year-old Abu Ahmad, who fled to Beirut with his mother and two of his older siblings to escape the war in Syria, works 14 hours a day to supplement the family's meagre living expenses. He finds a fatherly protector in Abu Asali, who owns the juice stand where he works.

Ayman Kujeyje, father of five and a store owner, arranges the engagement of his daughter Sanaa - he does not want to worry about her anymore. But the engagement is problematic.

Ex-convict Aboodi Ziani is trying to get his life back on track after his release from prison. His young son Ali gives him hope and a purpose in life and Aboodi Ziani wants to give him a better life. But in a poor, makeshift neighborhood like Shatila, construction jobs pay badly. The money he earns is barely enough to survive.

The Daher family belong to the Lebanese Dom community - a traditionally itinerant group, similar to the Roma and Sinti in Europe. They have no official nationality and are fighting for the life of their seriously ill daughter Sareea. She is being denied medical help. The Dahers' adolescent son dreams of being free -- but without papers this is likely to remain a fantasy.

The filmmakers follow their protagonists over a period of four years - between 2018 and 2022 - as they experience the consequences of major upheavals. These include Beirut's gigantic port explosion, Lebanon's historic economic crisis, the coronavirus pandemic and the ever-increasing number of refugees seeking shelter here.

Creative and Combative - Mexico City by Night

Mexico City used to inspire fear. But these days, the megacity is a hotspot for tourists. Still, the city has not lost its fighting spirit. Some use it to put on a show, while others simply try to survive.

With around 22 million people, Mexico City is the largest Spanish-speaking city in the world. But this isn't the only reason why it attracts increasing numbers of tourists each year. Indeed, the mega-metropolis has pretty much everything travelers could wish for: History, culture, art, music, excellent street food, Michelin-starred restaurants, spectacular nature and, of course, the people who call Mexico City home. Locals are known for their open, respectful and life-affirming vibe.

Lalo Garcia, for example, is a star chef on the Mexican culinary scene. He's living the reverse American dream: he grew up in the USA as the child of illegal immigrant field workers and was deported to Mexico as an adult, to a country he barely knew. Despite these hardships, he has found success and happiness here.

Angel Palafox is a former pilot. He realized that you can make a lot of money in Mexico City by operating private ambulances. After all, there are far too few public ambulances to serve a city of 22 million people. Private companies fill the gap and make money from it. Some ambulances, like Angel's, are well equipped and have paramedics or doctors on board. Others are souped-up vans with minimal equipment. To get to the scene as quickly as possible, they follow the police scanner and search Facebook for posts about accidents. They hand out business cards outside hospitals in case an ambulance is needed. It's a business proposition -- but the private ambulances also provide an important service in an underfunded healthcare system.

The film also follows a trans activist, someone who's known as a 'bicycle mayor' and Mexican lucha libre fighters. All the protagonists are representative of how creative and combative the people of Mexico City are.

María in Mexico wants an end to violence against women; Somkele is fighting for democracy in Nigeria. But their parents have mixed feelings about their children's activism. After all, political engagement can be dangerous. 22-year-old María attends protest rallies, sprays walls with feminist graffiti and is active on social media attacking machismo and challenging the threat to young women posed by men in her country. Her parents are afraid for their daughter and concerned that she will become radicalized. Her mother Maira is a devout Catholic and her father Carlos is a civil servant. While they understand María's anger, they're afraid for her life. That's because around 10 women are murdered every day in Mexico. Simply because of their gender.

24-year-old Somkele from the Nigerian city of Lagos wants change in his home nation. He's fighting for democratization and against corruption in Nigeria - as well as for greater political participation of young people in politics. But the old political elite is unwilling to concede any of its power. Protests are often brutally suppressed, sometimes leaving demonstrators dead. Another reason why Somkele's mother Ifeoma is opposed to his activism. The single mother of four wants her eldest son to stop wasting his time with politics and focus on earning money for the family. A generational conflict over politics and change.

The Haida People in Canada

Oppression and introduced diseases have decimated the Haida people of Canada. Today, only some 2,000 Haida live on a group of islands in western Canada. They are fighting to preserve their traditions and language. Black bears and other wildlife roam on and off the Haida Gwaii archipelago. The shores are lined with dense, moss-covered forests. On the coasts, totem poles up to 53 meters high rise into the sky. They tell of the history and stories of the Haida people in pictures. The group does not pass on its traditions in written works; rather, they use art and spoken language. But only a few people still speak this language. The generation that still speaks fluent Haida is slowly dying out - and their language is threatening to die with them. Skil Jaadee White has made it her mission to save the language from extinction and to preserve the history of her ancestors. The young woman lives with her family in Old Massett in northern Haida Gwaii. Her father Christian is one of the most famous Haida carvers. Right now, he is working on a totem pole that is over 20 feet tall. Skil Jaadee's aunt Lisa runs a gallery and store in town.

Everything is connected to everything else - this is one of the basic laws of the Haida. The Haida live in harmony with nature. The documentary gives an insight into the life of Skil Jaadee, her family and the sustainable way of life of the Haida, against the breathtaking landscape of the archipelago.

Operation 1005 - How the Nazis Concealed Their Atrocities

The Nazis meticulously planned and documented their acts of mass murder. They were just as meticulous when it came to covering their tracks. Their systematic, cruel methods are a chapter of war history that's still largely unknown.

On their advance to the east, Nazi perpetrators initially buried the victims of their executions in mass graves. But after the war seemed lost, following the Red Army counter-offensive, they feared their atrocities would be discovered. They began using more sophisticated methods to remove incriminating evidence.

The systematic way the "bureaucrats of mass murder" went about erasing their tracks and the gruesome, inhumane methods they used is still a largely unknown chapter of World War Two history. Many relatives of Jews, Sinti and Roma, partisans or civilians killed in the conflict are still waiting to this day for any information about the whereabouts of their loved ones' remains, so that they can at least be given a dignified memorial.

The documentary film accompanies the French organization Yahad-In Unum as it conducts research in Ukraine. In the Lviv region, researchers attempt to identify the locations of mass shootings and find any eyewitnesses who might still be alive and able to recount what they saw. The film also tells the story of Rüdiger Schallock, whose grandfather Walter was a member of the SS. Rüdiger Schallock is also in Lviv searching for information about his grandfather's involvement in Nazi crimes. The deeds of Walter Schallock still cast a dark shadow over the family to this day.

Sewing quilts and playing Scrabble: for pensioner Ruth Miller from Britain, that wasn't enough. After retiring from her teaching job, she wanted to make punk music again. So she founded her own band. It was a huge success. Shortly after retiring, Ruth Miller started encouraging other women to play punk on stage despite little musical experience. To date, her 'unglamorous music' project has produced 16 female punk bands in the British city of Leicester.

Ruth was everyone's "Punk Mum". She organized a big concert for all the city's female bands. An impressive lineup with Mental Load, Virginia's Wolves, Venus Ataxx, Velvet Crisis and many others. Dina is a guitarist and vocalist with Virginia's Wolves. She's a single mother and had never played in a band before. "That first time on stage changed my life. It finally gave me an identity," she says. After all, as the mother of small children, your own personality has to take a back seat, she adds. "You don't even have a name anymore, you the twin's mum, or Liam's mum, or whoever." Now, she performs at least once a month.

Meanwhile, the 'unglamorous music' project has grown into a movement. In other cities in Britain and elsewhere, women are coming together to make music. In the spirit of Ruth Miller, who died of cancer shortly after this film was made. Though she has passed, her project lives on.

Illegal Leather - How the Car Industry is Threatening the Rainforest

Brazil's tannery industry exports products worth 1.5 billion Euros every year. Cattle meat and hides are a huge economic driver. But this business often involves the illegal destruction of the rainforest for grazing land. "The forest is our home. And now it's all being destroyed forever." Wenatoa Parakanã stands outside her cabin in the dense rainforest of the Brazilian Amazonas and is close to tears. The young Parakanã woman has lived her whole life in the remote region of Apyterewa - about a day's motorboat trip to the next small town.

But for several years now, life for Wenatoa has been changing beyond recognition. Strangers are coming to threaten her village, chop down the trees and turn her homeland into gigantic pasture lands for thousands of cattle. Over the last 20 years, an area of forest almost as large as Germany has been logged in the region - often illegally. Many researchers fear that the Amazonas has already reached its tipping point: It can no longer recover from the many fires and droughts. This could have devastating consequences for the global climate.

On a local level, only very few people dare to oppose the illegal destruction of the rainforest. After all, the animals' meat and hides are a huge economic driver. Every year, the Brazilian tannery industry exports products valued at more than one billion Euros. These products are sold all over the world. And as the research for this film shows: some of them are also ending up in German luxury cars.

With intrepid journeys to the heart of the action, footage secretly filmed in abattoirs, interviews with insiders and the latest digital research techniques, the team retraces the production steps of this illegal leather right to its source. From the Brazilian rainforest, via shady middlemen to German car dealerships offering the latest models by BMW, Mercedes & Co. - complete with their luxurious leather interiors.

The film embarks on a journalistic quest for clues that turns into an economic crime thriller. After all, this isn't an isolated case, it's systematic environmental exploitation. Despite the many glossy brochures touting the carmakers' sustainability credentials, these complex supply chains are often opaque - keeping their impact on people and the environment in the dark.

Fighting Over Land - Escalating Violence in the Occupied West Bank

Confrontation between Jewish settlers and Palestinians in the West Bank has increased dramatically in recent months. This documentary offers an exclusive picture of the now destroyed Bedouin village Wadi al-Siq and the Nur Shams refugee camp.

Since the 7 October 2023 Hamas terror attack, which killed 1,200 people, Israel has been at war with the terrorist organization in the Gaza Strip. Hamas run health authorities in Gaza state tens of thousands of Palestinian civilians have been killed in the fighting. Removed from the main focus of international attention, the situation in the occupied West Bank has also deteriorated significantly.

In the last three months of 2023, there were over 530 reported attacks by Israeli settlers on Palestinians in the West Bank. According to Human Rights Watch, the year 2023 witnessed the highest number of such incidents since records began in 2006.

UN sources have recorded over 500 killings of Palestinians by Israelis in the occupied territories from 7 October 2023 to late June 2024. During the same period, 12 Israelis were killed by Palestinians in the region.

In the Palestinian refugee camp Nur Shams a father stands among the ruins of what was once his home, destroyed by Israeli security forces during a raid. Israeli authorities describe such actions as defensive and designed to counter the threat posed by suspected Hamas terrorists. The Bedouin village Wadi al-Siq no longer exists - the dwellings here were destroyed by Israeli settlers. As-Sawiya, another village, has also witnessed settler violence - a Palestinian farmer was recently killed. But here families are receiving help, including from Rabbi Arik Ascherman among other Israeli and Palestinian human rights activists. Israeli settlements in the occupied territories are in breach of the UN Charter on human rights, as well as in contravention of UN Security Council resolution 2334 agreed in December 2016.

The grandmothers who raised Paul are worried about this plan and in any case, they don't really understand their grandchild's way of life. They fear for Paul's safety in a foreign world.

In the case of Houda from Iraq, it's completely the opposite: whereas more and more of her friends are leaving the country, she wants to stay. Houda is a university student, works in a hotel and is passionate about cycling - a hobby that's quite political. In Iraq, women who ride bikes are rejected by large sections of society. Houda wants to break this taboo and fight for a better future for her country. Friends and family are torn: Is the lifestyle Houda wants to lead even possible in Iraq?

Moscow's Hunger for Power - The Baltic States in Putin's Shadow

The Baltic states regained independence more than 30 years ago. Now, Russia has them looking over their shoulder, again. Moscow's invasion of Ukraine has left many people wondering whether Russia will set its power-hungry sights on the Baltic states, once more. "There's only one enemy and that's Russia," says Estonian national Ain Tähiste, summing up his views on the issue in a sentence: "Latvia, Finland, Sweden - and on the Baltic Sea Poland, Germany, Denmark," he continues, "they're all friends, but not the Russian neighbor."

"It's naïve to think Russia's far away," he adds.

Ain Tähiste guides the reporter team through the military museum on Hiiumaa. The Estonian island in the west of the country was off-limits to tourists during Soviet rule, because its location on the Baltic Sea made it strategically important to Moscow. Since the start of the Russian war on Ukraine, Estonia has removed old Soviet monuments form public spaces and banished some of them to museums. "The Soviet Union occupied Estonia in 1940," Ain explains. "Are we still expected to pay our respects to the troops that occupied us? No, it was high time this happened!"

22-year-old Matthias Merelaine is from Tallinn and has no direct experience of the Soviet era. He's nevertheless preoccupied by the question of whether Russia will try to return to the Baltics. "We'd be ready," he says, "to go to the front, weapon in hand, to fight the enemy and defend the homeland."

National guards are booming in Baltic nations - including Lithuania. Paulus Jurkus, son of a fisher from Kleipėda, says he wouldn't run away, if attacked. The only port city in Lithuania, his home is not far from the border with the Russian enclave of Kaliningrad.

This new aversion to Russians is also omnipresent in Latvia. Lauris Aleksevejs is a top chef in Latvia's traditional seaside resort of Jurmala. The Russians used to be big spenders at Lauris' restaurant. And since Latvia closed its borders to Russians, his income has nosedived. But he refuses to do business with the enemy.

The Red Light's Dark Shadow - Sex Tourism in Thailand

In December 2023, DW broadcast a documentary on sex tourism in Pattaya which unleashed a wave of outrage. National media in Thailand took up the story - at its center, the case of a suspected German pedophile. The German national had been arrested in Pattaya on suspicion of child sexual abuse. He was alleged to have taken underage girls from a bar to back his apartment. But instead of being brought to justice, he was able to leave the country. Allegations followed that a significant bribe was involved. Once details of the case entered the public sphere, the Thai Prime Minister himself intervened to demand that the police and judiciary investigate any official errors.

Now, the film "The Red Light's Dark Shadow" explores what's happened since. How has the situation in Thailand changed? Big promises were made at the time - have these been followed up by firm action? The film crew's findings have also prompted a debate in Thailand on whether legalizing sex work could be a way to dismantle criminal structures in the red-light milieu and thereby facilitate a more robust response to child prostitution. After all, the experts agree that sex tourism creates structures in red-light districts that acutely endanger minors.

In his documentary, author Wolfgang Luck asks whether Thailand is genuinely serious about fighting child prostitution and corruption. The film hears from child protection agencies, politicians, bar owners and high-ranking police officers. The team also checks on progress in the case against the suspected German pedophile.

Breaking the Silence Over Endometriosis

190 million women around the world suffer from endometriosis, a chronic disease of the abdomen. For a long time, medicine didn't take these women's complaints seriously. But now, the taboo issue is finding a wider audience. Women are breaking their silence.

At the age of 14, Theresia Crone had to go to hospital for the first time with extreme abdominal pain. The pain kept on coming back, because she has endometriosis. Now, she's battling for greater awareness and recognition of the disease. Priscilla Herbil also didn't feel listened to. For 20 years, she took medication to endure menstruation.

It takes an average of seven years to get a diagnosis - a long time for women to be left suffering. Their periods are extremely painful, but the pain can also come at any time during the menstrual cycle, sometimes affecting the entire body. This is often accompanied by heavy menstrual bleeding, bowel problems, exhaustion, pain during sex and sometimes problems conceiving. The pain is caused by uterus-like cells that colonize areas outside the uterus, for example the ovaries, intestine or peritoneum.

Priscilla is keen to live a full life despite her endometriosis. This reportage accompanies her as she tackles her symptoms, using nutrition, physiotherapy and massage. She wants to avoid an operation at all costs. Theresia is bringing the subject to the political arena with her initiative "EndEndoSilence". Following the example set by France, she is demanding a national endometriosis strategy for Germany - and more research funding. After all, it's still not known what causes the disease.

NATO - Old Friends, New Fronts, Part 1

Since 1949, NATO has shaped Europe's security policy like no other organization. Article 5 of the North Atlantic Treaty outlines the principle of "collective defense". But is the world's largest military alliance ready to defend itself?

Marking the 75th anniversary of the founding of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, this documentary looks at the past, present and future of NATO. Among other things, it sheds light on vulnerabilities. For example, Article 5 of the North Atlantic Treaty is anything but binding. Unanimity among the member states is a prerequisite -- but by no means a certainty. And there are only partial guarantees in place when it comes to the speed with which troops and supplies must be delivered in extreme situations.

The film embarks on a journey across the Alliance's territory. The filmmakers visit Tallinn, in Estonia, where NATO's Cyber Defence Centre is located. From here they travel on to Ulm, in Germany, where the deployment of troops and supplies is organized. The next stop is NATO headquarters in Brussels, where political decisions are made. The film hears from high-ranking current and former NATO generals and security experts along the way.

With the help of international historians, the documentary also looks back on the 75-year history of NATO. Founded after the devastating experiences of the Second World War, the alliance's architects wanted to deter enemies. But even more importantly, they wanted to secure peace among the alliance partners - not least out of fears of Germany regaining strength.

The documentary draws on previously unseen archival film material: NATO portraits of member countries filmed in the 1950s to give soldiers a better understanding of one another's countries and thus enhance cohesion.

Important eyewitnesses, including Donald Trump's former National Security Advisor John Bolton and diplomat Wolfgang Ischinger, are featured. They provide context for recent NATO developments: How close was the US to leaving NATO in 2018? And what would the consequences have been? Was a promise really made not to expand NATO eastwards after the collapse of the Soviet Union? The film seeks an answer to this question, which continues to shape Russia's relationship with NATO to this day.

Lagos - Metropolis of Extremes

Nigeria's megacity Lagos is a place of extremes. When night falls, a struggle for survival begins for the poorest, while the wealthy live out glamorous dreams. This film shows Lagos from its most dazzling and darkest sides. Lagos is growing faster than any other city in the world. It's thought some 25 million people live here, though no one knows for sure. By 2050, the population is expected to double. Every day, new people move to Nigeria's megacity in the hopes of finding a better future. Many of the city's inhabitants live in poverty. But when it comes to Lagos' legendary club scene, money is no object.

One of the film's protagonists is Whitemoney. Born Hazel Onoudunyi, he won Nigeria's Big Brother reality show contest in 2021 and the masses have loved him ever since. His social media channels are clicked on millions of times a day. The influencer cruises through the streets of the huge metropolis at night in his Maybach and is a welcome guest at the city's many top events. "You can make your dreams come true in Lagos," says the former salesman.

Not far from the luxury district of Victoria Island, hundreds of thousands of people live in simple shacks. Makoko Island is one of the worst slums in Africa. Like many here, Banuso Kokpe is a fisher. He never went to school, so fishing was one of his only options. But life here is becoming increasingly difficult to manage. Because the population in Makoko is exploding, the battle for fish has become fierce. Banuso Kokpe only wants one thing -- to get out of Makoko.

In the search for new living space, the city of Lagos will stop at nothing, it seems. One night, the houses of Doyn Ajanlekoko and her neighbors were simply flattened by bulldozers. The suspicion: new luxury apartments are to be built on the picturesque lagoon that has long been a place where ordinary people live. But the 63-year-old and her friends refused to go along with the destruction of their homes. They went to court, and the demolition was stopped.

Cameraman Bishop Kagho Idhebor is a wanderer between worlds. In 2023, he was honored with the African Movie Academy Award. He prefers to spend his time photographing the so-called Area Boyz - the street gangs that have a grip on every neighborhood in Lagos. Their seemingly loud and violent behavior usually conceals something else: the desire for a home, a family, a different life.

Varanasi - India's Holy City of Death

In India, Varanasi is considered a holy city. Millions of Hindus believe that people who die here, in this city on the Ganges, are lucky. Because if they are cremated here, they can break the eternal cycle of birth, death and rebirth. Director Oliver Mayer grew up in a world in which most people are influenced by the Christian promise of eternal life. In Varanasi, he wants to understand why it is considered salvation to escape a cycle of rebirth.

He himself has already had to come to terms with death: A few years ago, his mother died, and it took him a long time to come to terms with his grief. He is fascinated by the fact that the end of life is not necessarily seen as negative in Hinduism. He wants to know how people manage to face death pragmatically and without fear - indeed, almost looking forward to it.

Mayer visits a very special hospice for the dying in Varanasi. Here, he encounters a different, more relaxed approach to death. He meets extraordinary people. They include the priests and relatives who care for the dying, workers from lower castes who cremate the dead and children like nine-year-old Kajal, who poses for photos dressed as the deity Shiva to earn money to support herself, her mother and her little brother.

Urban Rats - Unknown Parallel World

Rats are seen as transmitters of disease and are hated in the West. But to this day, we don't know very much about this feared animal. Science is only just beginning to properly delve into the world of rats and "rehabilitate" their image.

Worldwide, it's big cities that mainly have a big problem with rats. Few creatures are as present in society's general consciousness as the rat. They're immediately associated with chilling tales, and arouse emotions such as fear and disgust. Millions are spent every year in the battle to control them, while scientific approaches to sensible rat management are still in their infancy.

For a long time, the species has been conspicuously neglected by modern science. And apart from the interest that humans have shown in the rat as a laboratory animal, the level of ignorance in the science world is astonishing. Only now, in places as far-flung as Vancouver, Helsinki, Paris, New York and Berlin, are large-scale global research projects attempting to find answers to the fundamental questions concerning the human-rat relationship.

After all, ignorance surrounding our urban co-residents stokes fear. It fuels the "war" against rats that humans have been waging for centuries with all the means at their disposal - a battle that, again and again, turns out to be pointless and counter-productive.

Various research projects have already come up with some ideas about sustainable rat management methods. These would focus on nature and species protection, and recognize rats as part of the urban ecosystem.

The documentary "Urban Rats - Unknown Parallel World" argues for a change in perspective. It poses the question of how humans can coexist in the future with their rodent neighbors, without harm or fear. The film takes a fresh look at what is an extremely controversial, emotionally charged issue.

Libya - The Comeback of Saif Al Islam Al Gaddafi

Few had reckoned on this scenario: another Gaddafi vying for power. Saif Al Islam Al Gaddafi is the second son of the Libyan dictator Muammar Al Gaddafi, who was killed in 2011. Now, Saif Al Islam Al Gaddafi is a candidate in Libya's presidential elections.

Statements from relatives and political actors paint a portrait of an unpredictable and fiercely determined man. Saif Al Islam Al Gaddafi's presidential bid is a major challenge for Libya. His eventful life mirrors the current chaos in Libya: a country divided, with one government in the east and another in the west, rival militias vying for power and foreign states influencing the conflict. With statements from relatives and political actors, the film paints a portrait of Saif Al Islam - an unpredictable and fiercely determined survivor who is trying to find his way.

Urban Forests - Planting Trees to Combat Climate Change

Drought, forest fires and increasingly frequent storms. Climate change is destroying our forests. All over the world, people are looking for ways to keep them from dying out. Yet nature itself knows best what forests need to thrive. Reforestation works not only in the countryside, but also in the city. In urban areas, planting trees can help combat climate change, restore ecosystems and keep cities cooler — as forest scientist Stefan Scharfe well knows. He's already planted 14 'tiny forests' in Germany and Poland. The concept of planting dense, fast-growing woodland in urban wastelands was originally developed by Japanese botanist Akira Miyawaki.

In the shade of a multi-storey car park on the grounds of a hospital in the city of Herford, Scharfe has planted native plants, shrubs and trees close together. "Preparing the soil is key," he says. "What we do is imitate a forest soil that's decades old." The mini forest lowers the air and soil temperature in the summer heat and provides shade as well as a habitat for birds and insects.

Miriam Prochnow and Wigold Schaffer have dedicated their entire lives to saving the Atlantic Forest in Brazil. "We are witnessing an unprecedented crisis for humanity and cannot afford not to fight," says Prochnow. In the 1970s, the two started growing tropical trees on their terrace. Today they run a kind of non-profit tree nursery with 25 employees, and grow 200 different, mainly old species. To date, they've planted nine million trees, combatting clear-cutting in the Atlantic Forest.

Meanwhile, researchers at the Eberswalde University for Sustainable Development in Germany want to gain a better understanding of the forest ecosystem with the help of Indigenous peoples. They've been working with Colombia's Kogi people, known for their intuitive approach to nature. Their views on drought and pest damage provide inspiration for scientists like Carsten Mann: "For me, the main message of the Kogi is that it will be difficult to work against the laws of nature, and that we need to accept that." The researchers now want to use the knowledge of the Kogi to better protect forests in Germany.

NATO - Old Friends, New Fronts, Part 2

Since 1949, NATO has shaped Europe's security policy like no other organization. Article 5 of the North Atlantic Treaty outlines the principle of "collective defense". But is the world's largest military alliance ready to defend itself?

Marking the 75th anniversary of the founding of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, this documentary looks at the past, present and future of NATO. Among other things, it sheds light on vulnerabilities. For example, Article 5 of the North Atlantic Treaty is anything but binding. Unanimity among the member states is a prerequisite -- but by no means a certainty. And there are only partial guarantees in place when it comes to the speed with which troops and supplies must be delivered in extreme situations.

The film embarks on a journey across the Alliance's territory. The filmmakers visit Tallinn, in Estonia, where NATO's Cyber Defence Centre is located. From here they travel on to Ulm, in Germany, where the deployment of troops and supplies is organized. The next stop is NATO headquarters in Brussels, where political decisions are made. The film hears from high-ranking current and former NATO generals and security experts along the way.

With the help of international historians, the documentary also looks back on the 75-year history of NATO. Founded after the devastating experiences of the Second World War, the alliance's architects wanted to deter enemies. But even more importantly, they wanted to secure peace among the alliance partners - not least out of fears of Germany regaining strength.

The documentary draws on previously unseen archival film material: NATO portraits of member countries filmed in the 1950s to give soldiers a better understanding of one another's countries and thus enhance cohesion.

Important eyewitnesses, including Donald Trump's former National Security Advisor John Bolton and diplomat Wolfgang Ischinger, are featured. They provide context for recent NATO developments: How close was the US to leaving NATO in 2018? And what would the consequences have been? Was a promise really made not to expand NATO eastwards after the collapse of the Soviet Union? The film seeks an answer to this question, which continues to shape Russia's relationship with NATO to this day.

Green Shipping - Fueling the Future of Maritime Transport

Eighty per cent of all goods come to us by sea. But this form of transportation's carbon footprint is woefully bad. Ships are responsible for almost three per cent of global CO2 emissions. Shipping companies know their boats need a serious green boost.

Without ships, there's no global trade. New legal requirements and environmentally aware clients are putting increasing pressure on shipping companies to provide CO2-neutral transport. If these companies want to continue to play a key role, they must act. In response to this situation, a few pioneers are taking the first difficult steps. They want to switch their ships to climate-neutral fuels. It's a bold step.

Whereas an energy transition has long been underway in other transport sectors, up to now little attention has been paid to climate protection in international shipping. But now, the industry is under pressure. Legal requirements have either been passed or are about to be passed on both national and international levels.

The film accompanies shipowners, engineers and researchers as they navigate an energy revolution on the water. The sector needs to be reorganized in such a way that the climate and the environment are protected - while ensuring that international maritime transport remains profitable. Can this change succeed in time?

Getting married, starting a family, children - topics that often trigger heated discussions. While parents often vouch for traditional values and security, young people have their own ideas. Young people like Yoyo in Taiwan and Esraa in Egypt.

Yoyo lives with her parents in Taipei. She's 30 years old; her mother already had two children at that age. Her announcement that she plans to marry a woman comes as a shock to her parents. Same-sex marriages were only legalized in Taiwan in 2019. Although the country is one of the most liberal in Asia, Yoyo's parents fear she'll be marginalized and suffer discrimination. And: Yoyo wants to have children.

It's a largely similar picture in Esraa's home city Cairo. She's also in her early thirties and lives with her parents. The big difference here is that Esraa has already started a family. But her marriage has failed - like so many young marriages in Egypt. The nation has one of the highest divorce rates in the world. But Esraa's parents believe marriage should last forever. They're torn - they don't understand their daughter, but they also don't want to cut her off. How can they support Esraa and their little granddaughter? Should she stand on her own two feet - or re-marry as soon as possible?

In many parts of the world, parents often get involved in their adult children's family planning. Sometimes, this well-meaning support becomes a burden and ends up creating huge pressure. But even still, grandparents are important too.

The Hard Road Back to Life - Leaving a Cult Behind

Breaking free from the clutches of a cult or a cultish religious movement is a long and painful process. So far, it's one that has largely gone undocumented. Few people talk about the years of struggle -- and relapses - breaking free entails. Five people who have gone through the process talk about their experiences.

This documentary about leaving cultish religious movements behind illustrates how powerful the conditioning is -- and how deeply dependent it makes its victims. How is it possible to renounce one's own identity and "reprogram" the brain?

Nicolas has been exposed to this influence since birth: his parents are Jehovah's Witnesses. At the age of 22, he managed to break away from the Jehovah's Witnesses - but he had to cut off contact with his family. Julie was 31 and Yohann 20 when they both fell into the clutches of the French "Université de la relation" movement during what purported to be an 'internship in the field of personal development'.

David and François became "warriors of light" after they trained in kung fu at the Parc de la Villette in Paris -- and stuck with it for 10 years. They describe insidious manipulation and talk about how they were completely sucked into a parallel world.

The film's moving accounts of cult dropouts and their long journeys back to a normal life are supplemented by insights into the work of a French police unit specializing in new religious movements.

High Quality Meat, Best Animal Welfare - Butchers Against Factory Farming

Mark Junglas is disgusted by conventional factory farming. The trained butcher wants to do better. Eating meat is fine, he says. But only if the animals have led a good, species-appropriate life -- and experience a stress-free death.

When Mark was forced to slaughter a calf at the age of 16, it was a terrible experience. It also sparked his life-long commitment to animal welfare. Mark left the conventional meat industry. Three years ago, the 35-year-old took over the management of an ultra-modern organic farm with over 100 cattle. He keeps his cattle in a species-appropriate manner and uses his own slaughtering and distribution processes.

But getting the farm out of the red while holding his own against the influx of cheap meat is no easy task. Even though animal welfare is very much in vogue, few people are prepared to pay more for organic meat. Mark has lots of ideas about how to boost sales: he experiments with meat dishes he creates himself and tries to win over a new, nutrition-conscious clientele via social media channels and marketing. The film accompanies Mark Junglas on his journey. Will he remain true to himself, and his animals, through all the ups and downs? Or will he give up on his mission to strive for the highest animal welfare -- and the best meat?

Winning Hearts and Minds - Afghanistan After the Withdrawal of NATO Forces

When international troops withdrew in 2021, the Taliban recaptured Afghanistan. The 'forever war' was over. But this documentary shows how western military forces were misled or acted on insufficient intelligence -- with fatal consequences for the Afghan civilians they were sent to protect. The documentary "Winning Hearts and Minds" shows how western forces were deliberately misled and in many cases acted on the basis of inadequate information. The results were a disaster for the Afghan population.

In 2006, when Danish and British troops were deployed to Musa Qala in Helmand Province, southern Afghanistan, the mission was clear. They were to defend their allies, the local police forces, against Taliban insurgents. But this plan was based on a misconception. While the local police in Musa Qala were seen as the allies of the West in the fight for democracy and human rights, in reality they supported a brutal and murderous drug cartel.

Filmmakers Martin Tamm Andersen and Nagieb Khaja uncover this scandal, as well as the local police's alliance with the brutal brothers Koka and Issa Khan. The filmmakers also examine a corrupt ex-governor's hold over the Musa Qala police and how this man exploited western involvement to help his drug trade. Musa Qala eventually fell to the Taliban, as the population faced a choice between a ruthless drug cartel and an extremist regime.

The film reveals the tragic betrayal of the international mission that ultimately left an entire country in chaos.
