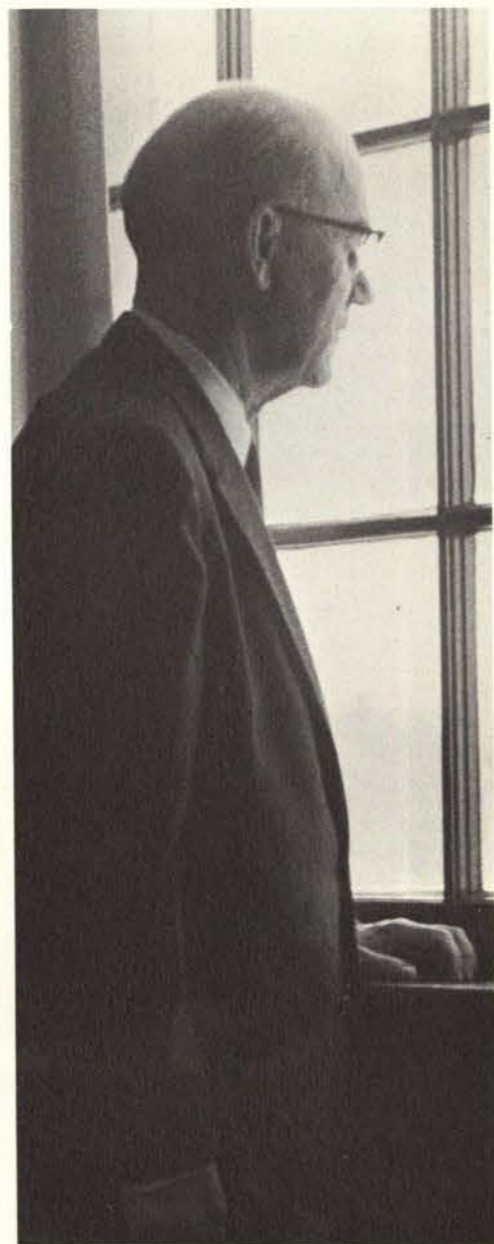
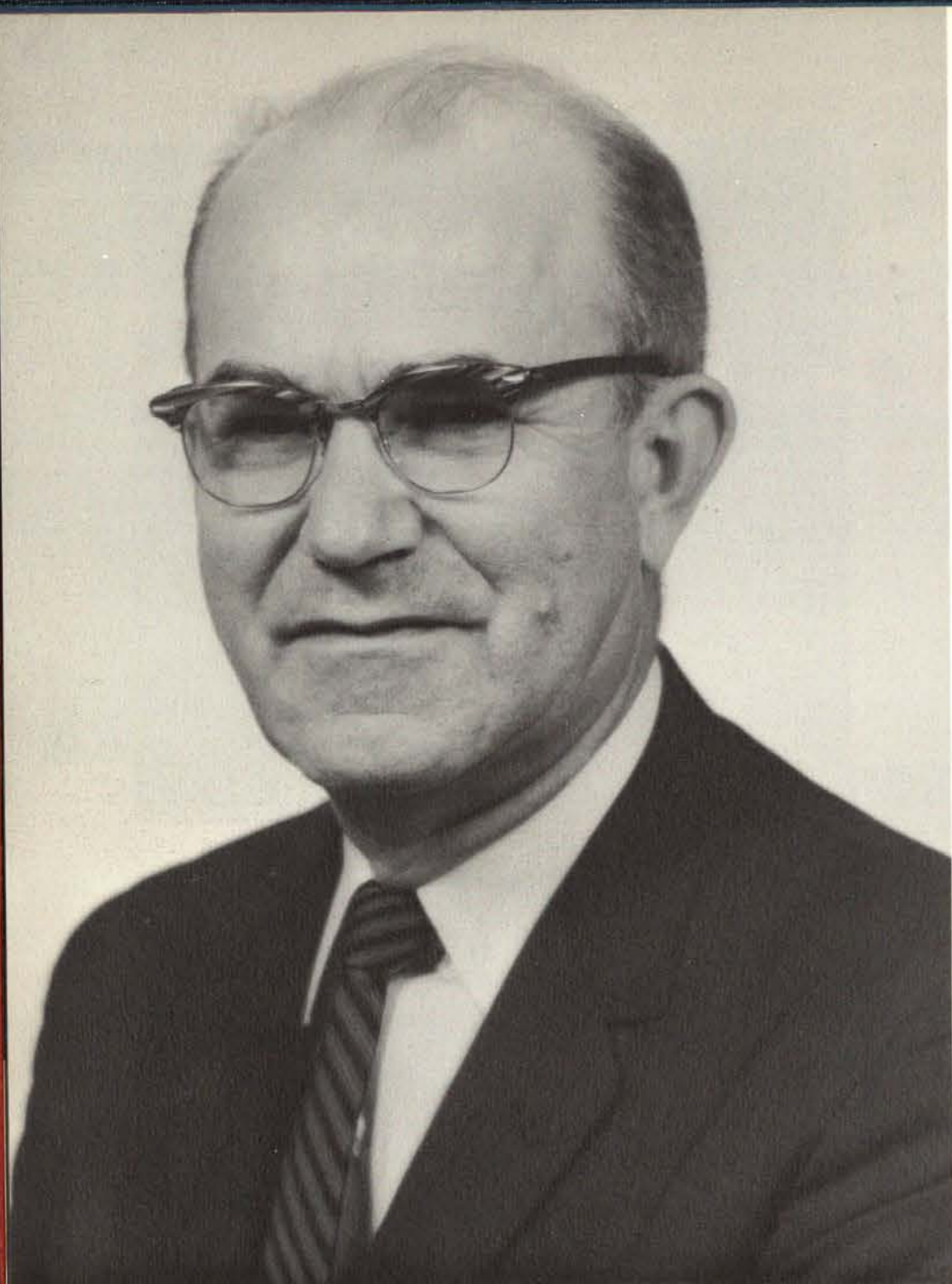
# THE BEGINNING OF THE YEAR



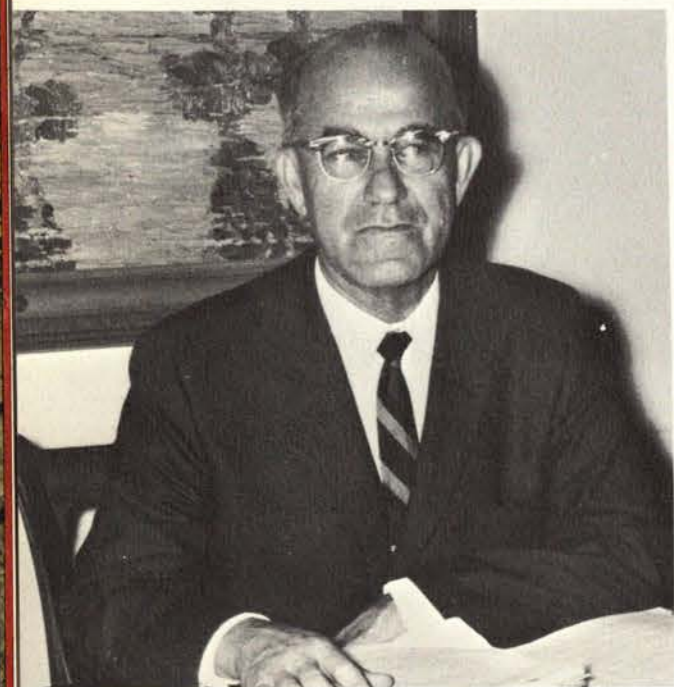

### President Lindquist

Selected by the Board of Regents to succeed Dr. Harry F. Corbin, who resigned in May of 1963, Dr. Emory Lindquist is the fifth president of the University.

A Phi Beta Kappa, former Rhodes Scholar at Oxford University in England, and former president of Bethany College at Lindsborg, Dr. Lindquist was University Professor at W.U.

Dr. Lindquist received his A.B. degree from Bethany College. He was awarded a B.A. degree with honors from Oxford in 1933 and received an M.A. degree there in 1937. In 1941, he received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Colorado.

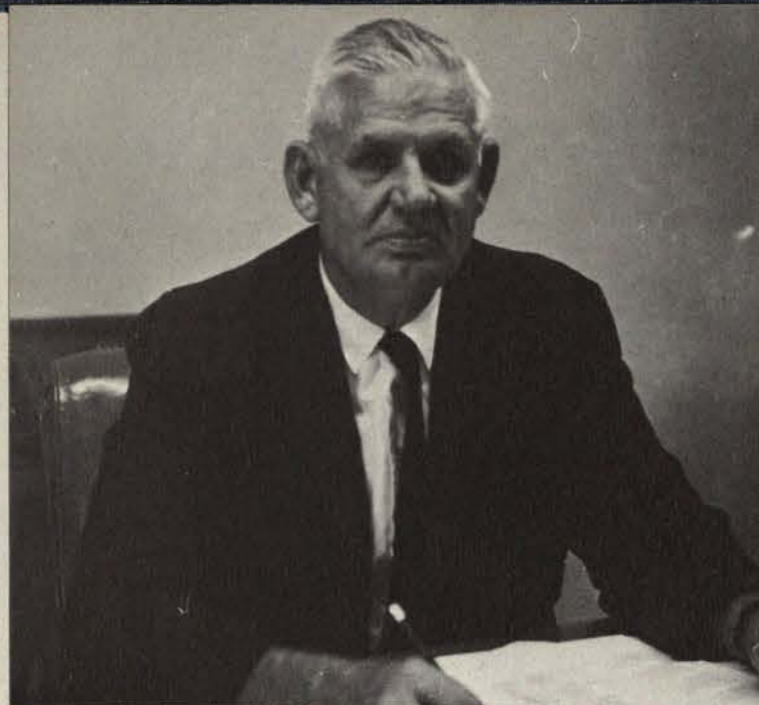
In a special message to the students, Dr. Lindquist expresses his own enthusiasm for the 1963-64 school year:

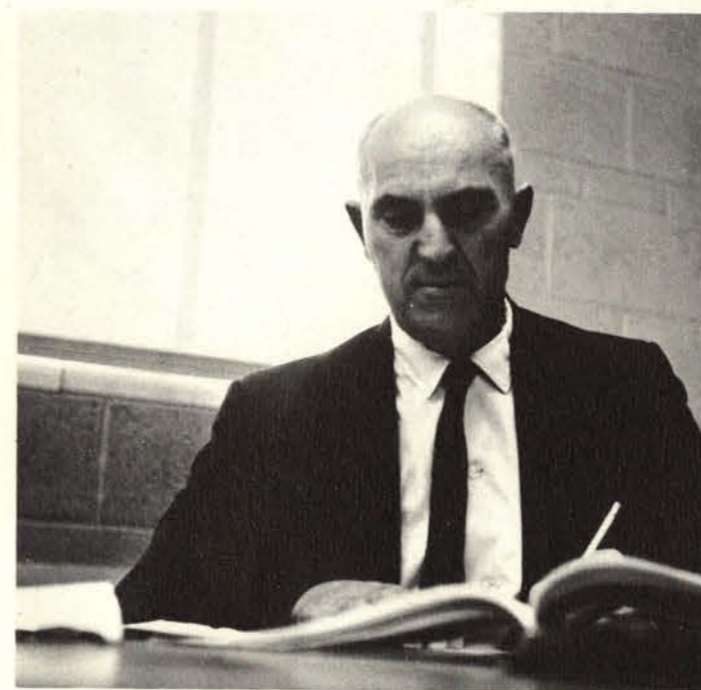
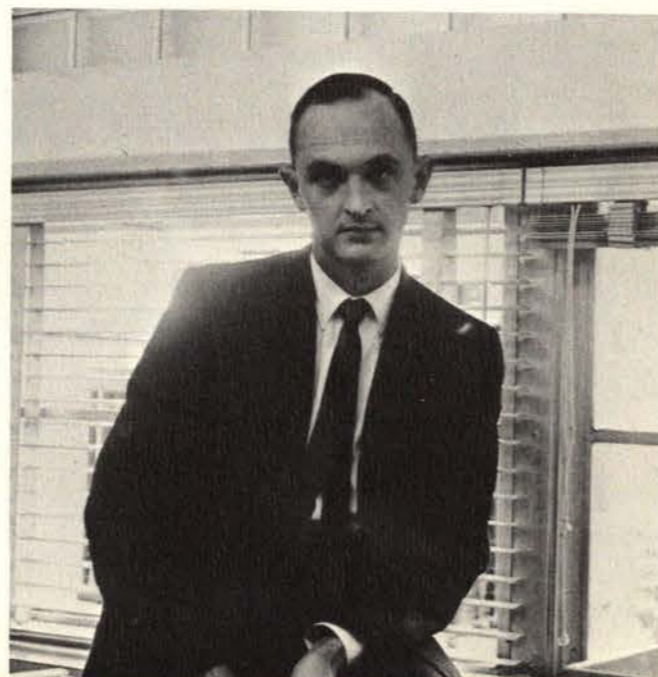

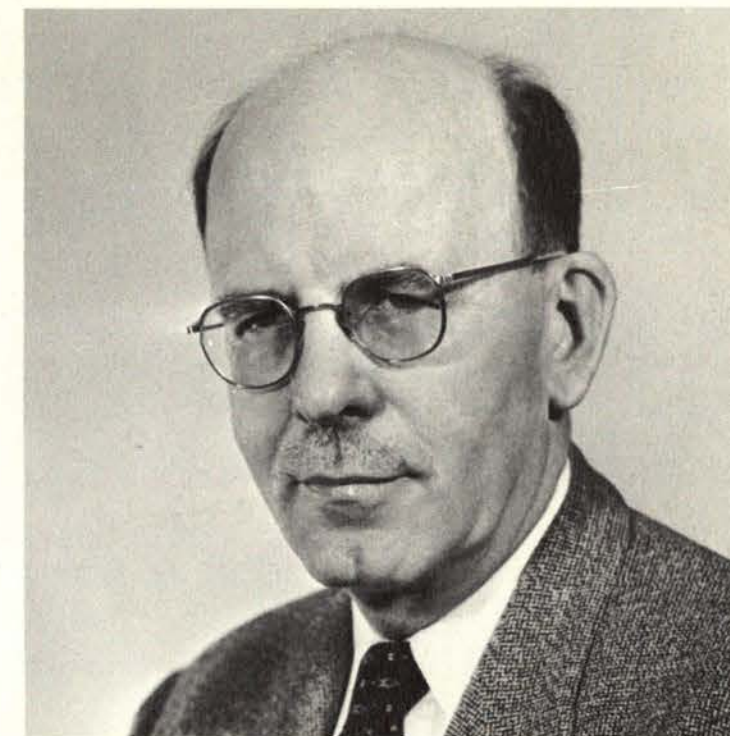
## Institute of Logopedics

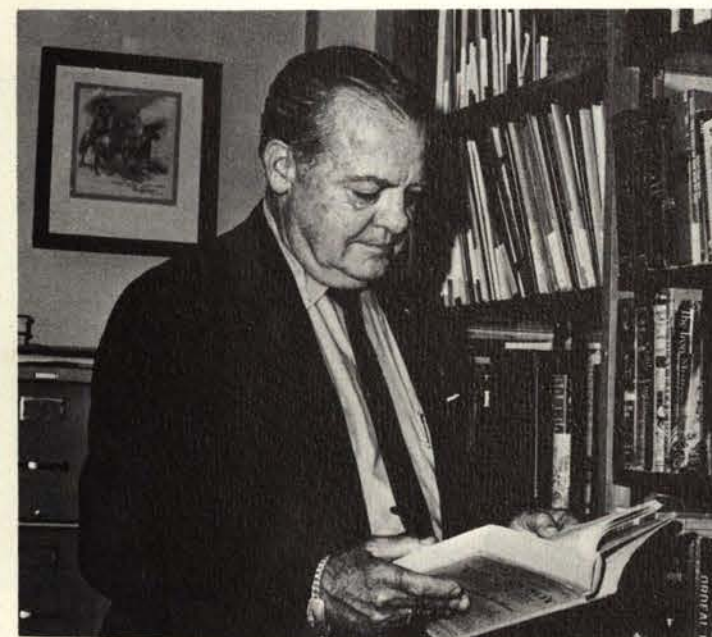

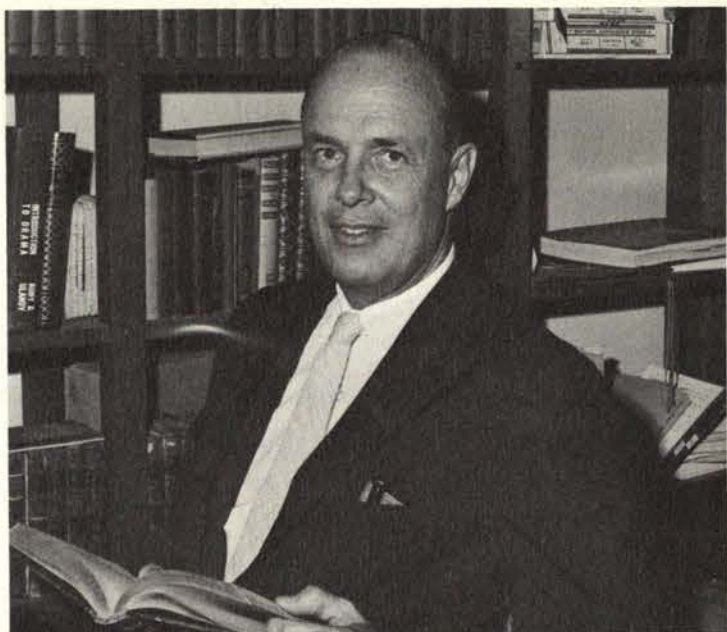

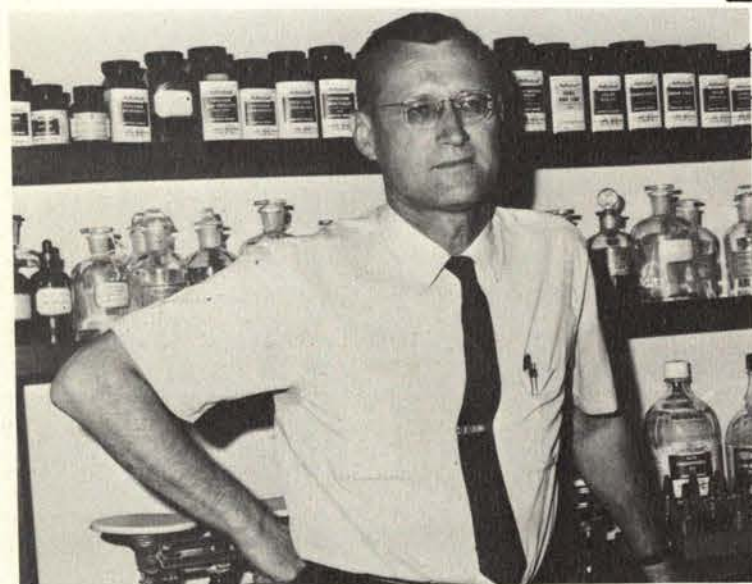

The College of Education, guided by Dean Jackson O. Powell, provides a curriculum to train students for teaching careers at the elementary and secondary levels.

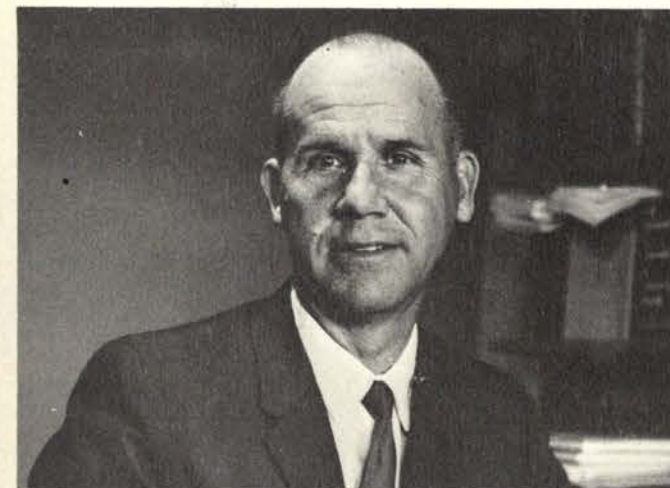

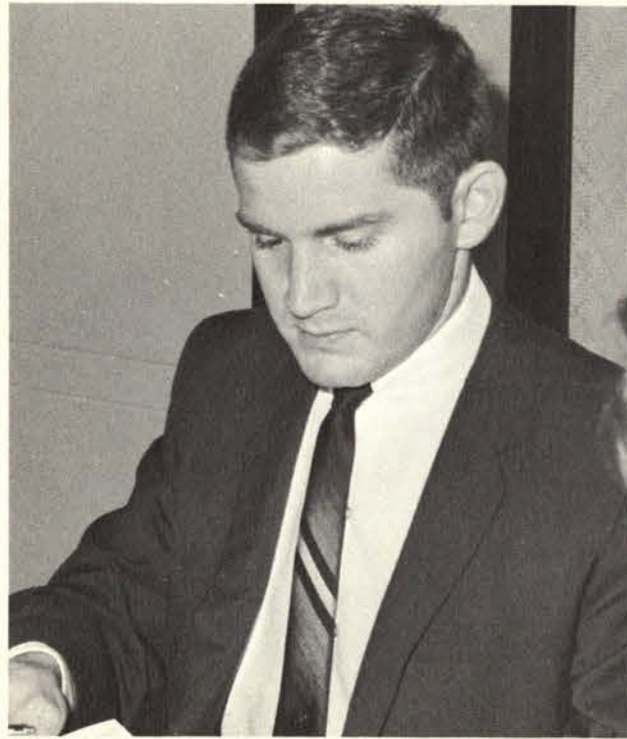

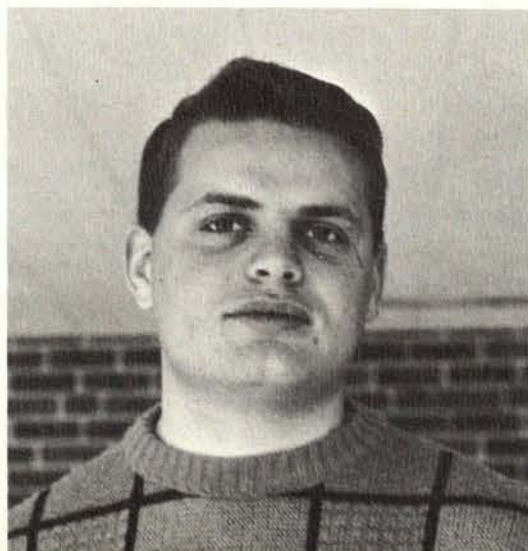

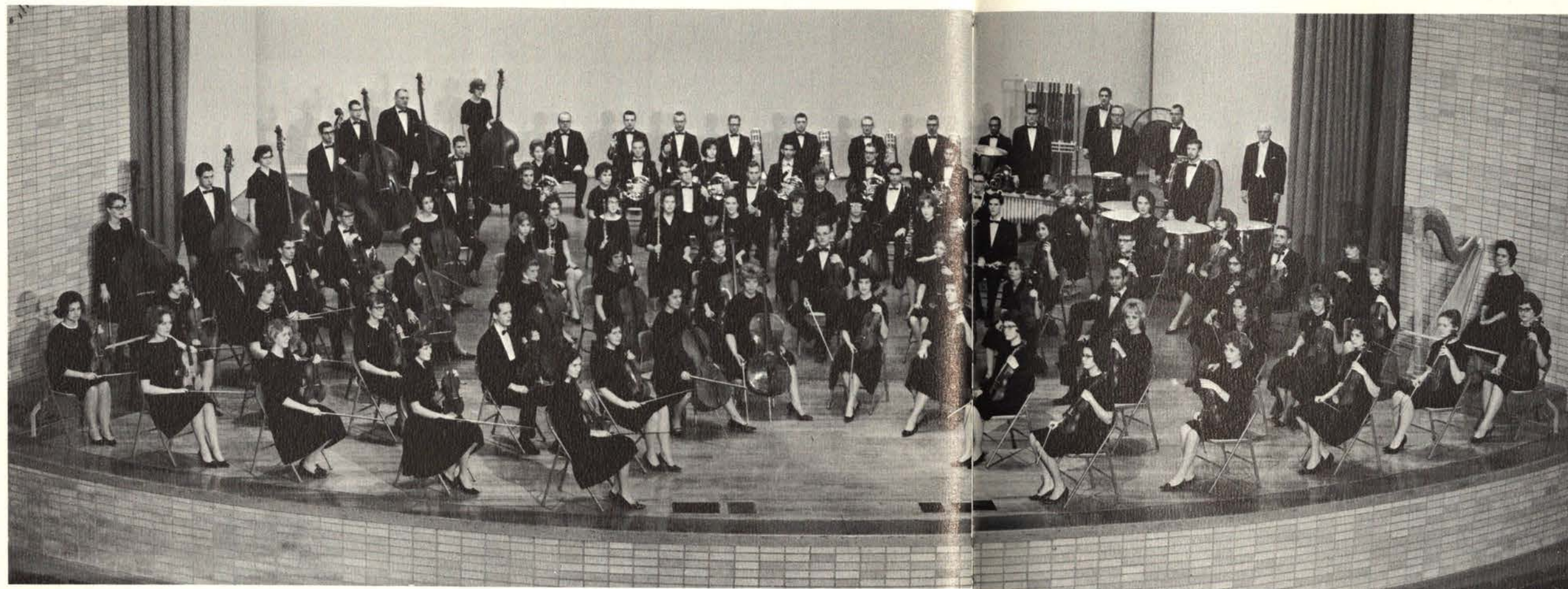

Presidents of each class serve as members of the SGA Congress. The senior class officers take charge of selling graduation announcements and Senior Week.



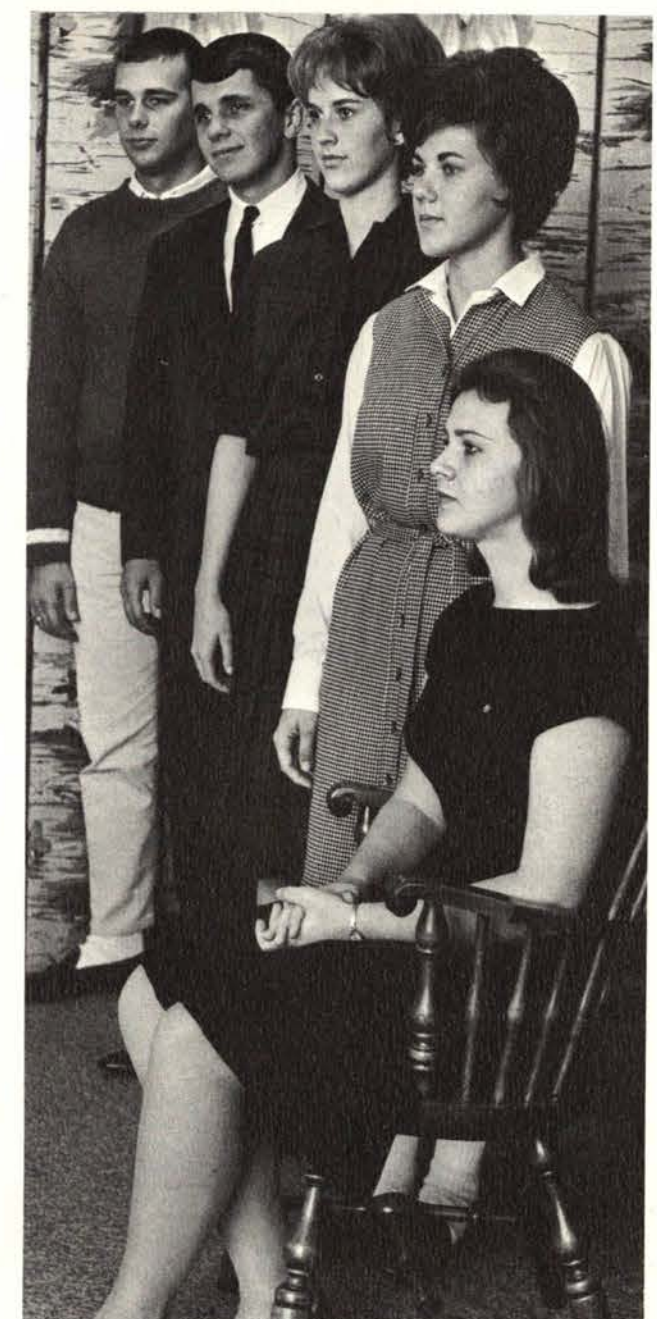

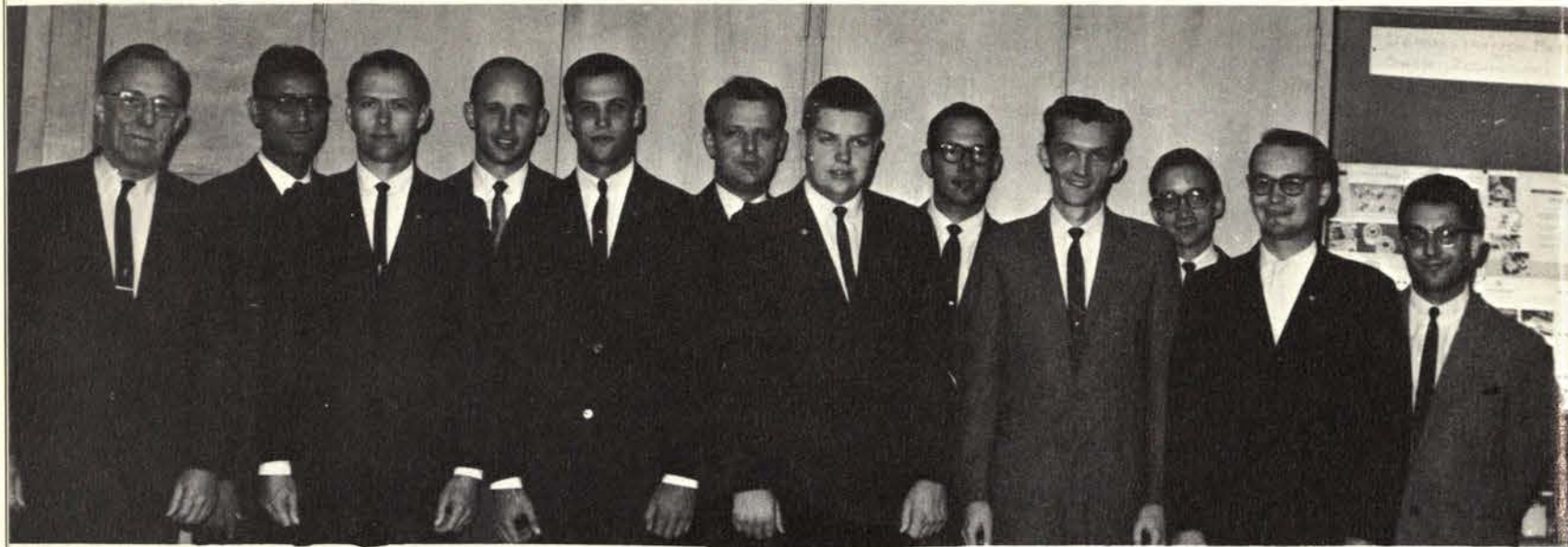

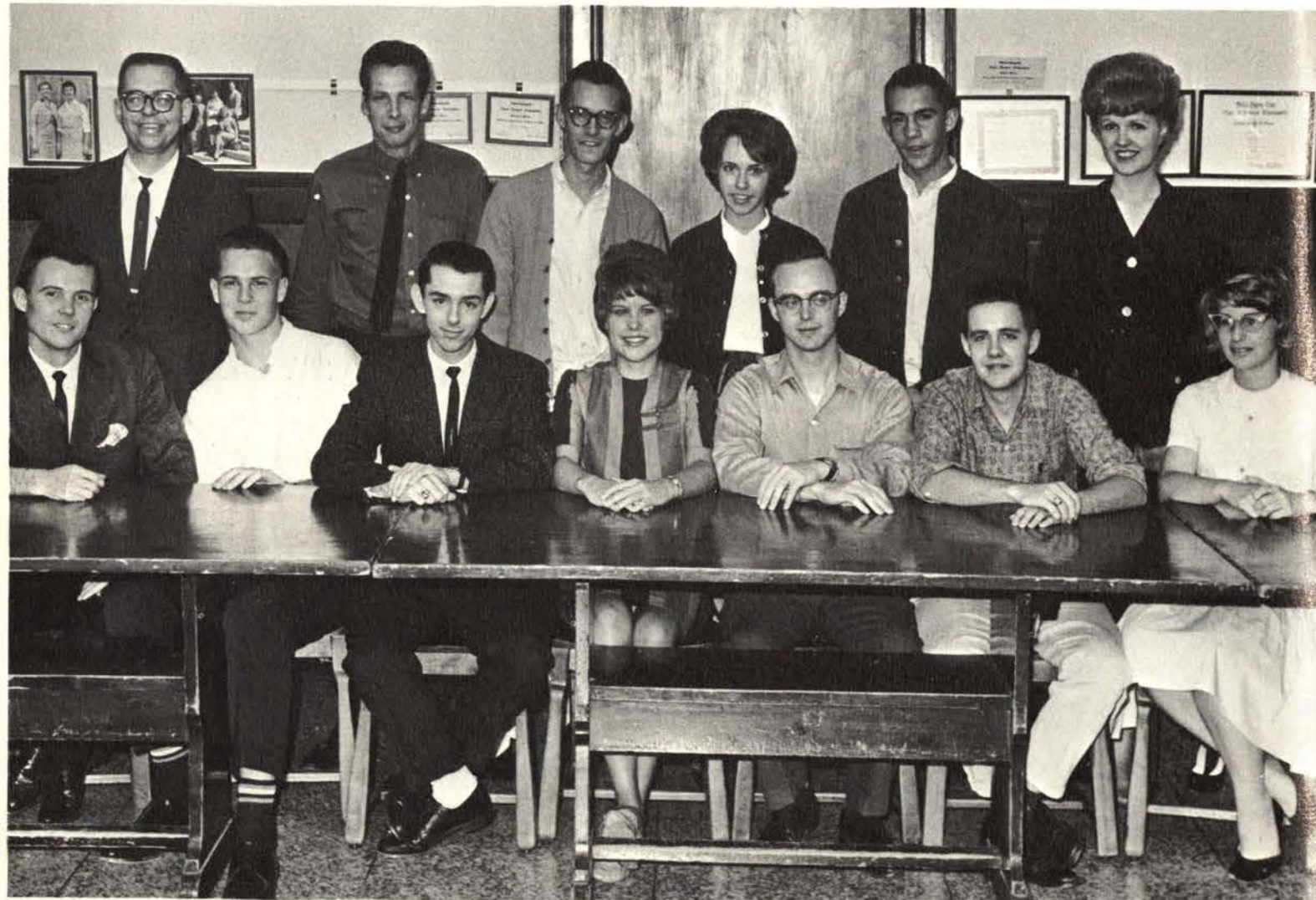

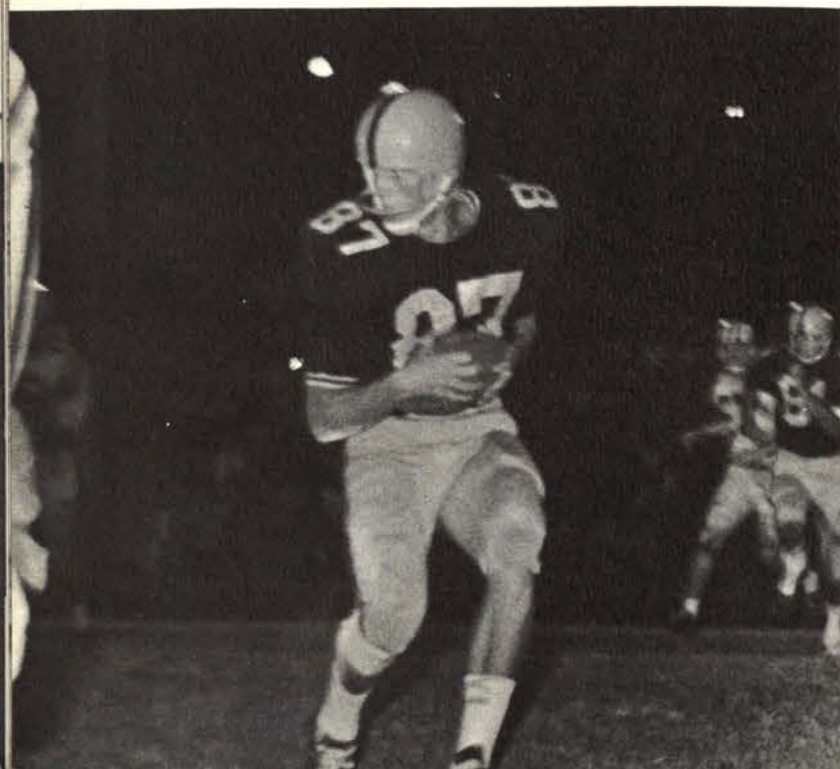
Wichita opened its home season by defeating Hardin - Simmons University 26-12 before a record crowd of 15,720.

A big second period in which Wichita tallied three touchdowns was the deciding factor in the victory.

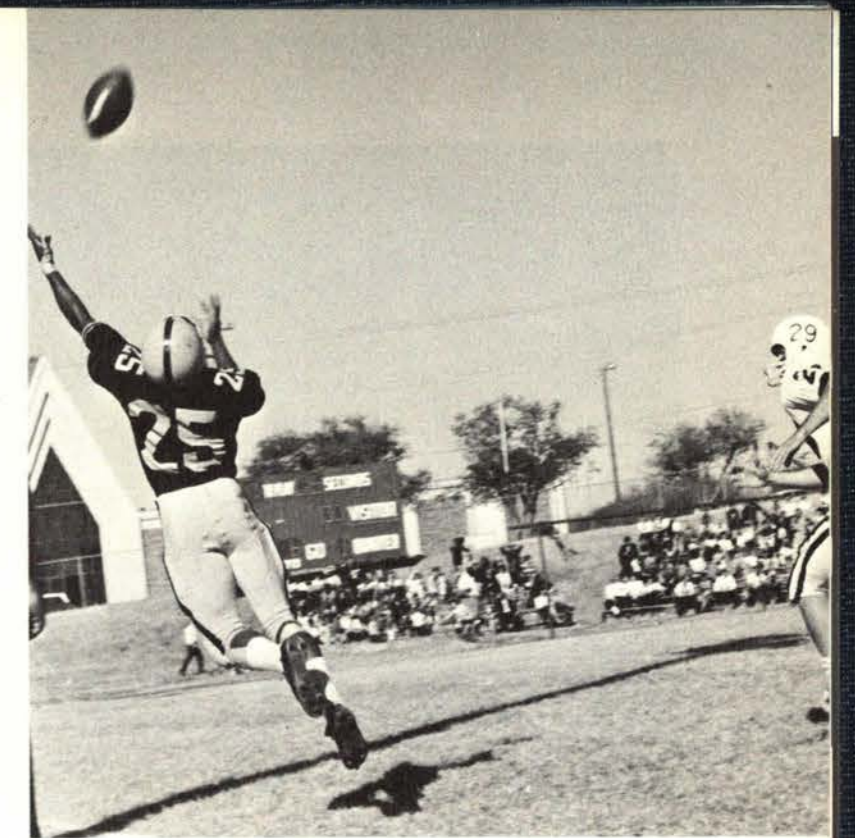

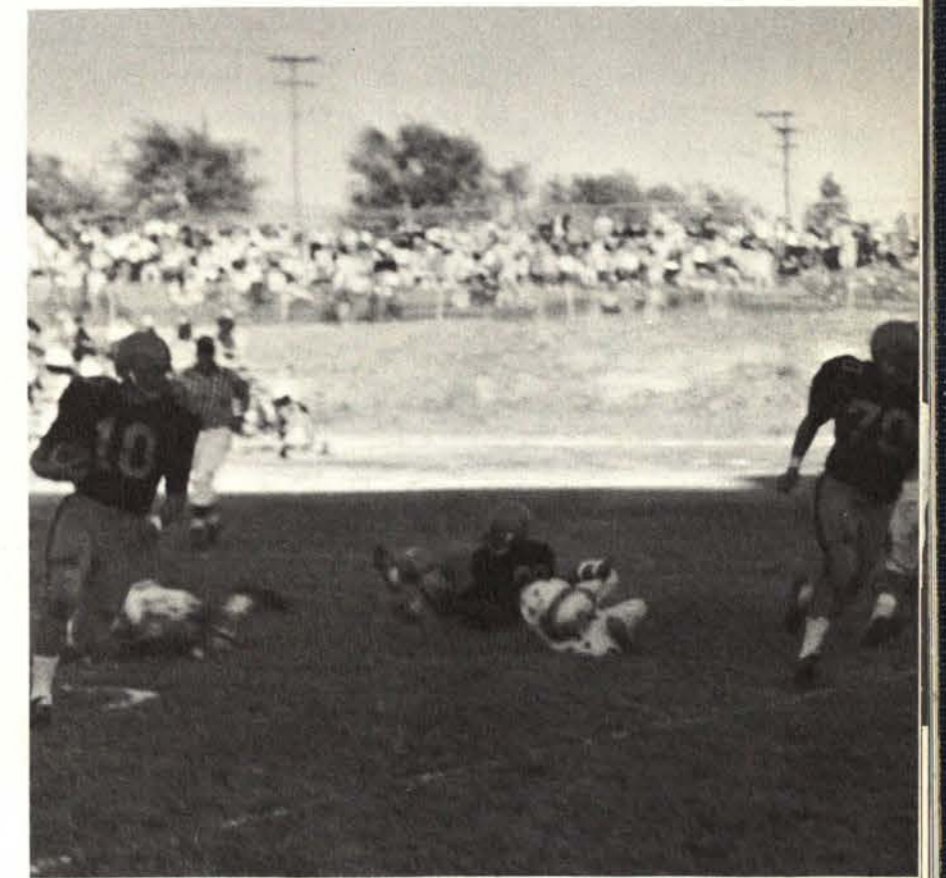

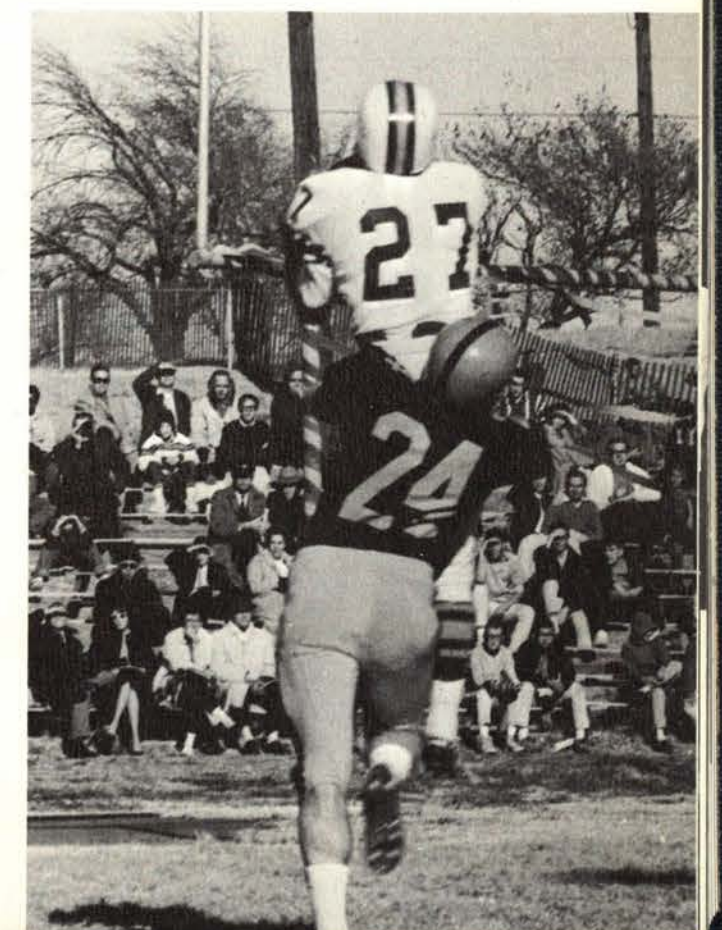

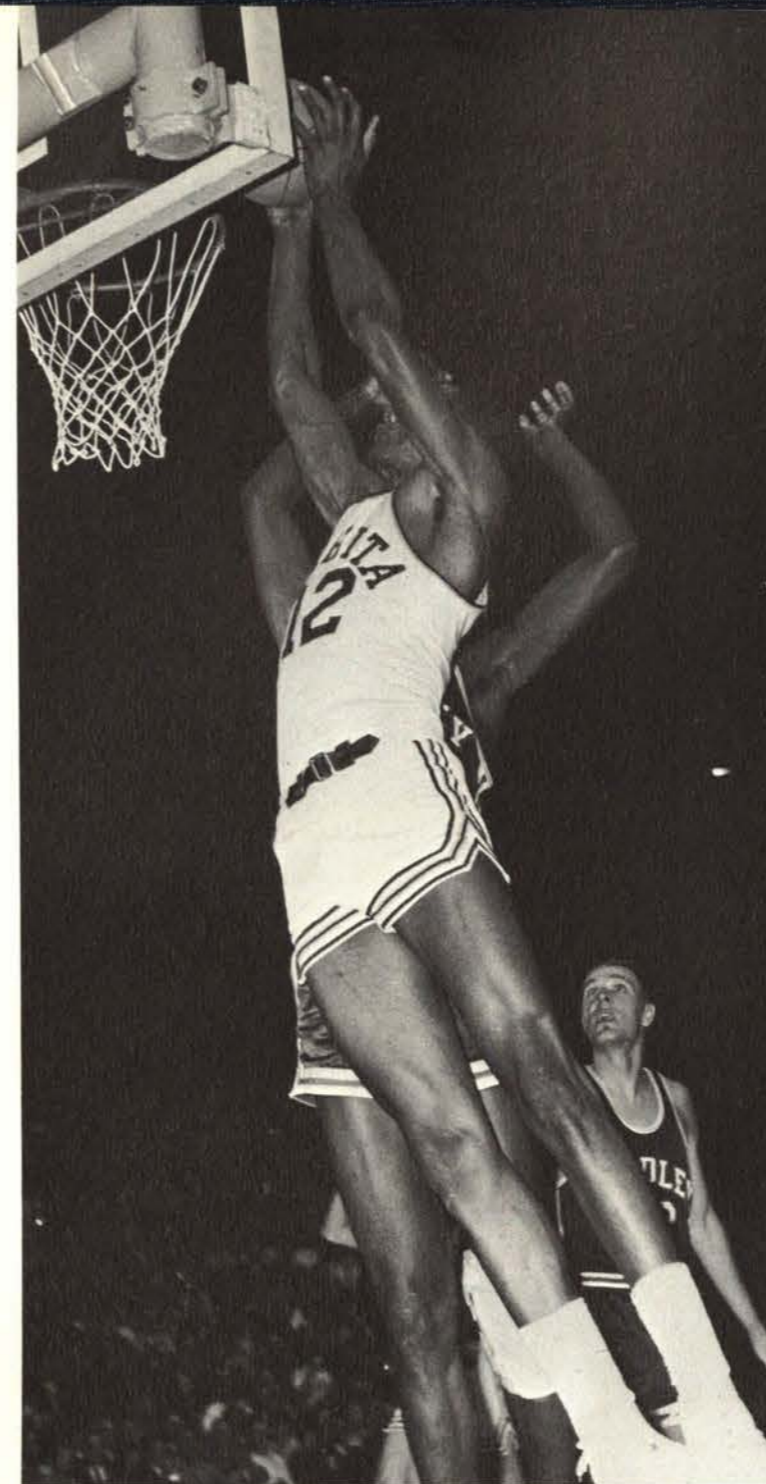

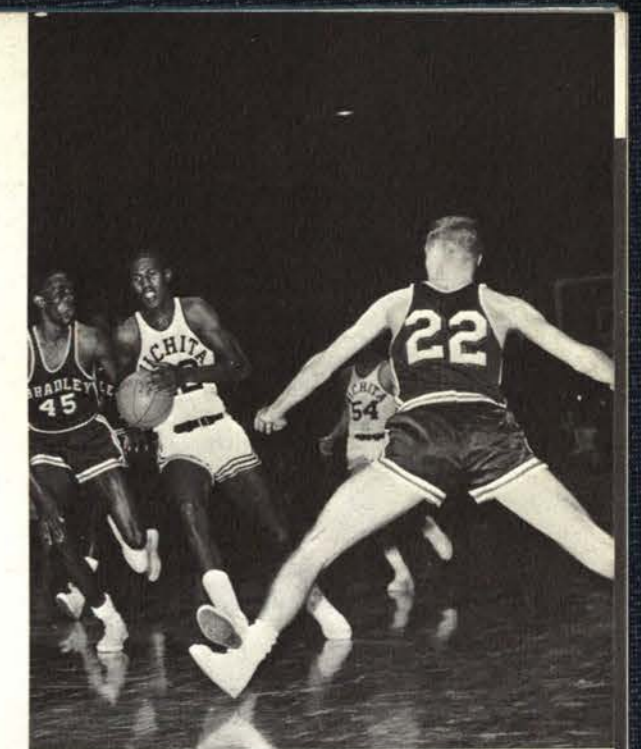

Dave Stallworth and Nate Bowman were Wichita's big guns for the night.

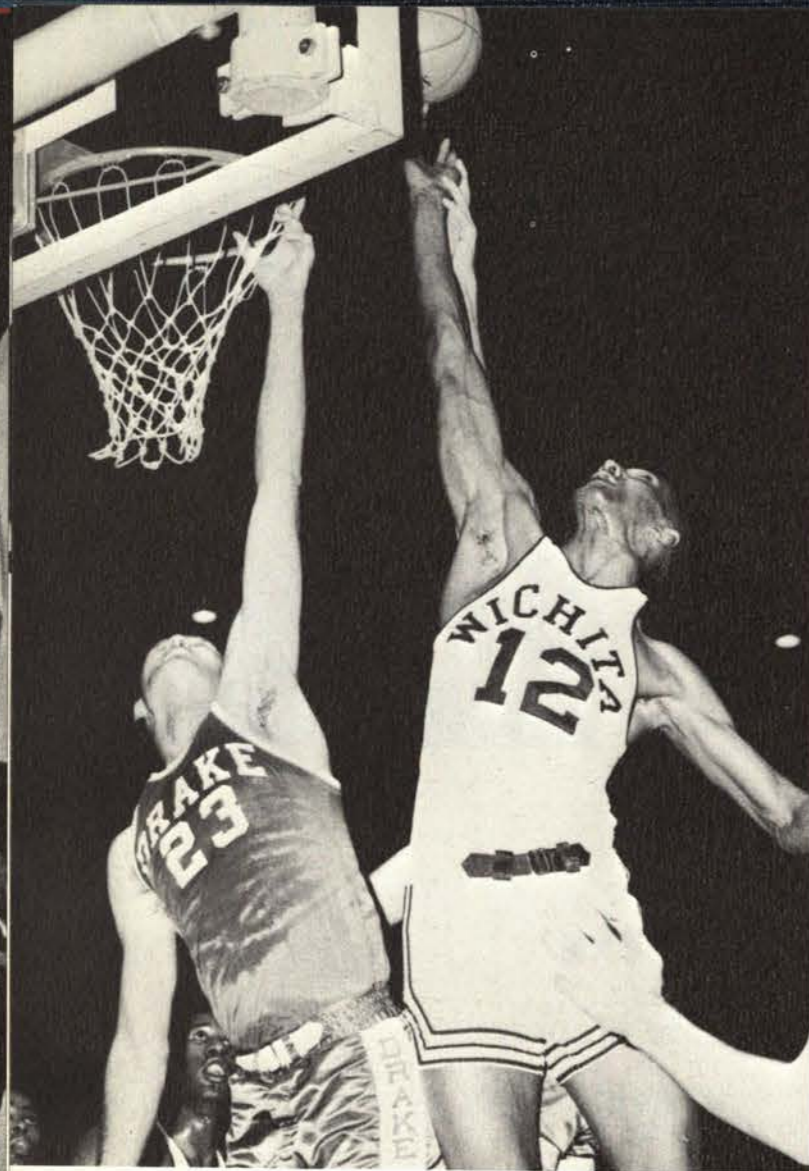

Bowman, playing his best game of the year, rang up a total of 35 points, while Stallworth hit 34. Twenty one of Bowman's output came in the opening half.

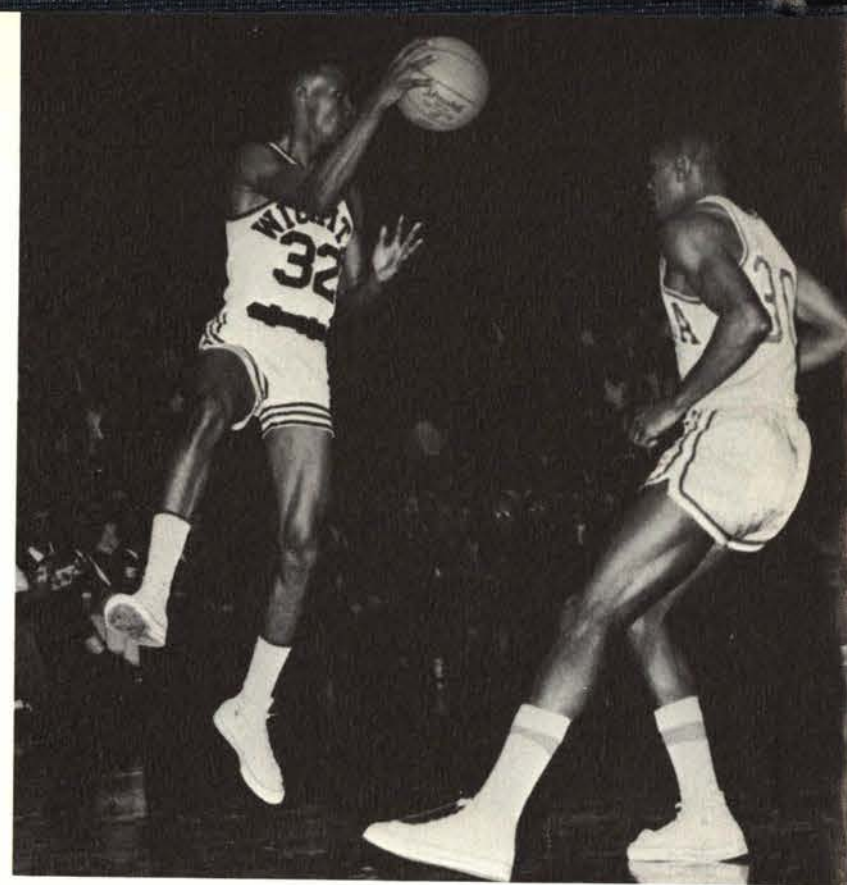

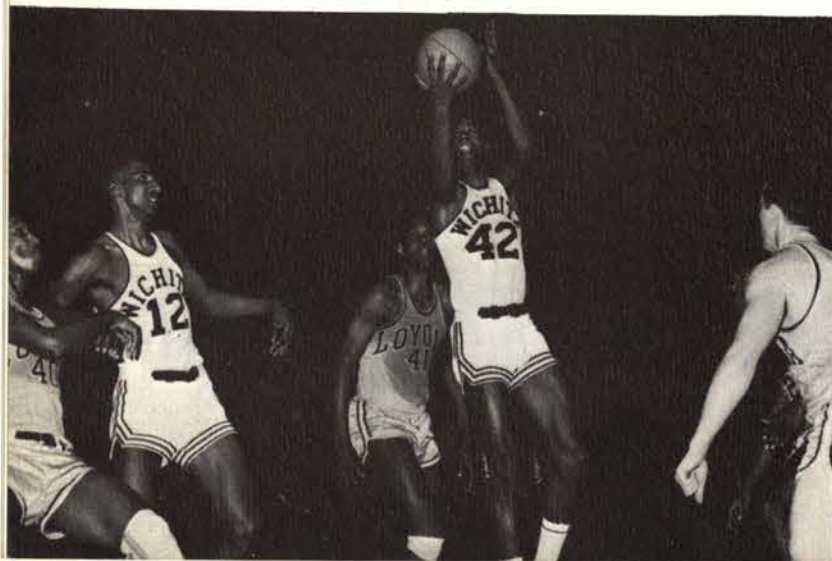

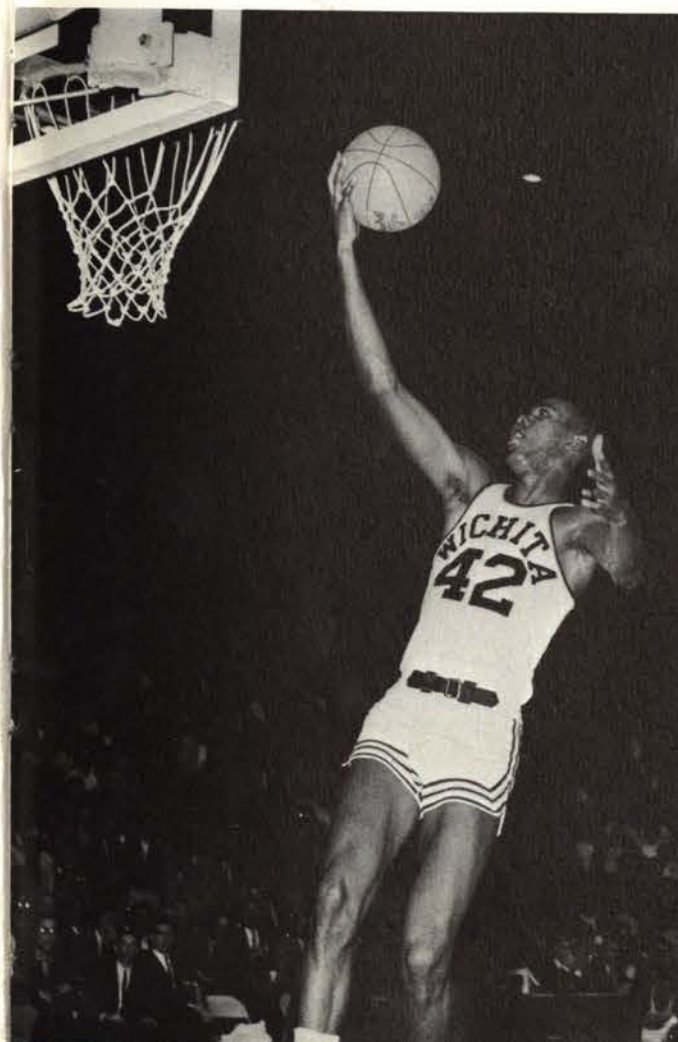
Moore was the Wichita leading scorer with 24 points. Moore and Dave Leach led the Shockers in assists with four apiece.

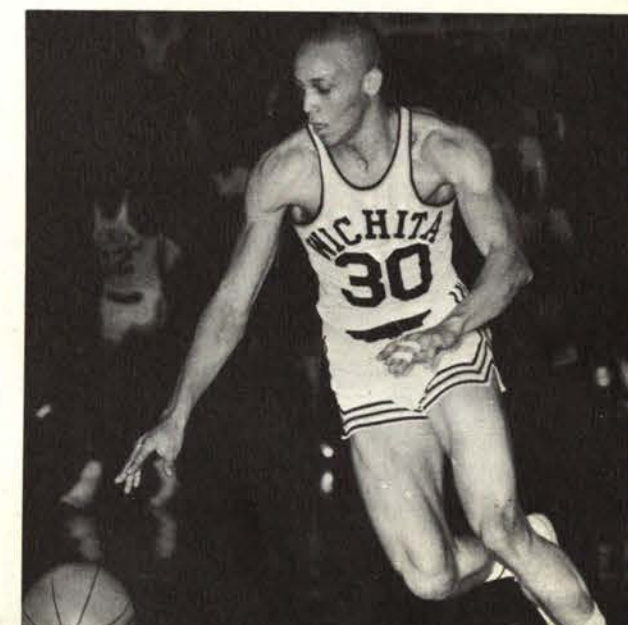

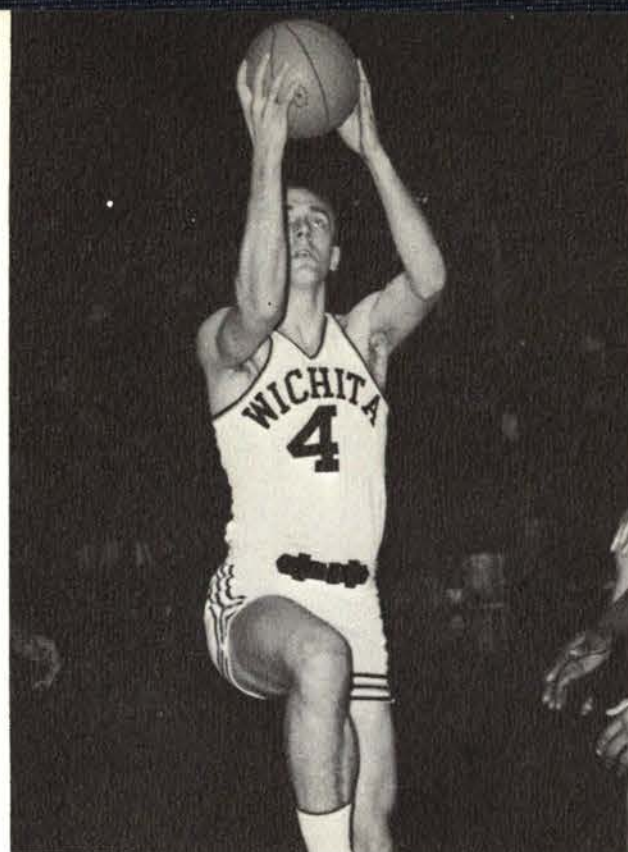


Kelly Pete displays his ball-handling ability in the Cincinnati game.





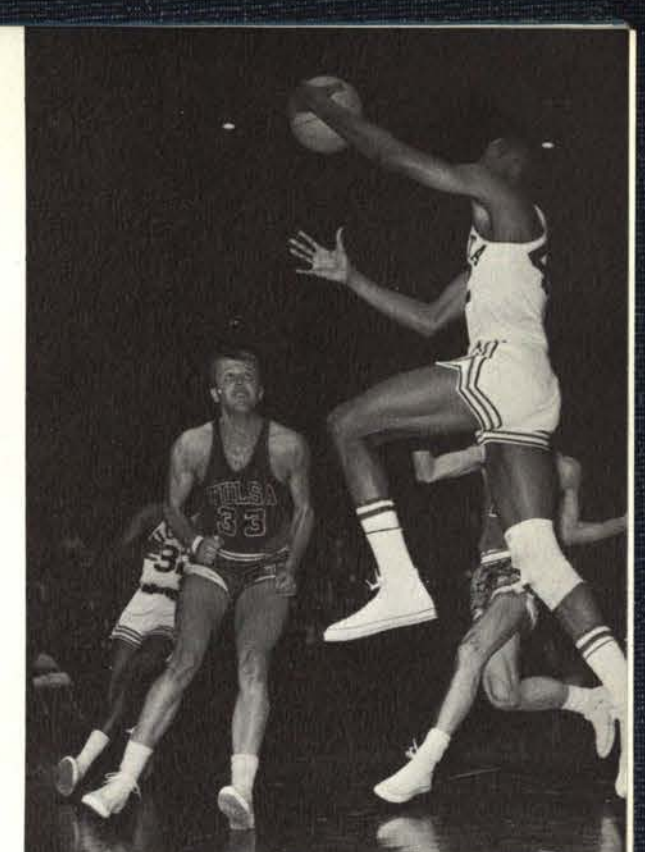

The University of Wichita cagers capped a brilliant season by winning three clutch games to grab a share of the MVC title and clinch a spot in the NCAA regionals.

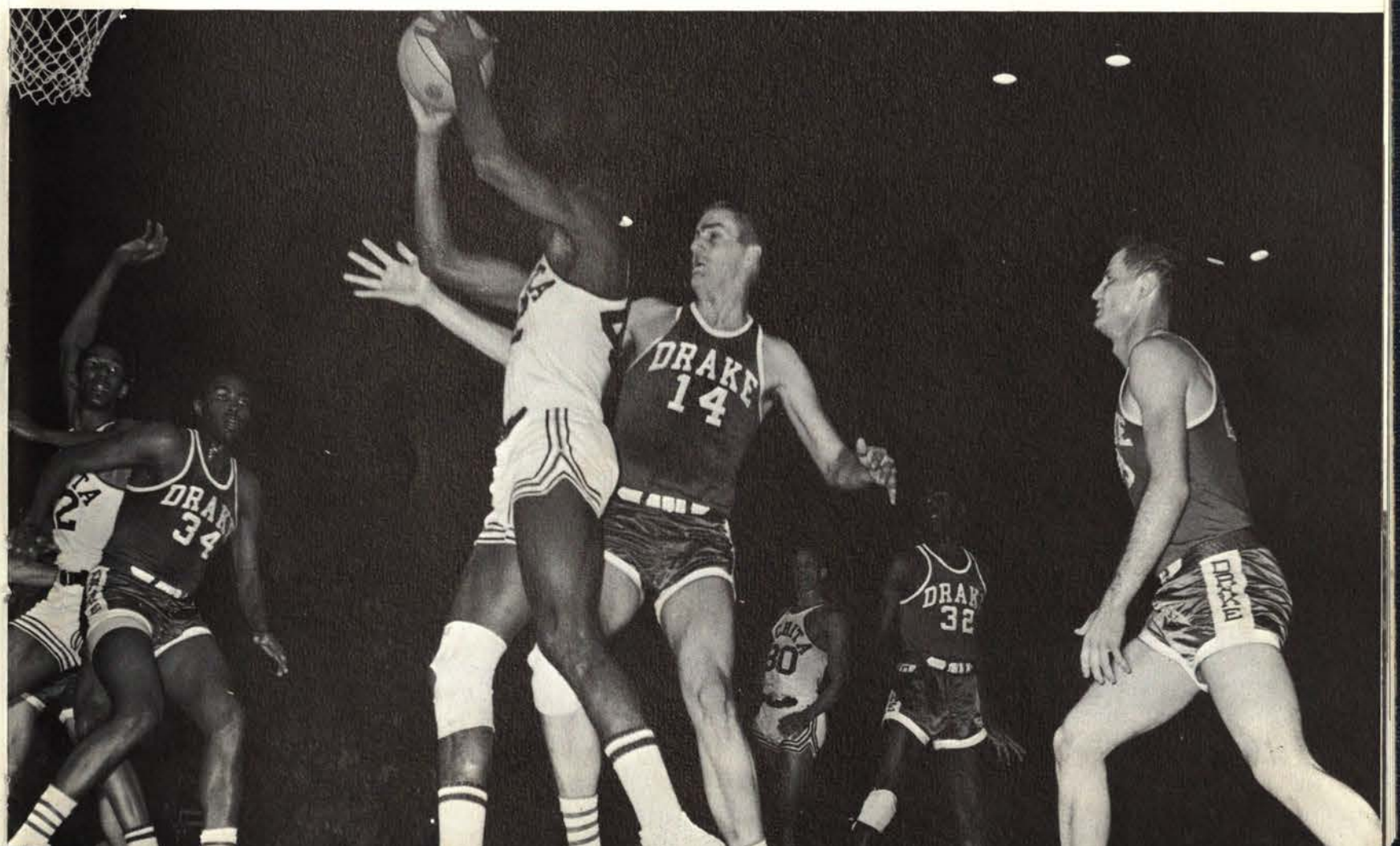
With the pressure on, the Shockers beat St. Louis, downed Tulsa and won a clutch play-off victory against the Drake Bulldogs.

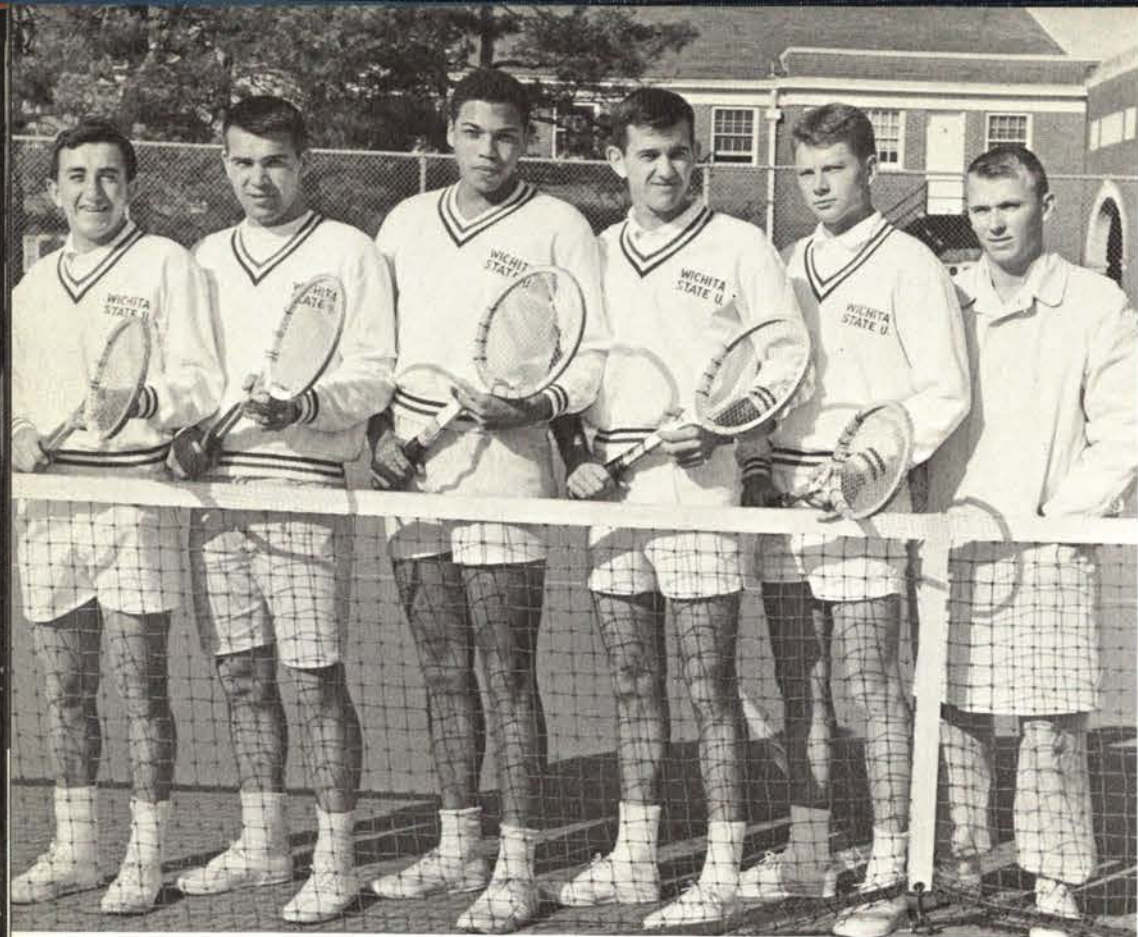

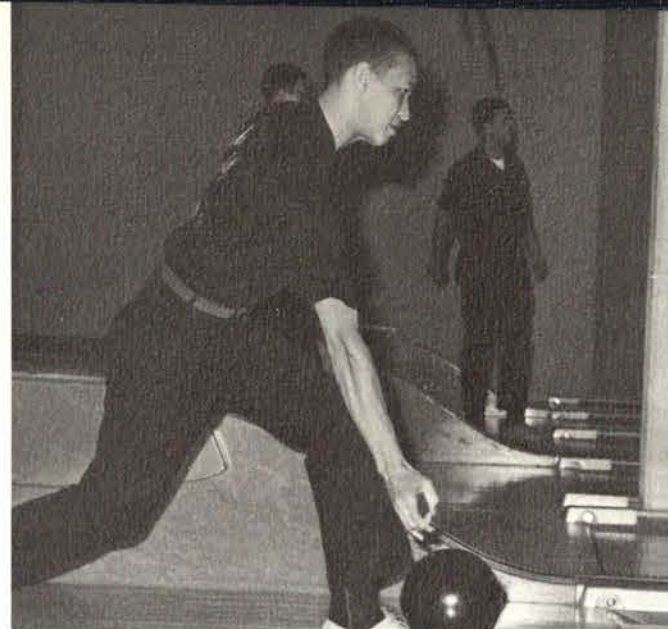

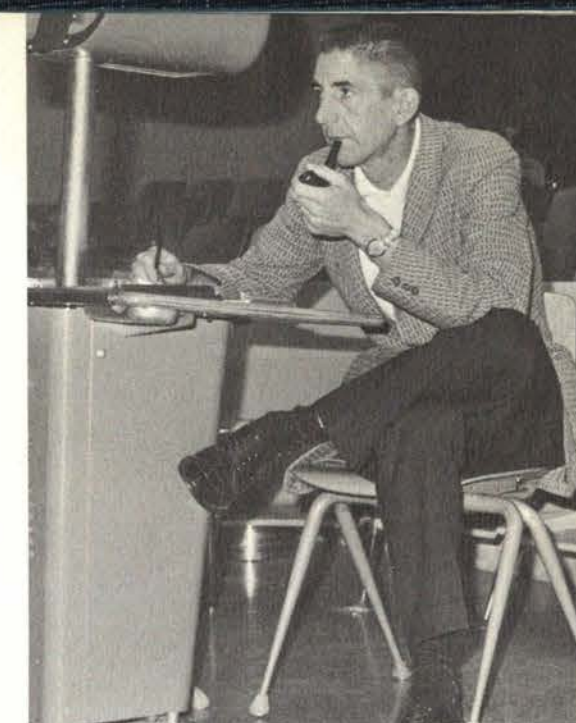

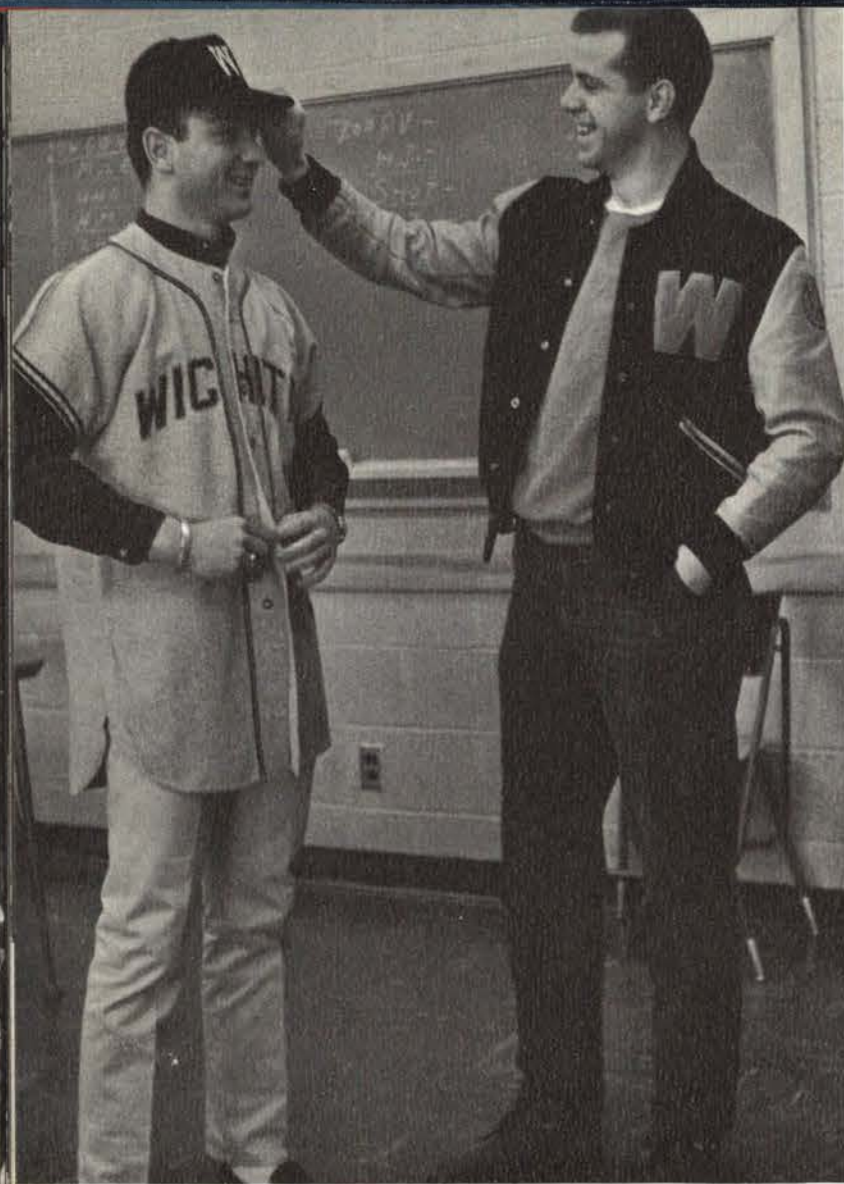

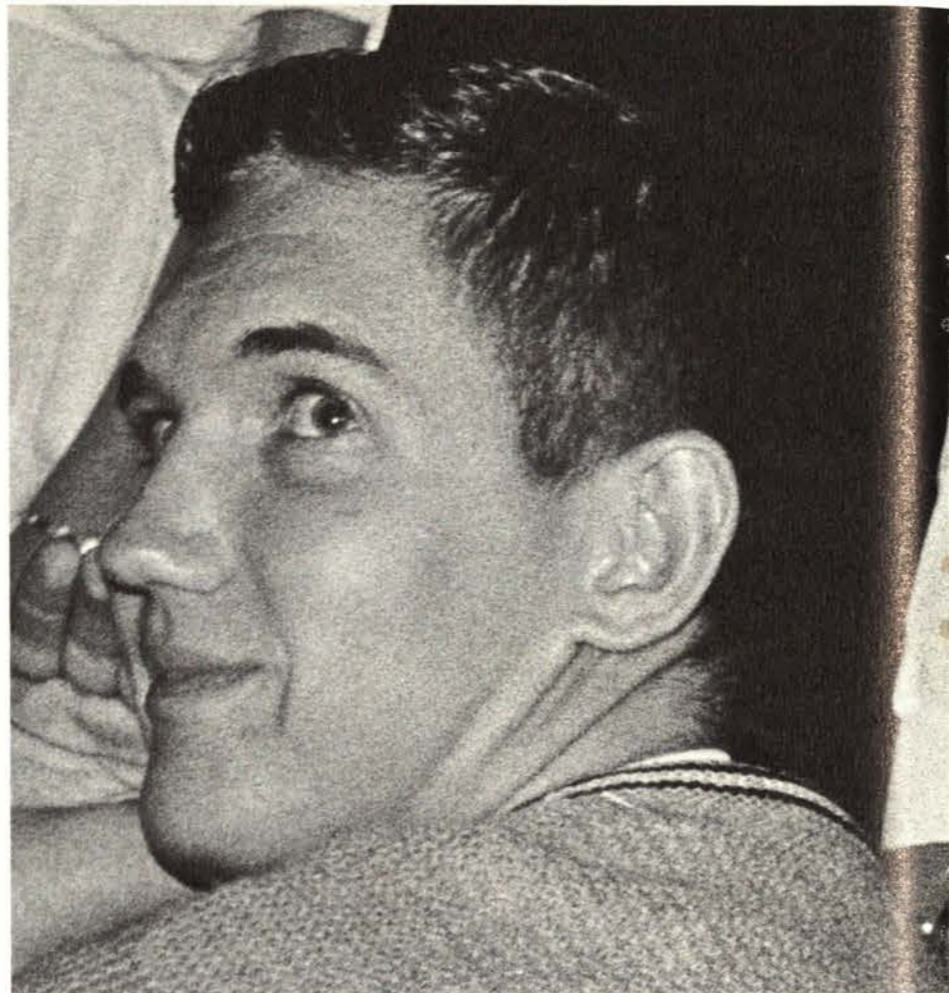
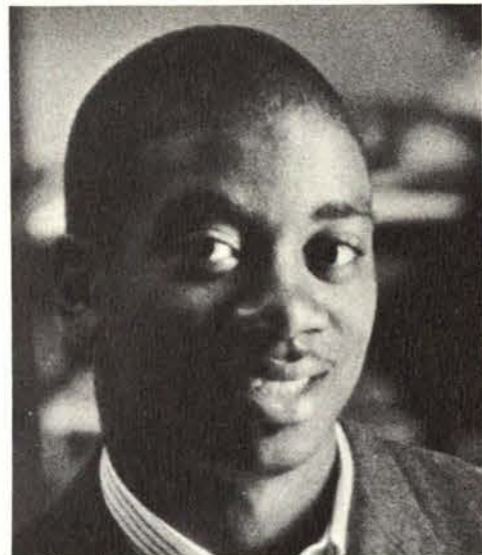
All activities participated in by the sororities are governed by the Pan Hellenic Council which also sets up and maintains rules for rushing and all sorority functions.

## Egghead Week

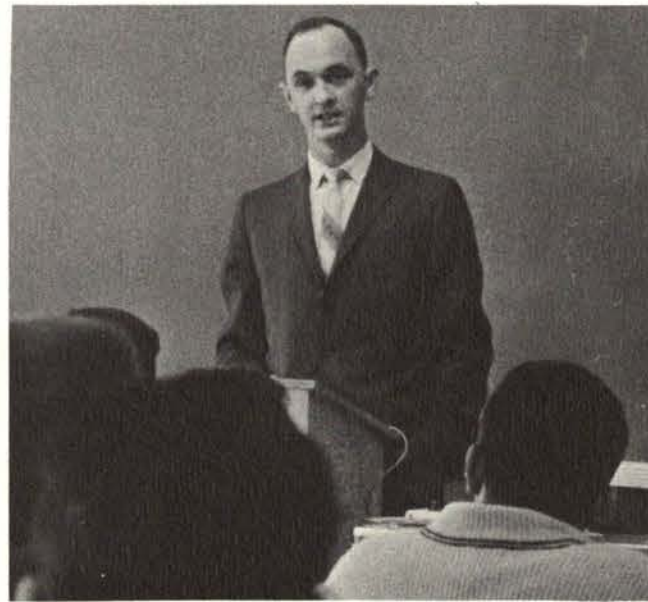

Egghead Week is sponsored by Mortar Board, senior women's honorary, to salute superior students. This is the sixth consecutive year for Egghead Week activities.

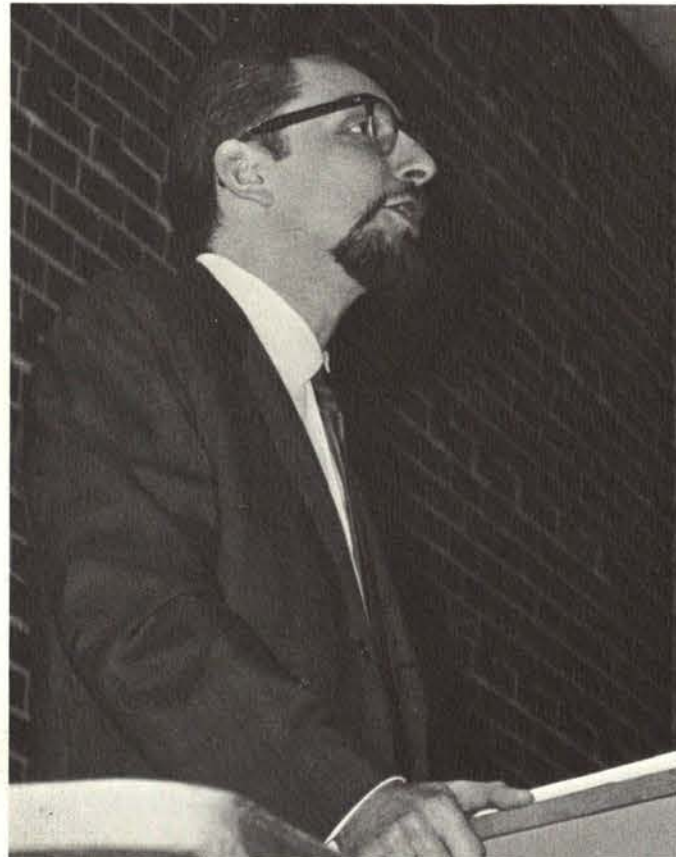

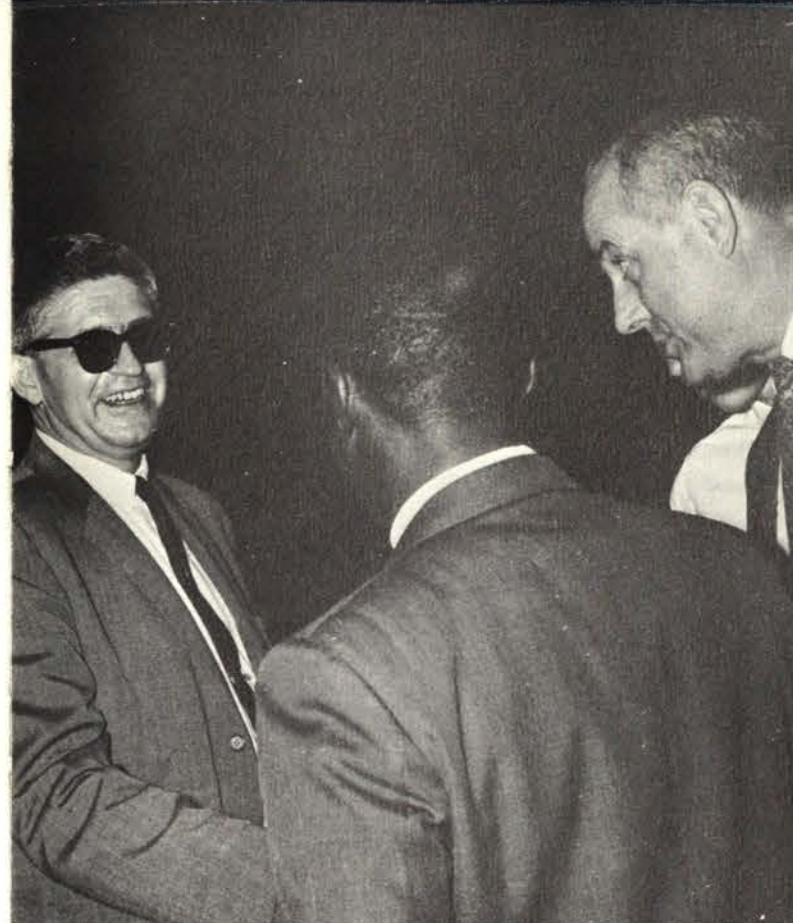

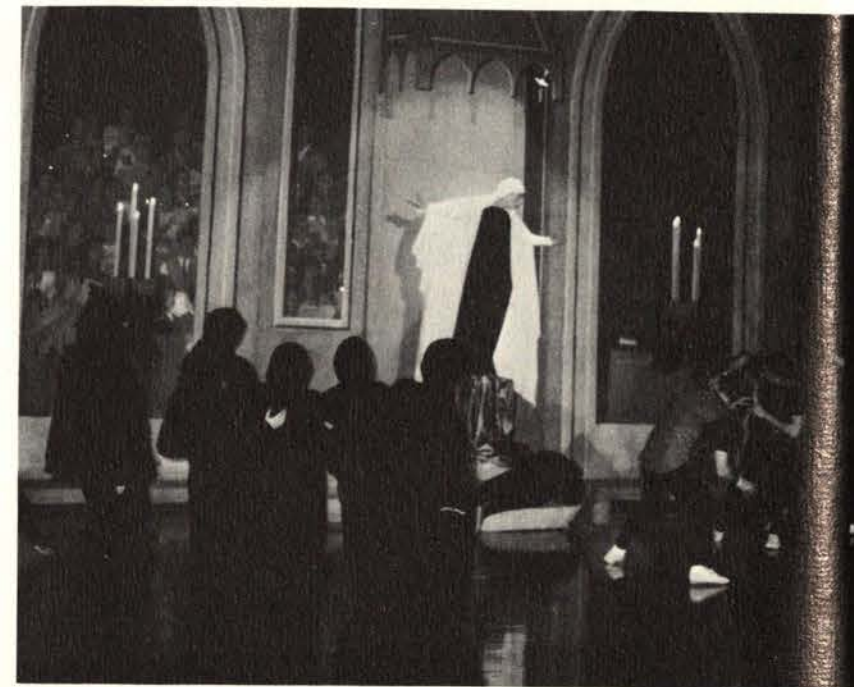

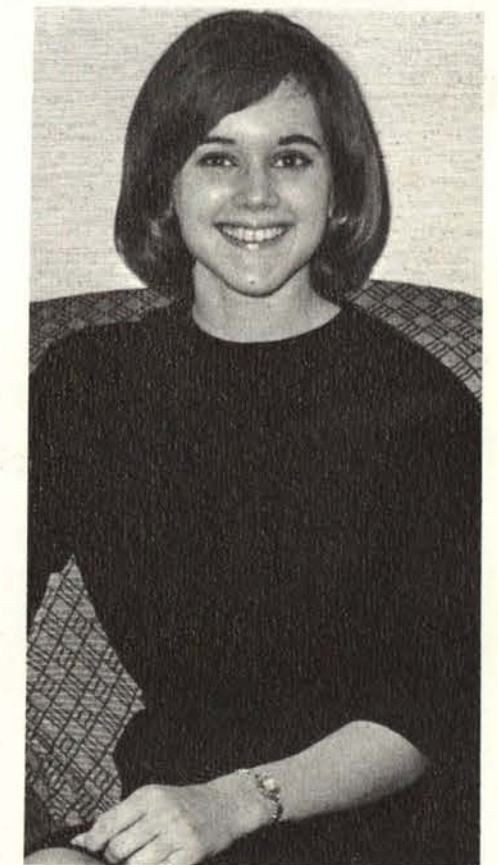

### wins Nightshirt Parade

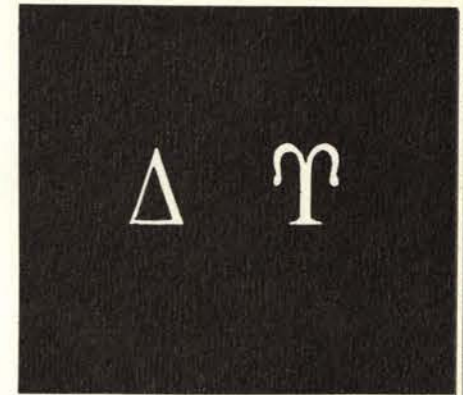

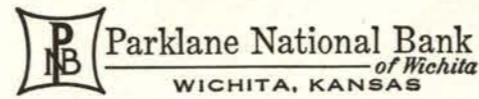
