Facts About the Conscription Measure

In Carmelo voting precinct, which takes in Carmel-by-the-Sea, Pebble Beach, Carmel Valley, and the Coast section, there are close to twenty-five men, 21 to 30 years old, liable to military call.

Plans for placing into active service the first contingent of 500,000 men for the United States army are now being worked out by the war department.

Numerous details are yet to be decided upon. It is probable, however, that in California the great register of the counties will be used for enrolling the men of military age and eliminating those who are exempt.

As soon as both houses of Congress finally pass the Conscription Bill, and it is signed by the President, proclamation for a period of registration will be issued throughout the country. Every man, married and single, able and disabled, between 21 and 30 years old, must present himself before a registration official for enrollment. Failure to comply will involve a severe penalty.

From this list those in certain occupations and circumstances will be exempt. After that the remainder will be sifted out by physical test.

From the list as it then stands it may be that the jury wheel system of selection will be used. Men thus selected will then await the order to proceed to the training camps.

It now seems probable that Colonel Roosevelt will be permitted to raise one or more divisions of volunteers for foreign service. This will remove the objections of many to compulsory foreign service.

It is estimated that five men from every thousand in the United States will be required to make up the 500,000 levy. Based on this ratio, California would have to raise about 15,000 and Monterey county 100 men.

Mrs. Austin's Romance of California

As a piece of fiction Mary Austin has done no finer work than that which she has put into "The Ford," a California romance dealing largely with oil and irrigation and with labor problems. Houghton, Mifflin Company are the publishers.

The work is a sincere and conscientious effort, for apart from her art as a novelist the writer has earnestly sought to give a faithful picture of the State, or at least those portions of it in which oil and irrigation problems prevail.

The early days, when began the discovery of oil on the pastoral lands, is the period.

The book opens with a fine description of the peaceful days in the old farmhouse. Then oil is struck, and the mistress of the home is carried away with a feverish desire to quickly acquire wealth. She urges her husband to sell and purchase the new stock—not the live variety, though it frequently moved lively enough. Large fortunes were being acquired in those days, but everybody did not acquire them, and this farmer was one of the miserable failures. The wife dies as the result of the financial disaster.

The romance then takes up the life of the children and the love element begins. The characters are so drawn that they live before the reader, and of action there is plenty.

Considered as a descriptive work, it is one of the best books about California that have been written.

Mrs. Austin has an enviable reputation as an American writer of fiction, and this new book should be placed in every library alongside of "Isidro," "The Land of Little Rain," and "Love and the Soulmaker."

Among the interesting articles contained in this 128-year old journal, the address of Congress to President George Washington and the reply of the first President thereto, presents a striking example of the patriotic spirit of the period.

The high regard in which the great publicist, Benjamin Franklin, was held by his contemporaries is set forth in a fine article.

Mr. Shackelford has placed the paper on exhibition at the bank in Soledad.

Pastor Anderson Is 82 Years Young

"When we came to Carmel to live last September, we thought we were among strangers in a strange land, but we have not found it so. Kindness and good cheer have greeted us everywhere.

"Last Thursday, the 10th, our 82nd mile stone, we were showered with love and good wishes and many good things for our birthday breakfast and dinner and supper, besides gold and silver, which will help to reduce the H. C. L.

"In the evening we were invited out to beautiful birthday dinner.

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my little ones, ye have done it unto me."

Rev. Colin Anderson, the writer of the foregoing, has had a most interesting career. He left his native Scotland on his birthday in 1853, arriving in San Francisco by way of Cape Horn, in November. He preached his first sermon in the old adobe church in Santa Clara. He later joined the "Saddle-bag Brigade" and traveled up and down, through Santa Clara, Napa and Lake counties, preaching the gospel to the scattered pioneers. He recalls many eventful occurrences during the war between the States, and tells of the manner in which the news of the assassination of Lincoln was received in California. In 1901 Rev. Anderson visited Scotland.

Socialists May Change The National Headquarters

In a letter to the members of the Socialist Party, it is proposed that the national headquarters of the Socialist Party should be moved from Chicago to Washington. "This is the first step which the membership of the party must insist upon if the loss to our prestige and power in the great shrinkage of our vote in 1916 is to be overcome," says the letter. "We must go into the political center of the Nation and there fight our way to recognition as the only spokesman of the workers' cause. Too long have we stayed away from direct contact and conflict with the nation's political processes—the preparation and enactment and administration of Federal laws.

"Others have taken our place as the 'radical' minority on every public issue argued before committees of the House and Senate—Single Taxers, Bull Mosers, unions against militarism, labor leaders of conservative views, and delegates of charitable and religious organizations. Socialism, the foremost revolutionary and enlightening power on earth today, has been silent.

"We have lost one-third of our voting strength in four years. We have lost, for a time at least, the driving power of a succession of victories which were ours a few years ago. We are virtually at a standstill in the political life of the country. The reason for our weakness is that we are refusing to function in that very political life and struggle of the National Government which we seek to dominate."

Our Weekly Recipe

BARLEY BROTH

Cut one pound of mixed vegetables and fry in two ounces of fat to a light color. A pinch of salt and sugar helps to produce the required flavor. Cover with three pints of water and cook for 30 minutes; strain. Wash two ounces barley and place in a saucepan with two ounces carrots, two ounces turnips, two ounces onions, two ounces celery, all cut into small dice, and cover with the stock. Season to taste and cook for one hour. Finish with a little coarsely chopped parsley. The vegetables from the stock are used for vegetable croquettes.

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

Unsecured Personal Property
The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.
