**STATE OF NEW JERSEY

This information is being provided in compliance with the Appropriations Act requirement that the Attorney General provide the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting, the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee, the Assembly Appropriations Committee or the successor committees with a written report of seized or forfeited property involving offenses under N.J.S.A. 2C:35-1 et seq., and N.J.S.A. 2C:36-1 et seq.

The following is a summary of information regarding property and money seized or forfeited or both by State law enforcement agencies, namely, the Divisions of Criminal Justice and State Police. The seizures and forfeitures arise from violations of all offenses, including but not limited to N.J.S.A. 2C:35-1 et seq. and N.J.S.A. 2C:36-1 et seq. The information is for the period July 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. The report also contains additional information respecting participation by the State in federal seizures and the request or receipt of a share of forfeited property by the State from federal agencies.

Property or money listed as "seized" means that the property or money is the subject of litigation and awaits final disposition. Property or money listed as "forfeited" means that final disposition has occurred and the State's title to the property has been confirmed.

The forfeiture process is sometimes lengthy, and the actual forfeiture of the property or money may not take place in the same fiscal year that the property was seized. The property and money listed as "seized" occurred between July 1, 2021 and December 31, 2021. However, title to property and money listed as "forfeited" was confirmed between July 1, 2021 and December 31, 2021 but could have been seized during this or an earlier time period.

In addition, this report contains an accounting of proceeds reported expended by County Prosecutors' Offices as contained in the County Forfeiture Program Reports.

A law enforcement purpose shall include expenditures to defray the costs of protracted or complex investigations; to educate the public in crime prevention techniques; to provide additional technical assistance or expertise, which may include the purchase of surveillance and undercover transportation and investigation equipment, and computer hardware and software to enhance the coordination and sharing of information among the law enforcement agencies of a county and the State; to provide matching funds to obtain Federal law enforcement enhancement grants; or for such other purposes as the Attorney General may from time to time authorize.
