THAT IS A NUMBER THAT DOESN'T RESONATE.

IF YOU THINK ABOUT A MONTH'S WORTH OF RAIN IS ABOUT 75 MILLIMETRES.

YOU'RE GETTING A MONTH AND AN EXTRA THIRD IN, YOU KNOW, THE RAIN STARTED ABOUT 8 a.m. DIDN'T START THAT HEAVY. WE GOT A THUNDERSTORM.

IT STARTED TO CLUSTER TOGETHER AND DID NOT STOP.

IN A PERIOD OF FIVE HOURS, YOU GET A MONTH AND A BIT OF RAIN. I WAS ACTUALLY HEARING SOME RUMBLINGS.

THE LAST TIME WE GOT CLOSE TO A HUNDRED IS WHEN WE GOT THAT FLOODING EVENT IN 2024 WITH THE THUNDERSTORMS.

MAKE ALL STOPS DOWN TO LANGSTAFF

WE WILL DETOUR TO UNION STATION. TRAINS WILL BE NOT BE STOPPING AT ORIOLE GO AND BE ADD 30 MINUTES OF TRAVEL TIME TO YOUR TRIP.

PARTS OF THE BUSIEST TRAIN STATION WERE FLOODED YESTERDAY. CREWS MADE HEADWAY IN THE CLEANUP.

>> Jennifer: AT BILLY BISHOP AIRPORT, THE PEDESTRIAN TUNNEL LINKING THE AIRPORT WITH BATHURST STREET WAS CLOSED AS A PRECAUTION BECAUSE OF THE HEAVY RAIN.

THE PEDESTRIAN TUNNEL IS EXPECTED TO REOPEN TODAY. >> Nick: AND A MILITARY HELICOPTER NEEDED TO BE CALLED IN TO RESCUE A PERSON STRANDED IN THE ETOBICOKE CREEK. PARAMEDICS AND FIRE CREWS FROM
PEEL REGION AND TORONTO SPENT
THE EVENING EVACUATING RESIDENTS
FROM THE TYNDALL SENIORS
VILLAGE.

FLOODING IS BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN CAUSED FROM AN OVERFLOWED CREEK NEXT TO THE HOME. THE BUILDING INSPECTOR HAS BEEN NOTIFIED.

>> Jennifer: MANY HOMEOWNERS ARE FACING BIG CLEANUP AND REPAIR BILLS.

SEVERAL HOMES WERE AFFECTED IN THE BLACK CREEK AND WESTON ROAD AREA.
