During his lifetime, Emil Brunner (1889– 1966) was a highly influential and renowned theologian, instrumental in shaping the course of modern Protestant theology. Yet in recent decades he has been neglected. In this major study Alister McGrath, himself one of the world's leading theologians, presents an insightful reappraisal and comprehensive intellectual history of the influential Swiss thinker.
