A Network of History Researchers and Educators

- Facilitated a team of 24 environmental history professors, postdoctoral fellows and graduate students working at different institutions across Canada to develop public history projects, workshops and conferences.
- Secured over \$20 000 in grant-based funding to support the "Now and Then" initiative creating opportunities for high school students to reflect on and build their understanding of historical consciousness and public impact
- Designed content and resources (slide deck, handout and promotional video) for the "How to Talk History" workshop and facilitated training for workshop presenters. To date, this workshop has been delivered 17 times at 9 different universities across Canada.
- Currently working in collaboration with an interdisciplinary team of computer scientists, geographers and historians to develop a historical mapping software application.

- Lobbied for the creation of a program assistant position to update the curriculum of the summer school program with the goal of better integrating the skillsets required to conduct effective historical research
- Conducted a graduate-student needs assessment through a purpose-built website, which resulted in data gathered from almost 800 distinct users

- Designed two educational streams “Focus on Technology” and “Focus on Diversity” to run concurrently during the summer school, with workshops and sessions including introductions to GIS and mapping software, presentations on digital archiving and preservation, building trust in marginalized communities, and self-disclosure in the classroom.
