MR. MENZIES' FINAL SENATE CAMPAIGN MESSAGE

"Government Stands By Its Policy and Achievements"

CANBERRA, May 7.-The Commonwealth Government will be content to be jurged by its policy and its achievement of that policy. The Prime Minister (Mr. R. G. Menzies) said this to-night in his final Senate campaign message, adding that all he asked was that the people compare the state of affairs when his Government came into office with the present condition of "unrivalled prosperity."

Mr. Menzies said that Labour had put forward no constructive policy but had sought successes on destructive criticism.

"In the present state of the Senate a vote for Labour was a vote for a deadlock." he declared. "This would mean an equally divided Senate which would prevent any Government from legislating except by the con-sent of its opponents. This position would be destructive of Parliamentary Government."
