


Key Statistics DATA COVERS PERIOD FROM 06/2022 - 09/2024

The Copyright Claims Board (CCB) is a voluntary and virtual tribunal that provides a streamlined alternative to federal court to resolve copyright disputes involving claims up to \$30,000. The CCB began accepting claims in June 2022.

The statistics here are cumulative and focus on key metrics to show how the CCB has progressed since its launch, including information about those entities and individuals that have accessed CCB services and the outcomes of CCB proceedings.

NUMBER OF CLAIMS FILED






STANDARD-TRACK CLAIMS \$30,000 damages cap

The CCB analyzes raw data provided by eCCB, the CCB's online filing and case management system, and internal metrics to compile these statistics.
