

Handout - Rita Moreno

Examine each of the materials below, and answer the associated questions. Once the answers are complete, share what you learned about Rita Moreno with your group.

Biography

Rita Moreno, born Rosa Dolores Alverio, moved to New York from Puerto Rico with her mother at the age of 5. As a young girl, she was bullied because of her Puerto Rican heritage, and found a love of dancing as an escape.

At the age of 11, she started translating English speaking films into Spanish as her first steps into the film industry. She got her first role on Broadway at 13 and started receiving attention from Hollywood agents. She left school at the age of 15 to pursue a career in film and she started supporting her family financially. She began a contract with MGM studios and started using the stage name Rita Moreno.



For the first years of her career, Rita was only offered stereotypical ethnic roles because of her Puerto Rican roots. She was asked to play

various ethnicities from Hawaiin, Native American, Egyptian, Filipino and Burmese. Moreno felt alone during this time because she had no role models in the industry to help guide her. There were not many women of Hispanic heritage that experienced what she went through in film. She felt she had to take the parts so she could make a living.

Moreno's most memorable role came in 1961, when she played Anita in *West Side Story*. During the film, Moreno's features were darkened along with other cast members to seem more "Puerto Rican". Moreno won an Oscar for her performance but was still only offered ethnic roles, so she left Hollywood and acted in summer theater until the 1970s.

She returned to Hollywood in the 1970s and is still acting today with her most recent roles in 2023's *Fast X* (from the *Fast and Furious* franchise) and the 2021 remake of West Side Story. Rita Moreno is one of only eighteen people to achieve an EGOT (meaning winning an Emmy, Grammy, Oscar and Tony).
